CASINO CHIPS & GAMING TOKENS COLLECTORS CLUB CODE OF ETHICS

As a member of the Casino Chips & Gaming Tokens Collectors Club, I agree to abide by the following CC>CC Code of Ethics:

- 1. To support and be governed by the bylaws, rules, policies and regulations of the Club, as such rules may be amended from time to time.
- 2. To conduct myself so as to bring no discredit to the Club or to impair the prestige of the Club or its members.
- 3. To base all of my dealings on the highest plane of justice, fairness and morality.
- 4. Neither to buy nor sell any material of which the ownership is questionable.
- 5. To take immediate steps to correct any error I make in any transaction.
- 6. Not to sell, exhibit, produce nor advertise counterfeits, copies, reproductions or restrikes of any item unless their nature is clearly indicated as such.
- 7. To represent casino collectibles as genuine only when to the best of my knowledge and belief, such items are in fact authentic, and when no significant question of their authenticity has been raised.
- 8. To fulfill all contracts and agreements which I may make, either oral or written; to make prompt payment upon delivery; and to return immediately any item that is not satisfactory.
- 9. To furnish requested advice to the best of my ability and knowledge, and not to take advantage of superior knowledge on my part to the disadvantage of a less knowledgeable collector.
- 10. To offer on all sales and trades, a 10-day return privilege on any item purchased or traded, unless I have clearly and conspicuously stated that items are sold or traded "as is," and without a return privilege.
- 11. To refrain from making any unjustified, false, or slanderous comments about other members.
- 12. To abide by all local, state and federal laws and to assist in the prosecution of those who may violate such laws and regulations.
- 13. To cooperate fully with officers of the Club in investigating and resolving problems which may arise, and complaints which may be made, and to provide such information to such officers as may reasonably be requested.

Gaming Library Adds New Books and Magazines



Thanks to the club members who have graciously donated materials to the library, we now have over 150 items in stock. Materials range from popular and current publications - including the current editions of The Chip Rack and The Gaming Table - to some interesting historical books. The collection now includes a number of auction catalogs and a series of gaming

magazines published in the past 10+ years. Club members can even check out a series of 10 videotapes on The Mafia!!

The entire collection is listed in the table found on the next three pages. Currently, the library is categorized in 12 subject areas.

check-out period. The club will pay for postage to you; you simply pay for the return postage.

The mostused references for active collectors are probably the chip and token guides and auction catalogs. While the Library has a number of these books in stock, I decided to feature two history-

oriented books in this presentation about the Library. Atlantic City – 125 Years of Ocean Madness is a 200+ page book about the uniqueness of A.C. even prior to the introduction of gambling in 1978. Lots of b&w pictures, too. In Atlantic City-The Playground of the Nation, you can see the 1920's splendor of Atlantic City in color-tinted postcards in this 16-page booklet. Includes a vintage picture of Haddon Hall (now Resorts International).

I personally value learning about the historical context of the places where gambling now exists (or existed), whether it's Atlantic City, Nevada or the old west. Reading about casinorelated history, the gaming industry or other topics tangential to chip and token collecting may broaden your appreciation for your collection, too!

Perhaps you will find a book of interest in the Library. As always, if you have an extra book to donate, new materials are welcome anytime.

CALL FOR NOMINATIONS

According to Article Four Section 1; "The club shall be governed by a President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and a Membership Officer".

Section 2 states; "A Board of Directors will be comprised of the five (5) Club officers".

Section 3 A) states; "The President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and Membership Officer will be elected for a two year term in each year ending in an odd number".

Section 3 F) states; "Candidates for office shall be limited to all members in good standing of the Club)."**

Section 3 G) states; "In the event of a vacancy in office, the President shall appoint a member in good standing to hold office until the next regularly scheduled election".

**NOTE: Article Five Section 1 defines "Members" as the following: Charter; Regular; Associate; Life. Article Five Section 2 states; "All members shall have equal status and shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of membership in the Club, except that no quarterly club magazine will be sent to Associate Members." Article Five Section 3 states; "Members in good standing are those members whose dues are paid currently, and who have not been subject to any discipline by the Club".



CHIPS AND PLAQUES FROM SOUTH AFRICA


The collecting of gaming counters and plaques centres on the United States mainly because of the Nevada pro-gambling laws and the spectacular rise of Las Vegas to become the world's greatest gambling resort. A number of serious students have begun to record the history of gaming in USA and a prodigious amount of knowledge is becoming available to collectors as evidenced by the many books and magazines, like our Society magazine, that are now catering for collectors.

But very little attention has been paid to other countries, with a few exceptions like Cuba, where the casinos were generally run by the men who were already controlling American gambling.

It is important to record our knowledge of other countries before it is lost in the mists of time. Places like South Africa have a tren endous history for the gambling collector to get to grips with and its chips and plaques are colourful, bright and well designed.

The early history of South Africa is a blank page for collectors because the

Fah-Fee was commonplace. The whites who felt like a gamble had to leave the country to find a casino! But this was not so difficult as it sounds. The political leaders at that time wanted a pure-white South Africa and gave independence to various tribal areas so that while they had a work-force pool they also could better control coloured movement in and out of South Africa proper.


The potential was not lost on would be casino-operators. Men like Sol Kerzner backed by financier Gerry Muller: the powerful Dick Goss Chief Executive Officer of South African Breweries leapt at the chance to open up in "foreign countries" where South Africans could drive to without difficulty.

The Southern Sun Hotel Group was a merger of the Kerzner/Goss enterprises. Bophuthatswana was one of the foreign countries created and and the purchase of gambling rights was not difficult. The first casino came in 1977 at Mmabatho. Then came Sun City in 1979. Strangely, this was part paid for by the Industrial Development Corporation because jobs would be created. Kerzner bought another

gaming licence in Ciskei and soon had three casinos in operation there – Fish River, Mdantsane and Amatola.

In 1989 Kerzner suffered a temporary set-back when he was obliged to resign following newspaper accounts that he had paid 2 million Rand to George Matanzima to get a Transkei gaming licence. He was quickly re-instated on the grounds that his actions had been in the best interests of the sha re-holders!

We know now that Nelson Mandela also accepted 2 million Rand on behalf of the ANC and the division between the National Party and Lucas Mangope is still not known. Apartheid came to an end in 1994 and gambling took off. Blackjack had escaped the provisions of the 1965 Act as it had successfully claimed to be a game of skill! New laws are coming into effect and it is said that some 40 casinos are going to be allowed in South Africa. Some of the attractive plaques are illustrated.

When Arlene was diagnosed with a life threatening disease she continued to battle with dignity and most of all an unyielding enthusiasm for life.







THE DUTCH - DUTCH - DUTCH CONNECTION by Ralph Pollack (CC>CC member #749)

It all began in the late 1950's when Jake Kozloff and Clifford Jones started casino gaming in Aruba and Curacao. The first casino they opening was the Aruba Caribbean on July 18, 1959.

I published my first article in the CC>CC quarterly journal in 1993 which described some of the casinos in Aruba. Subsequent articles in the Gaming Times Magazine and my first two books mention the initials 'C.J. J.K.' on the chips.

Several casino used chips that depict these initials and were noted on roulette chips from the Holiday Inn Casino of Aruba and bear Pollack's Reference Codes (PRC #) of HOL-C&J.3, figure 1.



Also, the chips from the Flamboyant Casino in Curacao also bear these same initials PRC #FLA - 1 C&J 1., figure 2. Both these varieties of chips have the Christy & Jones shiny Hat & Cane mold!



In my most recent book on The Casino Chips & Tokens of the DUTCH CARIBBEAN - Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao & St. Maarten, the first chapter is dedicated to both Jake Kozloff & Clifford Jones' presence in the Caribbean. The text and chips described in this chapter demonstrate the words 'WEST INDIES SOUTH AMERICA' in addition to the C.J. J.K. initials, PRC # WI-SA-25E.1, which is a \$25.00 chip with the 'EWING' mold, figure 3.



A similar denomination and logo can be seen in the H.C. Edwards 'HCE' mold and the PRC # is **WI-SA-25HCE.1** which is a \$25.00 chip with the HCE mold, figure 4.



Both Jake and Cliff opened the Palace and Toraica casinos in Paramirabo, Suriname and these chips were used in these casino. If you are wondering where Suriname is, please refer to your world geography book and look at South America. You may remember the country of Dutch Guiana if so, then you are on the right track. Dutch Guiana became Suriname and the Republic of Suriname obtained it's independence from The Netherlands in November 1975. This country is located just north of Brazil between Guyana and French Guiana and its northern border is the

Atlantic Ocean. The principal language is Dutch.

The Dutch Connection means that the Dutch language is currently being spoken in Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao, St Maarten and in Suriname! In 1966, the Franklin Mint issued a proof and uncirculated casino tokens for the Suriname Torarica Casino and the Palace Casino and Pollack's reference codes are TOR - 1.1, PAL - 1.1 for the collector's proof edition and TOR - 1.2, PAL - 1.2 for the uncirculated variety (which was the token used for the slot machines). Figure 5 depicts the Palace Casino \$1.00 token.



I hope you enjoyed this brief history of two very famous men, and their chips, who pioneered the gaming world in South America, the West Indies and other parts of the Caribbean. If any one has any comments about Suriname, please contact me at P.O. Box 79216, Dartmouth, MA 02747. Thank you.

