

The McEvoys stayed in Elko until around 1955 when they moved to Fallon, Nevada. Frankie and Helen purchased the Clover Club in 1957 and were granted a gaming license for a crap game and a 21 trable on March 29, 1957. The club was a gathering place for locals and Frankie supported local sports teams. Hospitality has always been a Nevada product and Frankie's Club survived for 20 years. just north of the Fallon Nugget, Frankie's Club was almost in the geographical center of Fallon. In the first years the club featured live gaming. In later years, slots and pin ball machines were the only form of gaming.

For years the Fallon Nugget had tried to purchase the small club, but Frankie continued to dispense his style of Nevada refreshment and hospitality. Frank McEvoy died in 1977 and the property was finally sold to the Nugget.
