



For those of you who have recovered from your recent experiences at the Annual CC>CC Convention, you can have another crack at a similar experience during the Annual Convention of the American Numismatic Association in Chicago. This granddaddy of all coin conventions will be held at the Rosemont Convention Center August 10th through the 15th. An informal CC>CC meeting will be held on Saturday, August 14th. You need not be an A.N.A. member to attend this national convention.... and admission is free.

EX-MEMBER LARRY EASTMAN BARRED

By unanimous action of the club's outgoing Board of Officers, former club member Larry Eastman has been barred from applying for future club membership. Mr. Eastman pleaded guilty on April 21st to a misdemeanor theft charge and was sentenced to six months in jail. The jail sentence was suspended in consideration of a \$2,250 payment of restitution to Howard Herz of Gaming Archeology for the theft committed at the Herz' home of an unrecovered \$1000 Caesars baccarat check. Eastman stated under oath, that he threw the stolen piece down a hill in front of his house after learning that the Douglas County District Attorney had issued an arrest warrant. The missing check has not been found. Mr. Eastman has indicated that he's attempted to recover the missing check with a metal detector, but has been unsuccessful so far. An additional \$1,000 restitution payment was ordered by the court to be made by Eastman to club member Jerry Wall as reimbursement for additional Ceasars checks Eastman had sold to Wall which have since been returned to the rightful owner, Gaming Archaeology. Mr. Eastman has until August 16th to make full restitution as well as an additional \$270 in fines to cover court costs.

Checking Out What's New in the CC>CC Library

A Review of new books & magazines, plus a report on Library use by club members by Robert Pardue (CH-003) – Club Librarian

New Additions this Quarter

Two (2) copies of the Ralph Pollack book "Casino Chips & Tokens of the Dutch Caribbean – Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao and St. Maarten" were donated to the library by Mr. Pollack. Published in 1988, this book is a thorough and well-researched guide of chips and tokens used from 1959-1998 on these four Caribbean islands. Each island's casinos are outlined with dates, locations and descriptions of many of the casinos. Over the years, there may have been several casino names associated with one hotel. As ownership changed, and casinos and/or hotels opened and closed, the number of chips on these islands has increased. Pollack does and excellent job of unravelling the web of casino names and dates of use, and relating these names back to their appropriate location.

The 116-page Pollack book contains a number of color plates with the chips illustrated (reduced size) in full color. Caribbean chip & token collectors will surely find this book to be a useful resource.

The "1999 American Casino Guide", by Steve Bourie, published annually by Casino Vacations, is a handy reference to learn more about the currently-open casinos in the United States. I purchased the book and donated it to

the club library for use as a companion reference to other gaming and chip guides. For instance, if you want to know more about a casino you've sourced in The Chip Rack or another guide, simply look up all the location, size, games offered, and lots more information in this "1999" guide. Maps of each state, plus basic information on playing all the games, makes this a great companion for planning a gaming-oriented trip, too.

The Library has recieved its first 2 issues (May 1999 and June 1999) of "The Numismatist", the magazine of the ANA. As an affiliate club of the ANA, we should continue to receive this magazine in the future.

Last but not least, we now have a copy of the May 1998 Cigar Aficionado magazine article titled "Chips Off the Old Block", reprinted from their website. 
Library Actitivies



FOUR EDUCATIONAL SEMINARS CONDUCTED AT CONVENTION 99

The 11th annual Casino Chips & Gaming Tokens Collectors Club convention saw an expanded program of educational seminars for Club members.

Two of the programs were held on the first day of the convention, June 17, with one seminar on each of the following days. The first, Silver Strike Tokens, was held at 8:30 am on Thursday. An attempt was made to conduct all educational forums during hours the convention show was not open, allowing participation by dealers and by members who wanted to attend the show rather than other programs.

The Silver Strike Tokens forum, led by Mary Lou Waterbury and Jack Haddock, concluded with the formation of the Club's newest, and by no means smallest, chapter: the Silver Strikers Chapter of CC>CC, with an initial membership of about 50!

On Thursday afternoon, Peter Nathan convened the second public meeting of the World Workshop committee he chairs. The committee's purpose is to devise and propose a standardized numbering system for chips and tokens regardless of origin. Peter, Bob Ginsburg, and Ralph Pollack each made presentations, and the committee agreed to meet again at the convention to proceed with its work.

Friday morning saw an educational session entitled "Cyberchipping: Chipping on the Net." Panelists Marty Kaplan, Neal Silverman, and Michael Knapp discussed the opportunities available to chip and token collectors on the Worldwide Web, access to various sites, and how to become involved in cyberchipping.