Welcome to another installment of "The Information Booth." For those of you who are reading the column for the first time, I try to provide some information about unidentified flying chips (UFC's) submitted by members for identification, and to answer questions about casino history, chip history, or related subjects.

As I always do, I'll begin with some answers to previous UFC questions. Also, I repeat my request for participation by club members. This column is only of value if you take time to write to me with identifications of chips you recognize here in the column, and if you send *legible* photocopies (full size is a must; black and white is preferred, and please *do not send enlarged copies or color copies*) or samples of chips you'd like identified. Please don't assume that if you recognize a chip, someone else will. Don't assume that "everyone knows what that chip is." If you have information which may be of help to other members, please share it through this column.

There are always far more unidentified chips than there are members who write to me with answers. The purpose of this column is to try to identify chips that our members ask about. It's important to share your knowledge of chips that your fellow members may not know about. Come on, collectors: help!

You will notice that very few of the chips which appear in the column are simply photocopied. That's because many older chips do not have enough contrast to photocopy well, and if they will not photocopy once, they certainly will not photocopy a second time when the magazine is published. As a result, I handillustrate most of the chips pictured here. It's a painstaking process, because I make every effort to make sure that each chip illustration is as close as possible to its original version. That way, recognition and identification may be possible.

Please follow the following simple rules when submitting chips or copies for inclusion in "The Information Booth:

If you have a chip that will not photocopy well, please send it, packed carefully. If you'd like me to

return it, please enclose return postage.

Black and white photocopies only, please! Believe it or not, it's actually more difficult to work with color photocopies than with black and white, even though they look prettier when you copy them!

No electronic scans, please! Scans are virtually impossible to work with, because they're almost never actual size. If you have a scanner, I know you like to show off the results, and electronic transmission is certainly faster and easier than (gasp!) taking pen in hand and writing a note, but please, if you want your UFC to appear in this column, don't send me scans! Legibility is the key: Please realize that if you cannot read what is printed on a chip clearly after you photocopy it for the column, neither can I, and illustrating it will be impossible. In such a case, you may send the chip to me, with return postage if you would like the chip sent back to you.

Also, please realize that if you recognize a chip published here as a UFC, you have information that your fellow collectors do not have. Please share. That's the whole point of this column. What is common knowledge in one area of collecting is completely unknown in others. For those of you with answers or questions, please share your information by writing to me at P. O. Box 340345, Columbus, Ohio 43234.

As usual, we'll begin with some identifications of previously-published UFC's. The volume and issue number of the magazine where the chip first appeared is shown in parentheses so you can see the illustration if you wish.

UFC 1028 (10/2): Ed Hertel and Gene Trimble have been able to verity that this chip was used at two different clubs in Seguin, TX: the **Red Mill** and the **Orange Bowl Club**, both open from 1946 to 1948, when the Texas Rangers closed them down. The owner of the clubs was Martin Weldon Roberts; hence the initials **MWR**. Great detective job, Ed and Gene!

UFC 1192 (11/4): T. R. King has confirmed that this chip was delivered to the Horseshoe Club in Las Vegas in 1954, three years after it opened.

UFC 1193 (11/4): There are two possibilities for this small crown chip depicting a paddlewheel steamboat, according to manufacturer T. R. King. It could have been shipped to the Tahoe Tavern in 1951 or it could have been shipped to Ken Stegall in Van Nuys, CA in 1968. According to *The Gaming Table*, Tahoe Tavern was open from 1901-1940, so we have to assume that the chip was made for Stegall. Who he is and what the chips were used for, we don't know.

UFC 1195 (11/4): We finally have the definitive word on the Edgewater chip, from research which Jim Episale has conducted. Jim found the chips in Biloxi, MS three years ago and bought them from a slot route serviceman who had seen the chips in use. He confirmed with Howard Herz, who has the records of the Mason Co., that the chips were shipped to Clay Reeves in Gulfport, MS. Jim's concluded that the chips were used at the Edgewater Hotel in Biloxi. Actually, Jim's learned that gambling at the Edgewater was not conducted in the hotel itself, but in an outbuilding which still stands on the property. The hotel itself was destroyed in a hurricane in 1969.

UFC 1198 (11/4): Jim Rauzy tells us that the OWL chip was used in the card room at the Owl Club Cafe in Tulare, CA.

UFC 1204 (11/4): Sometimes we not only receive an identification of a UFC, but a great story as well. That's the case with the **Higgins Smoke Shop** chip, which Bill Rouleau has identified for us. Maurice Higgins owned and operated the small club (which we believe was a poker room) in the basement of 700 Main Street in Rapid City, SD in the 1950's and 1960's. The main floor was occupied by the Orchard Room lounge and bar. Gambling being illegal, the sign outside the card room actually said "Pastime Smoke Shop." Confused yet?

Now for some new UFC's sent in by members for this issue. As always, I use a \$ next to the chip illustration to indicate that there is a denomination on the reverse side. If you see no \$ or other notation, you may safely assume that both sides of the chip are identical.

UFC 1218: Hmmm...Log Cabin, eh? We turn to our trusty dog-eared copy of *The Gaming Table*, and we find no fewer than 11 different Log Cabin entries. Now what?! Well, the large crown mold, we know, was mostly used in the west: especially California and Nevada. So we'll eliminate the two possibilities from IN and MT. Far more large crown mold chips are from CA than anywhere else, so without specific and

reliable proof, we'll eliminate the 7 NV entries as well. We're talking educated guesswork here, not reliable identification, mind you, because several of the NV entries are for clubs old enough to have used large crown chips, and it's possible that this Log Cabin chip was used in NV. Without specific proof, though, I always hesitate to attribute a chip to NV, especially when the mold is most often seen elsewhere.

So what are we left with? A "location unknown" entry and a closed Log Cabin card room in Yreka, CA. That's the one that has my vote! Without further specific proof, I'd put this chip in my album for California.



UFC 1219: Doc Finstuen, who spends his free time doing individual personal research for those of us who are a lot lazier and whose spouses have better things for them to do on weekends, managed to take a trip to Kansas City, MO to visit the old Jack Todd location. Todd was one of the most prolific chip distributors in the country. Like most chip distributors, Todd's chips were actually manufactured by The Burt Company in Portland, ME. Todd did the hotstamping and distribution after receiving blank chips from Burt. Doc found the building that used to be occupied by the Jack Todd Co., and which now houses a delicatessen. He also found this chip, along with two pairs of dice bearing the same EOS initials. Does anyone have any

idea where the chips were used?


UFC 1121: Clinton Boyle, who sent us the copy of this CC chip, believes it was used at the illegal Crescent Club in Biloxi, MS. Can anyone confirm? UFC 1122: Tom Hitselberger sent us this one. Now I know that Tom lives in Northern Virgina, the D.C. suburbs. Seems pretty likely to me that this F.E.A. chip was used in the underground casino operated by the Federal Energy Administration across the Potomac River from where Tom lives. Sound reasonable? Yeah, right! Anyone have a clue?

UFC 1123: Here's another unknown. I doubt that OPM stands for Other People's Money, but anything's possible!




UFC 1124: This GBL chip exists in at least three denominations: \$1, \$5 and \$25. That leads me to believe that it was a casino chip, not a personal chip. Does anyone know where it's from?

UFC 1125: This certainly seems to be an address, which would lead to the conclusion that the chip was used in an illegal club. 610 East Broadway could be almost anywhere, but we have the additional hint of what I assume to be the name of the town: Midway. Does anyone recognize the chip?



The remaining chips are completely unidentified. If you know them, let me know and your information will appear in the next issue's column!

This is in the center oval frame and ribbon that has the beer name on it. Even the "\$5" is more bluish on one and lavender on the other. #5 in series of six is "High Roller Red". Only one more to go!!

Released are, (1) Las Vegas Hilton LV red 2-pnk 2-org, multi center-Barron Hilton, (2) Sahara LV red 4 org/dk blu, multi center-Bill Bennett, (3) Palace Station LV red 3-tan 3-dk blu, multi center-Frank Fertitta, (4) Fiesta NLV red 3 tan/yel/tan, multi center-George Maloof, (5) Oasis Resort, Mesquite red 2-yel 2-tan, multi center-Si Redd, (6) El Cortez LV red 3 lrg yel, multi center-Jackie Gauhgan, (7) Imperial Palace LV red 3 pnk/grn/pnk, multi center-Ralph Englestad, (8) Santa Fe LV red 3-crm 3-turg, multi center-Paul Lowden, (9) Rio Suites Hotel LV dk red 4 split pnk/red/pnk, multi center-Tony Marnell. (10) was to be Stardust LV-Bill Boyd, which has still not been released and (11) MGM Grand LV-Kirk Kerkorian, which we are told will not be released to the public at all.

There were no new approvals for September. Hard Rock Hotel LV has four new \$10 with "G" mint mark now in play, same designs as before. We can now show you pictures of the two new \$10 at Golden Gate LV (1) trolley car, & (2) bridge.





Flamingo Hilton, Reno has re-issued the 1998 Year of the Tiger. This time WITH mint mark "G". Silver Smith, Wendover has all four new \$10 in play now also. All four are salt flats race cars, (1) Goldenrod, (2) Battery Box, (3) 2-D, & (4) unnamed race car. NEVADA? Silver Strike// MISSISSIPPI? Silver Strike. I would guess this next piece of information will amaze Silver Strike collectors everywhere, it sure did me!! Isn't it too bad when something like this gets found either the tokens are already obsolete or the casino is closed altogether so we can't all go look for one. The followong token is called a "mule" in the coin collecting world, that is dies from two different coins (tokens) come together somehow to make one piece. In this case: The building die from Gold River, Laughlin, Nevada has been mated with the building die from Isle of Capri, Biloxi, Mississippi. So far we know of only ONE of these in the hands of a collector and it came out of a machine at the Gold River Casino in Laughlin. The only approval in October is for a \$200 Imperial Palace LV. New mint mark? New design? --- Stay tuned!!

Lucky Chances, Colma was reported last time with regular low value Chipco. Some furthur information has been provided to us by Mel Jung. There are also higher value chips at this card club. \$100 Royce 600 green on copper color metal, \$500 Royce 600 royal blue on copper color metal, and \$1,000 Royce 600 dk red on copper color metal. All three of these chips are already or soon will be obsolete, as new \$100 and \$1,000 have been ordered from Chipco. The \$500 will not be replaced.

Also at Lucky Chances there was a no denomination Royce chip, dk yellow on brass color metal for "Grand Opening 1998". One of these chips was placed in each poker pot during Grand Opening day, so only pot winners received this chip. I hear some people played poker for hours hoping to win a pot just to get a Grand Opening chip!! There was also a no denomination Chipco dis-

pensed in the same manner to pot winners as a "Lucky Piece".

Oceanside Card Club, Oceanside closed for good. Building is now a traffic school.

Bullwhacker's, Blhk new \$5 table chip, multi dk mrn Chipco with smooth finish. Original chips with same design were pebble finish. Famous Bonanza, Cncy opened additional casino space called-Easy Street Casino 8-7-98. This is slots only and has Easy Street \$1 (1998) GDC tokens.





Bronco Billy's, Crck new \$5 table chips, Chipco, blk yel red with bronco & rider logo same as 1996 issue. Only difference being "Sports Bar & Casino" is thick letters on 1996 issue and thinner letters on 1998 issue. Casino Princesa, a brand new "mega yacht" has started sailing from Bayside Market, Miami. Chips are H&C picture chips; \$1 wht, prp blk wht grn center & \$5 red 2 yel/blk, multi center. Tokens are \$1 & \$5 (1998) GDC. Both have same reverse design, but obverse are different.

The Pub, Tacoma \$1 H&C blu 3 pnk/org, blk red wht CI. Previous chip had only 3 org inserts.



Freddie's Club, Renton has opened another club in Auburn, also called Freddie's Club. Opened 10-5-98 with 50-cent H&C dk brt pnk--HS, \$1 H&C picture chip dk blu 3 lt blu/pnk, multi wht center, & \$5 H&C red 2-lt grn 2-gry, blk red blu wht CI. These are all exactly the same colors as Freddie's in Renton, BUT do have "Auburn, Wa" on chips. Also Renton "\$1" is red and Auburn "\$1" is black.

Great Wall, Tacoma has new \$5 RTP lt grn 3 dk blu/yel/dk blu, blk red wht CI chips. All H&C chips are obsolete here.



P.J. Pockets Cardroom, Federal Way changed name to P.J. Pockets Casino. New in 1998- \$1 BJ wht 4 blk, blk red wht CI. All Chipco are obsolete.



Cafe International & Motel, Blaine \$1 triangle & club mold beige, blk mrn wht CI. May not be newly opened, but is new to us.



A new 50-cent -A- mold dk lav--HS chip has surfaced at the newly named Drift On Inn Roadhouse, Seattle BUT has only "Drift On Inn" on chip.



Parkers Casino, Shoreline \$1 BJ blu 4 wht, red blk dk blu wht CI.



Royal Casino, Everett a previously unreported 50-cent H&C blu-HS chip.

Also there are now \$1 slot tokens (1998) RWM, and a \$5 H&C picture chip red 2-off wht 2-yel, wht gry blk reverse center, red blk gry obverse center, "Grand Opening June 19, 1998".



It has now been reported the tables will not return to Casino of the Sun, Tucson, Ariz and all chips will be for sale at face value with the stipulation that they cannot be cashed in again. Golden Bear Casino, Klamath River, Calif opened 8-98. Chips

blk red wht CI, & \$5 RTP red 3 wht/blk/wht, blk red wht CI. All have same center design.



Harrah's has pulled out of Harrah's Skagit Valley Casino, Bow, Wash. Upper Skagit Tribe has taken over and new name is Skagit Valley Casino. Chips are \$1 H&C wht 1 each-red dk mrn blu, grn blk blu wht CI and \$5 H&C red 4 blu/pnk/gry, grn blk blu wht CI. All Harrah's chips are obsolete.



North Star Casino, Bowler, Wisc has all new set of Chipco, same designs and colors, ONLY the color of the denomination has changed. 50-cent was black, is now green, \$1 was black is now yellow.

Casino Queen, E St Louis, Ill has all new chips; \$1 house mold wht 4 gry, blk dk gld wht CI, original was wht 4 lt blu, blk lt blu wht CI. \$5 house mold red 4 off wht, blk lt pnk wht CI, original was red 4 crm, blk crm wht CI. \$25 house mold grn 4 dk blu, dk blu wht CI, original was lt grn 4 yel, yel wht CI.

President Riverboat Casino, Davenport, Iowa has all new chips; \$1 H&C wht 2-tan 2-dk brn, blk red blu wht CI, & \$5 H&C red 3 wht/dk blu, blk red blu wht Ci. Both have new star & flag logo on center inlay.



As we have long suspected there are riverboat and Indian casino slot tokens that we have been missing. There must be collectors of these tokens out there somewhere! Please, let us hear from you. We need information badly. Our original Bally's Saloon & Gambling Hall, Tunica, Miss \$5 token is an undated (1993) GDC brass. A newer one has now come our way. Almost same design as before, but now dated 1995 and name now reads Bally's Saloon-Gambling Hall-Hotel.





Grand Casino, Gulfport, Miss \$5 Chipco multi red, "Crusin' The Coast Oct 8-11, 1998", reverse is "The Coasters" entertainer group. No other riverboat casinos in the area, including Grand Casino, Biloxi, joined in issuing chips for this celebration.

SILVER STRIKES OF NEVADA by Jack Haddock

Winter seems to cool down not only the weather but the addition of new silver strikes. That's not to say that there isn't some things happening. The major project for these winter months is the addition of ".999" to the center silver on all the casinos which have not yet been converted. Many new designs will go along with the effort which should be completed by the first part of 1999.

Some new casinos have added the silver strike machine: Silver City (return to service), Las Vegas Club, L.V., and Primm Valley in Primm, Nevada. Of course, there are those who had them removed like Fitzgerald's in Reno and Palace Station in Las Vegas.

The new Eldorado "building token" is one of those needing the silver status to be placed on the silver center.



Another new one in the north was the mint marked Flamingo Hilton tiger. The no mint mark is a true error as the mint mark is required by the Nevada Gaming Commission. As we prepare for the year of the rabbit, both "tiger" tokens may be fairly scarce because of their short time existence.





The two long awaited Riverboat Casino silver strikes came into play in October and were out of play by December 1 when the casino closed. Approved many months ago, the "Far West" and "Sylvan Dell" completed the set of four issued by the casino in Reno. These could very well be an instant made rarity.





The Hard Rock Cafe (both \$10 and \$20) do not contain any reference to the .999 silver which is perfectly legal and indeed will change when a new series of four \$10 and four \$20 are issued. Guitars are the subject of the art work on the proposed new tokens. Another unusual minting is on some tokens from the El Cortez in Las Vegas, Note that the rim does not contain the name of the casino. This is the only casino in Nevada known to have the oddity. Since the centers can be replaced, beware of such strikes from other casinos.

The Imperial Palace in Las Vegas has issued a different \$200 silver strike you can trade 20 - \$10 tokens for. The only change on the \$200 is the mint mark.

Do you have a "21 Spade" from the Las Vegas Airport? For over a year there has been rumors about the airport ordering up a new batch of them which would destroy their collectability. Probably not going to happen. Here's a new story as to what may have been the reason for the short lived status of the "21 Spade" token. There is a superstition that the ace of spades carries with it a negative meaning for one life. It really means "change" but some people wouldn't want that "ace" just before getting on a plane. One shipment was all that ever made ti to the machine then the design was changed to "21 Hearts".

ATLANTIC CITY

Compared to other gaming jurisdictions, it would appear that Atlantic City had relatively few new issues to report on during this past quarter. Following the Harrah's Bud Ice Series and the Sands Milton Berle \$20's set reported on in the precious quarter, we saw another multiple piece series, the Miss America's from several different properties in town. All had the same subject portrait of last years winner Kate Shindle, Miss America 1998. They were produced in \$5 and \$10 denominations as follows:

\$5 Trump Plaza CHIPCO \$5 Caesars CHIPCO \$5 Tropicana Paulson \$5 Claridge Paulson \$10 Harrah's Paulson \$10 Sands Paulson



Caesars issued two \$25 limited edition commemorative chips. One was for the popular Golden Boys; Bobby Rydell, Frankie Avalon, and Fabian. The second Caesars issue, another \$25 commemorative,



marked the grand opening of the new magnificent Temple Lobby and Centurion Tower.


Hilton issued a set of five serially numbered boxer Hall of Fame \$10 denomination chips. Joe Louis, Jack Dempsey, Floyd Patterson, Jake LaMotta and Larry Holmes were the selections that Hilton chose to honor. I'm sure there were other worthy candidates to chose from. Interestingly, the Jack Dempsey chip had the wrong date (1956) on it. It would appear that the reverse used for the Dempsey chip is the same reverse used on the Floyd Patterson issue. Dempsey fought in the 1930's. The Holmes chip was the only one to be issued in color.







A controversial Thanksgiving Day chip was issued at Tropicana, where severe restrictions were placed on the bulk of the chip distribution requiring collectors to be seated and buy-in at a game of poker for the "privilege" of purchasing this chip. A complaint was filed with the New Jersey Casino Control Commission over this absurd policy instituted by Tropicana.



At Claridge, another chip in the Gaming Legends series was released to commemorate Bell Starr, whoever he/she was. Another Gaming Legends issue was scheduled to be released by Claridge on December 10th, just prior to this report being written.



In the token department, Harrah's has a No Cash Value amusement token for use in their game room. While it can not be considered a *gaming* or *slot token* it is a token issued by the casino to be inserted into a slot; albeit an amusement machine such as pinball, basketball hoops, etc.





A new \$2 slot token was issued at Trump Marina to compliment their earlier release of a \$1 token. The Trump Castle \$5 & up tokens have not been replaced as of mid-December.





A .10 cent token was issued for a new Bingo slot machine exclusively in use at Showboat. Tropicana and Bally's have .10 tokens as well.





Tropicana has all new \$1, \$5, \$25, \$100 slot tokens after changing over from the old TropWorld tokens.





For all of you crazed slot card collectors. You've finally been noticed! Trump Marina has issued eight different slot cards, called "Wild Cards" over an eight week period during November and December. A brand new slot card issued each week...and they were all free!

"BLAST FROM THE PAST" CHIP SHOW REVEALS CONFLICTS OF COMMUNITIES WITH ILLEGAL GAMING ESTABLISHMENTS

The police raids on the illegal gaming establishments along the Gulf Coast began on the last day of June, 1966, after all gambling was shut down for a drying out period as the result of Mississippi's legalization of alcohol. Up until this time, operators paid a black market tax to the state, allowing the sale of alcohol alongside gambling. With the passing of the law, alcohol and gambling could no longer coexist. The state ABC board was formed forcing gambling underground, with attendance at poker, craps, and other games by invitation only. And thus began almost three decades of conflict between the communities along the Mississippi Gulf Coast, the authorities, and men like Rip Poulos and Mickey McKoul who ran the illegal establishments. Sitting on the MS/AL border, with each state thinking the other had jurisdiction, the Sage Patch was the only club escaping the scrutiny of the police and subsequent raids until it shut down in 1992.

Sharing stories such as these and authenticating decades old illegal gaming chips, Rip Poulos, life-long resident and club owner, captivated those attending Bob Gabel's Gulf Coast Shows production of "Blast From the Past" Casino Chip and Memorabilia show hosted the weekend before Thanksgiving by the President Broadwater Hotel and Resort in Biloxi, MS. Verta Lee Swetman, who issued the warrants to close the illegal gaming facilities, also sat and talked with those interested in hearing more about the decades of illegal gaming.

Rip's career, spanning the better part of four decades that began in the late 50's, included such early jobs as poker and craps dealer in the famous 406 and Magnolia Clubs. Later a partnership formed with Mickey McKoul and the Tahiti Club. Ignorant of the law at that time, Rip ordered chips and dice from a company in Vegas; as a result, Mr. McKoul was indicted for interstate transportation of illegal gaming supplies and turned over the management of the club to his partner. Another of their establishments was the Porter House Steak House and Bar, located at the intersection of Highway 90 and Courthouse Road, offering behind-the-scene roulette, craps, and blackjack.

Additional stories cleared up the myth that the 406 and Magnolia Clubs were housed on separate floors in the same building. In reality, the 406 Club sat at that address on Magnolia Street with the Union Bar and its upstairs Magnolia Club, offering bookings on horse races and all other sports, sitting back-to-back. The 406 offered a two-dollar poker game until 5:00 p.m. when no-limit stud poker and boure' became the popular choice of gamblers.

Local communities along the Coast held different opinions toward gambling. While Biloxi was always more liberal and the first to legalize gambling, Gulfport

held out until the second vote. And to this day, the people of Long Beach do not allow gaming along their stretch of the gulf coast.

Also in attendance at the show were a group of men and women who enjoy the collecting of casino chips and memorabilia from across the United States, as far away as Beverly Hills, CA; Las Vegas, NV; New Mexico; New Jersey; Pennsylvania; Michigan; Atlanta; and Pompano Beach, FL; and as close as Alabama and other Mississippi communities. These collectors brought posters, buttons, match books, pens, and chips (obsolete and current, legals and illegals) and other memorabilia from Indian Reservations, poker rooms, riverboats, land-based casinos, and racing tracks, around the world. Janice O'Neal, Vice-president and historian of CC>CC, represented the national hobby and membership of the American Numismatic Association's (coin collectors) member club, Casino Chips & Gaming Tokens Collectors Club. Included in this weekend's festivities of sharing chips and information was Bill Akeman, publisher of the privately issued <u>Gaming Times</u> magazine.

Greg Susong, designer of the forum and gathering place for on-line chip collectors, represented his website www.chipguide.com, posting pictures and information for those unable to attend the show. The chipboard, under construction for the past two years, is continually upgraded to meet the demands of the public and advertisers. There are 3500 pictures of different U.S. chips found on Susong's website along with links to different collectors, FAQ's for newcomers, contests, email addresses, and a map allowing viewers a peek at current and obsolete chips from selected casinos.

When asked why they collect chips, one receives answers as varied as the collectors themselves. Coming from backgrounds that include professional degrees in fields such as teaching and engineering, independent businessmen and women self-employed, and retirees, you hear explanations such as: history, travel, camaraderie, profit, challenges, pastime, variety, artistic design, investment, interest in gambling and many, many more.

Being a newcomer to the hobby, the show gave me an opportunity to meet the different collectors I have conducted on-line business with over the past year, putting a face with the email and phone conversations. The "Blast From the Past" offered opportunities to join the national collectors' organization, CC & GTCC, to subscribe to magazines such as <u>Gaming Times</u> and add to our different collections before we parted on Sunday and began our journeys home in anticipation of next year's show.

She is one of our newest club members. Due to doing news coverage of the Biloxi show and getting to meet other collectors, she is now avidly pursuing her chip collecting hobby. WYNN KO's TRUMP AT ATLANTIC CITY

Steve Wynn won the 3-year battle with Trump who was trying to prevent the road and tunnel project that will link Atlantic City Expressway with the city's Marina district, where Mirage Resorts planned a casino project. This 2 ½ year construction project will cost \$330 Million with Mirage paying 110 Million and New Jersey State paying 220 Million.

When Mirage Chairman Steve Wynn left Atlantic City over casino regulations he offered to return and build a Las Vegas style resort if the state would help finance the 2.2 mile road, 2,200 feet of which would consist of a tunnel.

Now since this is reality, Mirage has unveiled the design of a 40 story, 2,000 room hotel casino which is to open in the year 2002. This hotel casino is expected to cost from \$800 Million to \$1 Billion and will feature gardens year round in a climate controlled tropical setting. It will also include a dozen restaurants, two theaters, and an array of upscale shops. The Mirage project will be called Le Jardin, which will sit on 150 acres.

Mirage is convinced that they will take Atlantic City to the next level. The rumor has it that Boyd Gaming Corp. of Las Vegas will also sow their oats here in Atlantic City with a hotel casino of 1,200 rooms.

Going, Going, Gone

All around the country casinos are taking out their silver strike machines. Some, like Circus Circus in Reno reinstalled the silver strikes machines with a new set of six distinctive styled designs featuring Emmett Kelly.

Archie Black last quarter wrote about the few machines that are still in play in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Here in the Midwest we found that Prairie Meadows in Altoona, Iowa has just discontinued their quarter machines which put out the eight Hollywood Notables and the four animal strikes. They still have the \$1 machine featuring the set of five \$20 race horses and the \$5 machine where you can win the \$200 silver strike. We asked around to see if the machines would be brought back and no one seemed to have any answers.

Gary Stathatos was in the Lady Luck Casino at Bettendorf, Iowa this fall and discovered that they had taken all their machines out in August. They had around twelve different silver strikes. This will make it very difficult to try and get a full set from there.

The Winnevegas Casino in Sloan, Iowa discontinued their silver strike machines in 1996. In two years they had put out 20 different strikes.

Ray Moritiz of Missouri told us about the sad state of affairs in the Kansas City, Missouri casinos. Harrah's is down to one machine in their North Star Casino. The Flamingo in Kansas City has also taken theirs out. Station Casino's machines are gone.

Mississippi has also pulled machines. Casino Magic of Biloxi no longer has the machines along with Bally's of Tunica.

In Minnesota, Shooting Star of Mahnomen, took out their silver strike machines sometime ago. Treasure Island at Redwing, Minnesota only removed them last year.

There are probably many more that are not listed. I would be interested in receiving e-mail or letters informing me of what is happening or has happened outside of Nevada.

The above is the problem, now how do we go about solving it?

My husband and I have talked about this situation to many of our collector friends. Here are some of the solutions we have discussed.

We go to the casinos whether they have the strikes or not and talk to whomever is in charge of getting new machines. We would need to take some of our literature from the Club, perhaps our lists of strikes that we do have. We have even found that some of the casino personnel have no idea what we are talking about so it is imperative that we have a silver strike to show them.

We need to know approximately how many people out there are collecting the strikes. The membership list that is put out by CC&TGCC is not informative enough. We and our friends are telling everyone in the club to fill out their application by writing in their interest - Silver Strikes. According to the last membership list only about four persons listed SS. Hopefully the membership application can be changed to list Silver Strikes, but until that time all of us silver strikers need to write it in.

A big problem we have is that none of us are being consistent in what we call our hobby. Tokens have been interchangeable, so you don't always know for sure what a person is collecting. We all need to agree on what to call them. How about letting me know the best name for our strikes?

One of our trader friends estimated that there are 700 of us. We think there are many more. To have any clout with the casinos we need real numbers.

Another thing that we can do is to pick up some of the "How are we doing" forms that all casinos seem to have. We have filled them out and under comments have written to the effect that the casino was great except they do not have the silver strike(commemorative coins) machines. If they have the machines then it is most important to compliment the casinos and tell them that it is one of the reasons we chose to come to their casino. Everyone likes a pat on the back.

I feel very strongly that the Club needs to recognize the silver strikes as they do the chips and the tokens. Again, the casinos would be delighted to be singled out as having the best design, etc.

My husband and I each carry a silver strike with us and talk to anyone who will listen. Many people are not even aware of the strikes. Others have seen the machines and didn't understand what it was all about. Some have taken them home and not knowing what else to do with them has thrown them in a drawer. Most people are surprised to learn that we have an organization. We have sent out material and application blanks to whoever has asked for them.

I am sure there are many more constructive things that we could do and if you have some ideas, please send them to me and they will appear in this column as space permits. After all, the collecting of silver strikes is so unique as you cannot walk up to a table or cashier cage and buy them. They have to be won by playing the machines.

Once Around the Northwest: Washington Card Rooms Fight Back Steve Goodrich R-306

Howdy friends. Most of us are aware that casino gaming has now been allowed on the Indian reservations in Oregon and Washington for approximately five years. Beforehand, gaming (mostly poker) existed in legal card rooms in both states. Though Oregon never developed much of an industry (local laws often excluded or severely hampered club operations) the state of Washington featured more than 100 public card rooms before the establishment of Native American casinos within the state. Many of these closed as business was lost to the larger casinos and the state gaming commission offered little recourse due to the restrictive rules placed upon the clubs. Through a recent series of rulings the card rooms of Washington have finally been allowed to attempt to keep up with the Indian casinos. Though the response from the commission was slow in coming, the new locales are starting to make some headway. Let's take a closer look into what is presently occurring in Washington.

The state gaming commission finally relaxed many of the confining rules the card rooms previously faced. Most critically, these establishments can now offer house-banked card games, formerly allowed only in the native casinos. Clubs are free to deal blackjack, let it ride, pai-gow poker, and Caribbean stud. Roulette and craps are still prohibited in these locales and can only be found currently at the Indian casinos. The state has permitted such card games for just over a year now as I write (November 1998). Limits have also increased during this period so that one can find \$100 maximum blackjack tables at certain clubs, closer to, but not yet even with, the limits found on the reservations. Hours of operation, once strictly limited to a 2:00am closing time across the state, are now much more liberal. Though each club must close for four continuous hours in a 24-hour period, the club can select its own operating times (some close from 4-8am, some from 6-10am, etc.). Club size has also increased in many locations as the commission now allows up to 15 card tables in one building. In addition, traditional card rooms that deal only poker have been permitted a greater amount of freedom in the types of games they deal and the hours they operate.

However, other restrictions significantly influence the type and size of the public card rooms. Clubs which just offer poker are not faced with as many regulations, therefore their overhead remains generally low and I know of many places operating with only one or two tables at any given time. The regulations particularly affect businesses with house-banked games. The commission has been quite picky about handing out these licenses. Clubs which apply for this type of gaming must have a complete security system (overhead cameras and a continuously staffed monitoring facility). The start-up costs, including the cost of the original licenses, easily run into the tens or even hundreds of thousands. Additionally, the normal number of dealers, pit, and shift bosses (not to mention cashiers, waitresses, etc.) must also be present. Therefore, what has emerged are "larger" (ie. 12-15 table) clubs in the more heavily populated areas of the state focussing solely on the casino-type card games. These clubs can better afford the greater overhead as opposed to a one or two table operation, which would still require the same outlay of funds for security systems and licensing fees. Some prominent casino-oriented clubs to open in the past year include Dodge City, Freddies, Havanas, Mars Hotel, PJ Pockets, Parkers, Players & Spectators, Riverside, Silver Dollar, and Skyway Park. Many of these businesses are former poker rooms remodeled to accommodate the new games; some are brand new casinos. Even more are in the planning stage at present and I know of another handful that will have opened by the time you are reading this.

It seems that this is the wave of the future, at least for the time being, in Washington state and I don't see the trend slowing. I have included a page of illustrations of several chips available from some of newer clubs in Washington.

As a side note, the "northwest" area chip collectors get together a few times a year, usually in either the Seattle or Portland area, to trade and swap stories and updates. PHIL'S FORAYS RANTING AND RAVING IN RENO by Phil Jensen

I knew the first time I saw Reno that some day I would return to live there. That was in 1962 when I, as a teenager, and my folks passed through on a trip to California.

My first recollection of life in Reno was Alan Bible campaigning for re-election to the United State Senate. He was standing in the back of a pick-up truck, going up and down Virginia Street and holding a Bible in his hand. He kept repeating "Remember the Good Book." I guess in those days the voting populace spent as much time downtown as the tourists. Nevertheless, I thought it was a tacky attempt at name recognition.

Many of the casinos on Virginia Street had open air fronts with slot machines extending practically to the sidewalk. I remember peering into Harold's Club and longing to go inside. Down the street at the Mapes, large picture windows offered a glimpse of the action inside and I was able to get within inches of my father playing a slot machine, even though I was out side on the sidewalk.

By the summer of 1965 I was living at Tahoe and making frequent trips to Reno. Having turned twenty-one I regularly visited the casinos but had not yet started to collect chips. By the Fall of 1965 I had joined the Naval Reserve in Reno to avoid being drafted.

I had to spend one weekend a month attending meetings in Reno and I always stayed at the Overland Hotel. It was my favorite place in Reno and for some strange reason always got room 501. It was a small cubicle on the fifth floor with a bed, dresser, and a sink in the corner. The bathroom was down the hall like a lot of the old-time hotels. There also was a window that opened onto a ledge that ran all around the top (5th) floor. One night, as the snow was falling, I crawled out and walked around. It's a wonder I didn't fall off and land on Commercial Row below, but being young and foolish it was something I had to do.

My March of 1966 so much snow had fallen at Tahoe I decided to move to Las Vegas where the climate was more bearable.

I kept thinking of Reno though, and after being discharged from the Navy in 1969 I returned. I needed a job and the first place I went was the Overland Hotel. Now, all the dice dealers were old men and I felt out of place applying but to my surprise I got hired. As it turned out I stayed for four years.

By now, I had started to collect chips in earnest. I was inspired by the collection at Harvey's and a friend who also collected. Other than that, though, I was pretty much on my own and a little embarrassed to admit to anyone by passion for chips.

Anyway, working at the Overland was great fun. There were lots of local characters who hung out there and we had a good time kidding with them. We also employed pensioners as shills at the tables and I spent a lot of time talking to them about the old days of Reno. One guy, his name was Benny, was an old prospector. A couple of times he took me out into the hills and showed me the ropes of prospecting. I also spent a lot of time bugging the owner, Pick Hobson, for

old chips. He had preciously owned the Frontier Club on Virginia Street and I eventually got quite a few from him.

Most of the twenty-one dealers were older ladies who had started their careers at Harolds Club. I was surprised to learn that most of them could deal craps and it was rumored that a few had Harolds Club tattoos. (That's a JOKE)

One night I mentioned to one of them that I needed some Harlem Club chips for my collection but was a little apprehensive about going down there alone. The place was a block from the Overland across Lake Street, behind the New China Club. Anyway, Marion was her name, said we'd run down on our next break which we did. By this time the Harlem Club was called the Soul Club but they still used Harlem Club chips. The place was jumping when we got there and I bought four five dollar chips off the twenty-one table. I think they were the old BC Wills mold and they had a picture of a boot, the significance of which I never did find out. There were also some purple fifty-cent hot stamp chips which I bought. Some had the Club Harlem name on them but others had only NB/50¢. I later learned that the NB stood for the original two owners, Norval and Bailey.


Anyway, back at the Overland, I normally spent my breaks in a small room in the basement. From this room were doors to the coin room, Pick's office, and a mysterious room where all the old slot machines from the Frontier Club were stored. A rather permanent barrier of chicken wire had been nailed up around them but were still visible from the break area. I always longed to have one--surely Pick would never have missed it. Beyond that was a long tunnel which seemed to disappear into nowhere. One night I got the shift boss to take me on a tour of it. The tunnel actually ran the full length of Commercial Row, the street on which the Overland was located and was extremely dark. It was illuminated by a few dim bulbs which had been mounted on a block long wire. After going about 40 or 50 feet we came upon a tub-style crap table that had been stored in a little alcove to the side and on it was a cardboard box that contained about 15 or 20 boxes of chips. My heart was pounding as I grabbed at the treasure before me. As it turned out, they were all chips from Bill's Corner Bar which was the business on the corner of Commercial Row and Lake St. I gathered up a few each of the 10¢, 25¢, 50¢, \$1 and \$5 denominations and on the bottom of the box was a lone \$25 chip which I added to my windfall. Apparently, someone (maybe Bill) kept all the twenty-fives so I figured I really had a rare one. Anyway, my adventure in the tunnel was one I'll never forget. Later, I remember talking to an old Chinese Keno writer at Harolds Club and she told me about a Chinese casino called the Star which was located on Lake Street in the 1930's. She said there were tunnels that ran underneath the club that were used as Opium dens. Supposedly, there was access to these tunnels along the banks of the nearby Truckee River.

Anyway, next to the Overland on Center Street was the old Greyhound Bus depot. There was a small casino in it called the Oak Room which had a twenty-one table and some slots. The owner was a man by the name of Al Figoni who also owned several other drinking and gambling establishments in the downtown area. I used to go over to the Oak Room on my breaks and eventually became friends with him. One night after buying some of the Oak Room chips, Al took me into the

basement. Among all the junk down there were chips from Colbrandt's Flamingo Room - a joint located on Virginia Street in the 1950's. They were all fifty and hundred dollar denominations and were scattered all over the floor. I gathered all that were in sight. That Al sure was a great guy.



This shot shows Commercial Row in July of 1970 all of which was owned by Pick Hobson. Not shown on the left was Bill's Corner Bar and the Cosmo Club next to the SP Club. All three were eventually combined into the Cosmo Club owned by Pick. The Dormio was the sight of a filming of an episode of "Then Came Bronson". Aggies Bar was to the right of the Depot Bar. Next to that was a pawn shop that was converted to restaurant in the Overland. Clearly visible is the fifth floor ledge of the Overland where I took a walk one Winter's night. One the extreme left is the second half of my truck. The infamous tunnel ran the full length of this block.



This picture was shot in July of 1970. It shows some of the bars on East Second Street between Center and Lake Street. In the center building, on the alley, is Al's bar owned by my friend Al Figoni. Also visible is the Star Hotel.



Shown here is the Columbo and Toscano Hotel on Lake Street. Basin Street was a strip joint and I remember a Barboot game there. Before that it was the Mint Club and before that the China Mint. One day the owner gave me a handful of the obsolete Mint Club chips. I also got a five dollar China Mint off the "Do not take" board in the cashier's cage at the Overland.

When the new Holiday Inn on Sixth Street opened in 1975 it contained a small casino that was fairly well hidden from the public. One entered through a door toward the rear of the hotel lobby and there wa a small, cramped room with a couple tables and some slot machines. It made me think of an illegal joint somewhere back during prohibition.

Anyway, the man dealing the dice game was a gentleman by the name of Howard McMullen who owned Mac's Club on South Virginia Street during the 1950's. I told him I was a dice dealer at the Overland and we hit it off right away. He told me during the heyday of Mac's Club that Bill Harrah was in the process of building up business at his downtown casino and was a regular customer there. He would come into Mac's and take a seat at the bar. After getting the attention of the bartender he would put his index finger under his chin and wag it back and forth. This was a signal to set up the bar and announce to all that they were drinking on Bill Harrah. Apparently, this was a tactic that Bill used in many of the bars around Reno and I guess it worked judging form the success of Harrah's. Funny what it takes to become successful. Later, Mac gave me several of his old chips plus some plastic drink tokes that were used at his place.


Another of my good friends was Karl Berge at the Silver Club in Sparks. I remember the original Silver Club as being a small operation with a paycheck wheel and five or six slot machines. Karl originally had three partners but eventually bought them out. Later he expanded and was always on the casino floor promoting business. "Hey, Hey, Hey, It's jackpot time at the Silver Club", he would chant as he walked the slot area greeting customers. He was a real hustler and it paid off.

Anyway, Karl used to work at the old Sahati's Country Club at Lake Tahoe and he had a box full of old chips from there that he kept in a back room at the Silver Club. Periodically, he would take me back there and shake the box.


Then he would reach in a grab a chip or two and give them to me. It would drive me nuts that he wouldn't let me look in the box but I was happy to get a new addition to my collection, nevertheless.


Over the years I made many friends in Reno and acquired many chips. It was a great time in my life and I'll always remember the old clubs and the great times I had.





ANTIQUE COLLECTIBLES by Dale Seymour & Ken Craig

New finds of antique gambling chips seem to be "coming out of the woodwork" - - - or should that be "coming out of the internet". Recent chip finds are pushing collectors to get with it on their computers. Remember that this column just addresses non-casino chips that were made before 1940.

Jim Myers, from Worthington, Ohio, submitted four advertising chips for coding: 1) a hot-stamped "Dennison" on an H-mold clay chip, 2) a hot-stamped "Hollytex Carpet Mills" on a paper chip, 3) a hot-stamped "Nash Car Is a Sure Bet" on a paper chip, and 4) a Harley-Davidson paste on label on a rubber chip. It is our opinion that only the Harley-Davidson chip qualifies as a pre-1940 chip. That chip and its new code are shown below. By the way, don't generalize that all paper chips are worthless to collectors. Some paper chips were made nearly 100 years ago and some advertising paper chips are quite rare.


Al Zaika from Bellmawr, NJ informs us that the Giant/Big Chief Bonus chip (coded PZ–BG on p. 341 of the revised edition of Antique Gambling Chips) is not a gambling chip. Giant/Big Chief was a supermarket chain based in Pennsylvania. The chips were issued as a bonus when you purchased a set amount of groceries. The chips were redemable as payment for future food purchases. The Thrifti chip (PZ–BC) on the same page was used the same way. Thanks Al, we shall "de frock" those chips.





Chips not made for playing poker.


Jim Myers found a nice new chip depicting a horse head. This chip is very similar in artistic style to a few chips we beleive were some of the first clay chips ever made. PA-KY Horse Head Engraved/ v:g








on paper or rub white chalk accross the design and photocopy the chip. Ralph's engraved chip submissions are shown below:

Three new inlaid finds that are not simply variations and therefore need their own code are shown below:



Inlaid chips were commonly made in up to twelve colors with dark inlaid designs on a white center or with white inlaid designs on an entire dark chip. Rarely do you find an inlaid chip with a white design on a colored inlaid center. One such chip, a new code, is shown above.

ANTIQUE COLLECTIBLES (Continued)

Phil Flannagan of Lebanon, Ohio found a very unusual poker chip set recently. The chips were clay with a circular mother-of-pearl inlay. An odd combination to say the least. Sort of like those VW's they made with the Rolls Royce grill. We classify this in the category of "Unusual" chips --- so no new code for them. In one of these articles someday we will devote the entire article to "unusuals". Speaking of unusuals, what is the "My Break" clay chip? Maybe for shooting pool.

And now for the "Boomers"! The larger the ivory chip and the larger the denomination the more valuable the chip. The three chips below, found by John Benedict from Florida, are large and very special. The twenty-fives are 42 and 45 millimeters in diameter. The fifty measures a whopping 47 millimeters. The values given are intended to be consistent with the codes in the revised edition of Antique Gambling Chips. Due to appreciation and increased interest in ivory chip collecting, the value of these chips and others on this page are considerably higher.




Clay chip with an inlaid mother-of-pearl center



* It is important to remember that the unit value of a single chip find will have a much higher value than the unit value of a set of chips. If you read my last column I suspect you realized that I was not too happy with The Lodge in Blackhawk, Colorado. I am glad to report that things have changed. George Turner, the head of the Colorado Gaming Commission stepped in and stopped the sale of the Grand Opening sets of \$31 face for \$100. I guess you could say he had a little help. The electronic chippers bombarded him with complaints. There was also some snail mail from president Archie Black on behalf of the CC>CC and other non electronic chippers. At first Mr. Turner advised us he could not help. A Colorado chipper by the name of Douglas Knight kept after him. Allen Banick and Lee Bruton also did not take no for an answer. Mr. Turner invited chippers to air their complaints at a Colorado GCB meeting in Central City on August 21st. I was trying to find a way to get there when Doug emailed me with the news. WE HAD WON. The Lodge sets had been pulled, and would not be sold for \$100. Chippers can make a difference if they stick together. I salute every one who took part in the assault on The Lodge. This was no minor skirmish. It was a full frontal attack. It was more chippers with the same mind set, than I ever seen. Nice work, chippers!

I applaud the Colorado GCB and George Turner in particular, for their efforts. This was a good decision on their part. There is no Colorado law that forbids the sale of chips, over face. There should be, as there is such a law in other gaming states. We won the battle, but the was will probably go on. Other casinos will try to hold us up. We must be prepared to not take chips at over face prices. There are too many chips to be had at face value. The Ute Casino in Colorado is preparing to do the same thing, per their marketing director. I have doubts that the Colorado GCB can help with this one, as it is an Indian casino. If one chipper buys one set, our efforts against The Lodge, will be for naught.

I need to make it perfectly clear, that you or I should not hold a grudge against The Lodge. I ordered The Lodge rack chips this morning. This was a business decision on their part. They were doing what they perceived as best for their business. We did what we perceived, as best for our business.

As of this writing, Bob Orme and Lee Bruton are going to attend a Colorado GCB meeting on September 18th, to further our case. Our intentions are to lobby the GCB for a permanent ruling on this subject.

I think we should mount a campaign against the air lines, next. United Airlines wanted \$1,440 for a round trip Las Vegas to Denver ticket because of only three day notice. Is that over face or what?

Gambling at Madeira Island

Madeira Island



Madeira Island is an island in the Atlantic Ocean, which together with Porto Santo and Desertas islands form an archipelago named Madeira Archipelago, situated between 32°25' and 33° 7'N latitudes and 7° 30' and 8° 7' longitudes, at west Lisbon.

In July 2nd 1419, two great portuguese navigators- João Gonçalves Zarco and Tristão Vaz Teixeira, on behalf of Infante D.Henrique, seeking a land which people said could be seen from Porto Santo in clear sunshined days, sighted an island to which they named Madeira, due to its features and its exuberant vegetation, almost impossible to penetrate, such was the density of its luxuriant shrubs and trees.

Madeira island has a vulcanic origin, highly mountainous, full of peaks, here and there interrupted by valleys and streams, which give it a very picturesque feature and look.

Due to the beauty of its landscape, of its agreable climate, of its vegetation so various, rich and magnificent, and also due to its excellent touristic structures, Madeira island is no doubt a touristic desired destiny, very appreciated throughout the whole year.

Funchal, its capital city, is a very nice pretty town, constructed near the bay of the same name. It is constructed in an amphiteatre way, at south of the island, with very high mountains at its rear, almost totally arbored and cultivated. Looked from the sea, one can observe a magnificent view.

Madeira Archipelago is, and has always be, part of Portugal.

The Gambling

Madeira island, better speaking, its capital city - Funchal -, was ever since the first portuguese legislation on gambling activity, going back to 1927, designated as Permanent Exclusive Area for Games of Chance and Misfortune. However, and benefiting from its strategical position, considering the fact it was a supply passage port for all shipping activity, also due to the strong british influence of all inhabitants going back to the XVIII century, and finally due to the fact of being a very important touristic zone ever since the last century, gambling activity in Funchal is much more ancient.

The first known registrations on gambling in Funchal go back to 1482.

In this issue, we shall stress, however, gambling in casinos and clubs in Funchal as from the XIX century on, trying to give a real global idea of its history and to reproduce most used and known tokens and chips ever since those times.

Several registrations from the beginning of the XIX century account for the fact that illegal gambling in Funchal was commonly spread, being several fines applied due to gambling activities.

Even considering houses duly licensed for the practice of legal gambling, games chance and misfortune were also played. In this group, private were included establishments, clubs and associations with some responsability within Madeiran culture.

This kind of houses growed rapidly and profusely in Funchal, and in 1891 the Governor granted a license for the practice of legal games to clubs, such as CLUB RECREIO MUSICAL and CLUBE UNIÃO, and to a group of billiard establishments, owned by Ferreira Carvalho. In 1898, the same happened to six private institutions and in 1900 to some clubs, such as Club Recreio Instrução and CLUBE RESTAURAÇÃO, and also to seven private persons.

Gambling vice spread all over the island, in spite of all repressive initiatives from local authorities.

In the early XX century, one could easily confirm that during the twenties gambling houses in Funchal were commonly and profusely spread throughout the island.

In 1920, the Internal Minister established that Madeiran Governor should in fact repress and restrain gambling in the island. In May of the same year, some actions took place with the timide aprehension of roulette tables and similars. As a matter of fact, authority agents due to their non initiative, were envolved in a suspicious environment and atmosphere. There were even some people stating that some illegal gambling houses were running under legal authority protection.

Others had more than one back door, and as soon as police agents entered the main entrance, gamblers slipped through the back door. Besides informers

inside police organisation, gambling houses had vigilants, which informed gamblers of any eventual authority movement or action.

In 1921, Madeiran Governor ordered the Police Comissary to proceed to a quarrel to the under mentioned gambling houses: José de Sousa, Dafundo, MONTE ESTORIL, CLUBE RESTAURAÇÃO, Hotel Benfica, as well to some houses situated at Rua das Murças.

From these police actions, only some arrestments were made at Hotel Benfica, and not even eventual gambling money or equipment were confiscated and aprehended.

This attitude from the police agents who avoid to perform their legal duty, more than suspicious, led to the disciplinary prosecutions of such agents.

Gambling houses kept on running, in spite of determined periodical orders from the Internal Ministery, aiming to the repression of illegal gambling.

By the end of the past century, and the beginning of this one, the CASINO DA QUINTA VIGIA was operational and installed in a farm with the same name. During that very same period, another casino was in activity at Monte (situated in the mountains near Funchal): the CASINO PERESTRELO.

Also at Monte, which was in the early XX century a privileged summer resort for the rich Funchal's families to spend holidays, one could find roulettes tables running in every existing hotel in that area, namely BELOMONTE and MONTE PALACE.

Not taking into consideration some private clubs, we have no doubts when stating that as from the early twenties, nights at Funchal city were decisively marked by CASINO PAVÃO and CASINO VICTORIA's activity.

The former operated its activity at Quinta Pavão, while the latter, owned by Empresa do Casino Victoria, worked in a building placed at Rua Alexandre Herculano, and was later transformed into Victoria Cinema.

These two abovementioned casinos were, in their golden times, the most in, excellent amusement places at Funchal. Several references in the press, account for these statements and confirm our judgement.

Some os these news are even printed in the most prosperous and powerful community language of these days: english.

Beneficent balls, art exhibitions, gala fency balls, charity parties, luxurious receptions offered to the steamship's passengers which often entered Funchal's port, musical concerts.....Eveything gave a special glow to the life of these casinos, where gambling was an active growing activity, is spite of the statements and convictions of the Internal Ministery, pointing out to the non tolerance of the Government towards gambling in Madeira.

Still in this decade, more precisely in 1927, one can find references made to MONUMENTAL CASINO. In February 24th of the same year, Casino Victoria was overthrown by a fire, being then several gambling rooms totally destroyed, as well as ball rooms, along with its valuable and rich furniture.

Gambling legalization

With the regulation of gambling within national territory by the end of 1927, the Permanent Area of all Games of Chance and Misfortune at Funchal is finally instituted, being gambling thenceforward authorized to work under concessions previously granted by tender bids, in an exclusive basis.

In 1928, the Companhia de Turismo da Madeira (Madeiran Tourism Company) came to light, being António Vieira de Castro its main shareholder. Its main goal was to run for the awarding of game's exclusivity in Madeira. This company was awarded the concession for the exploration of General Gambling in Madeira, through an official publication in

June 23rd of that year, stating the heads of the agreeement and all the clauses laid down by the Contract signed and agreed with the Portuguese Government. CASINO DA MADEIRA started then, and by means of the above proceedings, its gambling activity.

Considering the fact it was a permanent gambling area, being therefore the awarded company forced to a continuous and effective activity, it soon felt some difficulties on the running and rentability of its exploration, once gambling was too much dependent on a fluctuant population, closely associated to the coming and going of ships.

In October 29th 1932, tehe Government, taking into consideration that the Madeiran Tourism Company has closed its Casino doors, because it was in no conditions of keeping the exploration running in the terms and clauses in force by the Agreement opportunately signed, withdrawn its gambling concession.

It then makes a public offer for the gambling exploration, including all games of chance and misfortune, for the permanent gambling madeiran area, intended to cover the period between December 1st 1932 and December 1st 1933.

The CASINO DA MADEIRA re-opens in December 9th 1932, being the correspondent award given to the Sociedade de Turismo da Madeira (Madeiran Tourism Society) up to March 31st 1937. Its installations kept on functioning at Ouinta Vigia.


However, as a result of the problems hereinabove stated, the gambling exploration still faced some difficulties.

Deeply concerned with the tourism situation in the archipelago, to which the gambling activity is closed and stricly attached to, in 1936 the Portuguese Government establishes the Madeiran Tourism Zone, therefore supporting some measures to its real implementation and improvement.

Similarly to some important decisions taken, aiming to the tourism improvement (in that year about 112.000 tourists entered Funchal's port), the government also establishes the Sociedade de Turismo 1936 Ltda. (1936 Touristic Company Inc.), which thenceforward claims to itself the control of CASINO DA MADEIRA's exploration, still situated at Quinta Vigia. As from that moment on, the casino acts directly under government orders, being its gains and other income distributed to Charity Homes at Funchal.

While Quinta Vigia undertook several improvement works, aiming to the reopening as a casino, CASINO DA MADEIRA re-started its gambling exploration on January 4th 1936, in the Casino victoria's facilities, which in the meantime were reconstructed.


For some months, and in a temporary basis, it runned its activity there, after which it moved again to Quinta Vigia, after improvements works were completed.

CASINO DA MADEIRA, with its permanent orchestra giving a special glow to tourist nights, was provided with a restaurant, an american bar and several gambling rooms, where one could play roulette, baccarat and chemin de fer.

However, and in spite all improvements made, madeiran gambling activity would not be totally and definitively established and working in a continuous basis.

Due to the II Great World War, and the consequent decrease on the tourism and travelling flow, the regular gambling activity, suffered a severe stroke and would meet dark days.

We strongly believe, that is not until 1956 that CASINO DA MADEIRA works in a regular gambling basis, always and ever situated at Quinta Vigia.

As from these days forward, tourism became regular throughout the year, due to promise regarding the constrution of Saint Catarine's airport, thus bringing an enormous increase in air trips.

In 1968, CASINO DA MADEIRA was functionning at Quinta Vigia, opened from 16 p.m. to 3 a.m., with shows every night, international artists and local folklore.

Provided with a restaurant service, club and gambling saloons, it presented, during summer period, several shows, restaurant and club services in its magnificent park. In its gambling great room, one could still play roulette, baccarat and french bank.

Madeiran gambling is as from 1968, a concession of I.T.I., being CASINO DA MADEIRA presently functioning in a building specially constructed for that purpose, with an architectural appearance designed by Arqt° Niemeyer, and attached to Casino Park Hotel. This touristic assemblage was built in available land at Quinta Vigia.

The Casino is still an amusement reference point to all amused and leisure nights at Funchal, with its restaurant, daily shows and its gambling rooms, where one can play european games as well as american, namely: french bank, american roulette, black jack, craps, baccarat, chemin de fer and slot machines. Although designated as Gambling Zone, by means of a legislation published in 1989, Porto Santo Island has still no interested parties, either private or public, in its concession.

CLUB FUNCHALENSE

This club was set up on 3.12.1839, and its articles of association were approved by the General Meeting on 18.12.76 and by the Civil Governor on 16.2.77. It existed for approximatly 60 years and was housed in thr Carmo from where it moved to a palace in the Rua dos Ferreiros where it remained until is was dissolved. Members came from the better-off classes only, although leading traders were also admitted to this club. Shopkeepers and other traders who had shops were not accepted as members. The club was famous for its balls and "soirées" and all illusterous visitors to the island were received here in great style.

Chips: There are ivory chips with the figures 1, 2, 5 and 10, which date of issue was 1896. These chips had a value of 100, 200, 500 and 1000 Reis (Kings) respectively.

Note: The currency in Portugal during monarchy was REIS. With the Republic implantation in 1910, the portuguese currency became ESCUDO, instead of ancient REIS.

CASINO DA QUINTA VIGIA


The Quinta Vigia, one of the Madeira's most beautiful "quintas" (farms), originally bellonged to the wealthy Englishman Richard Davies, who came to the island at the beginning of the 19th century. Queen Adelaide of England lived there, as did the Empress Elizabeth of Austria and the Archiduke Maximilian, later Emperor of Mexico etc.

CLUB RESTAURAÇÃO

The club was set up in May, 1879 in the premises of the defunct Clube União in the Avenida Manuel Arriaga, formerly the Praça da Constituição. Its articles of association were approved by Order of the Civil Governor on August, 12, 1889 and amended by the General Meeting in February 21, 1897. After it was dissolved, it was replaced by the "Novo Clube Restauração" which occuped the same premises, its articles of association being approved on February 27, 1980.

WEST VIRGINIA'S NOTORIOUS ROUTE 30 GAMBLING STRIP OF THE 1950'S by Ray Gartner R-1054

At the most northern point of the West Virginia panhandle between the Ohio River and the Pennsylvania State Line there is a 4 mile section of U.S. Route 30 that crosses the State at its narrowest point. Throughout the 50's and early 60's the section of Route 30 that is east of Chester, West Virginia saw a number of Bars and Restaurants housing illegal gambling spring up. The better known establishments were called, at one time or another, The Rio Club, Cactus Bar, The Carriage, Jungle Inn, The Hilltop, The Red Dog, Mountaineer Club and the Tri State Social Club.

The largest and by far the most elegant of these Clubs was known as Club 30. My research concentrated on this Club because of the many stories floating around regarding its inception and its ultimate demise.

The origin of this Casino began in 1950 by a man by the name of Charles Teemer, who was a former manager of the Sands Sousi Hotel and Casino in Havana, Cuba. He with several local acquaintances formed a Corporation and leased a large block building off Route 30 within a half mile of the Pennsylvania line. The property was located a couple 100 yards back from the highway and was completely surrounded by acres of woodlands. The building was remodeled into a first class Restaurant and Nite Club. He also built into the rear of the building a very plush casino that had its entrance through the Restaurant.

As indicated by the local papers the day after the raid that closed the Club permanently June 12, 1957, it was quite an elegant place. Excerpts described the area as a picturesque panorama adjacent to a crystal lake upon which white ducks swam. A large area was black topped for the parking lot with a cadre of teenagers standing by to valet park the many influential patrons from the surrounding cities of Pittsburgh, PA, Wheeling, WV, and Youngstown, OH. Employees wore special monogramed jackets. Management people wore tuxedos. The floors were all carpeted. Meals and drinks were provided free to the gamblers. The Nite Club had adorned its name on all the dishes. Even the elaborate metal ash trays had Mr. Teemer and the Club 30 name cast into the

metal.

This Club operated openly for a number of years. Whenever an occasional raid was being considered, the Club would receive a phone call. The gambling equipment would then be loaded into a Van and driven to a hidden location until the raid or threat had passed. It would then return the equipment within a couple of days. The Nite Club and Restaurant never did close down. Business at the Club was especially brisk during the racing season at Waterford Park Race track located nearby at Newell, West Virginia.

The raid that finally closed the Club was instigated at the State level after a new group of politicians were elected. It took 10 state troopers about 2 hours to gather up the gambling equipment. As it progressed patrons entering the parking area were told that the business was closed due to a power failure. This despite the fact that dazzling neon lights lighted up the building. Twelve key employees were arrested. The other employees and some odd 150 patrons were not cited. The raid netted 5 Dice Tables, 3 Roulettes, 6 Black Jack and 2 Chuck-A-Luck Tables. Nine Slot Machines were also seized.

All the confiscated equipment was later burned on Court orders and the operators ended up losing their choice location. However, the fines by the local authorities were minimal, ranging from 50 to 100 dollars each on charges of exhibiting gambling equipment.

Although the raid was a big setback to these operators in lost equipment and their location; it was soon apparent that organized gambling was not going to end, just yet, in the panhandle. The group still had money, their contact, and a large prosperous clientele.

Within a couple of months Teemer and the group leased a new building within a mile of their old location. However, this location could not begin to match the glamorous surroundings of the former Club 30. The building was smaller and built into a sloping hill in a rather congested area just 50 some feet from the highway. Nearly all the parking for the Casino was located behind the hill and out of sight. The ground floor was occupied by a Bar and Restaurant called the Paddock Club. The Casino was called the Jockey Club and was located on the second floor. It's entrance was at the rear of the building on the second level. Valet parking was

essential.

Although it was just as plushy inside as the former Club, there no longer was a night club or gourmet restaurant and all the glitz of the former location were now missing. This new Casino did operate with impunity for another 4 plus years before Mr. Teemer and his organization were permanently put out of business. It took the FBI and the enactment, in September, 1961, of a new Federal Law that prohibited traveling interstate to operate a gambling casino.

The raid by the FBI occurred February 15, 1963 on a Saturday evening and was spectacular in its size and scope. But the most interesting aspect of this raid was the ruse used by the FBI to catch the casino operators completely off their guard. At about 10 pm a group of 4 state troopers showed up at the entrance. They were denied entry, so they proceeded to batter in the double bolted entrances with axes. By the time they broke through, there wasn't any gambling going on. The place was almost empty of gambling tables and what few gambling chips and paraphernalia that were being used were now well hidden away. The troopers appeared disappointed since it was obvious that the Club was tipped off that a possible raid was coming. The troopers did confiscate a Crap, a Black Jack and a Chuck-A-Luck table. They issued a citation to the manager for exhibiting gambling devices and then left.

After the raid, the operators felt that the night was still young, the expected raid was over, and most of the night's clientele had not arrived yet. So it was decided to call for their gambling equipment to be trucked back in the same night.

Six hours later, however, shortly after 4 am, the Feds showed up with a large force of FBI Agents and completely surprised the operators. There was now no delay in gaining entry, since the earlier Troopers had made sure that they battered in the entrance doors beyond repair for that night. They rushed in with enough agents to catch all the employees red-handed.


They arrested everyone connected with the Casino - 13 "Associates" and 44 other "co-conspirators". A school bus was on hand to transport most of these people to court arraignments. Over 34 thousand dollars was confiscated from the tables and the cage. A nearly full drawer of pledged jewelry and all the gambling chips and paraphernalia

were also scooped up. A large moving van was used to carry off 3 more Crap Tables, 6 Black Jack Tables, a Roulette and another Chuck-A-Luck Table. A large number of Slot Machines were also removed. The next day Mr. Teemer was arrested at his home in Hollywood, Florida and returned to West Virginia. This time the operators were prosecuted on inter-state commerce in gambling. If convicted under the new federal law they faced long penitentiary terms.

The raid did accomplish another unforseen Now that the federal authorities were result. involved, all large scale gambling ended on the Strip. Today, both of the buildings formerly occupied by Club 30 and the Jockey Club are still there. Both are empty and in poor condition. The spacious parking lot at the old Club 30 is now filled with a motley collection of Trailer Homes in its still picturesque woodland setting. All the other Bars/Restaurants except one, are now abandoned or converted to other types of businesses. I did talk with about 20 old timers who worked or played at the various casinos, but located very few chips that were carried home.