Greg Susong, who was called away for a family emergency, could not participate on the panel as scheduled, but he had compiled an informative and comprehensive color pamphlet explaining how to navigate the Internet, sites of interest to chip and token collectors, auction sites, and web procedures. His pamphlet was distributed, and helped all members in attendance.

The final educational program of the convention repeated last year's successful format: a question and answer session called "Ask the Masters." Panelists Mel Jung, Allan Myers, Chuck Tomarchio and Michael Knapp each presented initial thoughts for relatively new collectors, then opened the floor to questions from those in attendance.

The questions were varied and interesting. Some were of benefit to new collectors, but many were thought provoking, even to experienced collectors.

CC>CC 11th ANNUAL MEETING, CONVENTION 99

The annual meeting of the Casino Chips & Gaming Tokens Collectors Club was called to order by President Archie Black at 7:40 pm, June 17, 1999 at the Orleans Hotel and Casino, Las Vegas, Nevada.

President Black introduced the officers to the 93 Club members in attendance. Secretary Michael Knapp moved to adopt the minutes of the 1998 annual meeting, published in Casino Chip and Token News, Vol. 11, No. 4. After a second, the motion carried unanimously.

A report was made to the membership and distributed by Treasurer Chuck Tomarchio. During the year 1998, the Club's budget exceeded \$127,000. It spent more than it took in, losing a total of \$1,558. The Club's finances are healthy, though, and no dues increases or member benefit cutbacks are planned. A motion was made to adopt the Treasurer's report, was seconded, and was passed unanimously.

Membership Officer Jim Steffner reported on the status of membership for the year. From June of 1998 to June of 1999, the Club gained a net of 270 additional members, bringing the active total to 2,119. In the 11 year history of the Club, 4,227 members have joined, with about half of those being current members in good standing. Due in large part to the anniversary date renewal system which Membership Officer Steffner has put in place, and to his followup, renewal rates are running at about 77%. The Club has members in every state (with CA, NV, NJ, NY and TX being the top five), and in nine foreign countries.

Convention Chairman Wayne Thompson reported on the preparations and status of the 1999 convention. On the first day of the convention, 218 non-members attended the show and paid admission. Additional non-member attendance came from casino industry employees, who were admitted without charge upon display of an identification card or invitation from an officer.

Chairman Thompson indicated that the location and date for the 2000 convention are not yet settled, but are under discussion. The new board will be making the final determination based on negotiations with at least three hotels, one of which is the Orleans.

Secretary Knapp reported on the results of the balloting to approve an amendment to the Club's Constitution, which all members in good standing received prior to the convention. A total of 480 ballots were cast, with 7 being invalidated because no choice was checked although the ballots were signed. The amendment passed by a vote of 452 to 21.

Secretary Knapp also reported on the status of the Club's chapters. During the past year, four new chapters were formed, and one chapter dissolved, bringing the total number of chapters in good standing to 11. The newest chapter, which submitted its application to the Secretary 15 minutes before the annual meeting was called to order, is the Silver Strikers Chapter, formed with more than 50 members at the convention! The other new chapters this year are N.Y. Metro, N.Y. State, and Mid-America. In addition, the current chapters are: Atlantic City (the largest chapter, with over 200 members), Floridian, Great Lakes, Nor-Cal-Nev, Southern California, Southern Nevada, and Texas (which changed its name and scope from the Houston Chapter this year).

President Black announced the Chip of the Year (Excalibur) and Token of the Year (Golden Gate \$10 silver strike) awards, although neither casino sent representatives to receive their awards.

Recognition awards were presented to Greg Susong (top recruiter of the year), C. T. Rodgers (Club advertising manager), Kregg Herz (magazine editor), Kevin Norris (design of the Club convention chip and medal), Jim Reilly (Claims Director), Bob Pardue (Librarian), Phil Jensen (best magazine article of 1998), and the current officers.

President Black then administered the oath of office to the three new officers: President David Sarles, Secretary Barry Weintraub, and Treasurer Nate Pincus, and passed the gavel to President Sarles.

After general remarks by the new President, and some general discussion, the meeting was adjourned until the convention in the year 2000.

Her understanding and support has enabled him to spend much of his free time collecting and helping the hobby. She has become active as a volunteer at our National Convention and she occasionally surprises her husband when she throws out such terms as "hot

PRESIDENT CASINO BROADWATER RESORT LAST OF THE TRUE GREAT SOUTHERN RESORTS

The President Casino Broadwater Resort, one of the last great Southern resorts, shares 260 acres with the ancient live oak trees along the Mississippi Gulf Coast--Playground of the South!!

The Broadwater Beach Hotel opened it's doors in 1939 with 44 guest rooms and cottages. For the next 19 years, the hotel was owned and operated by Peter Martin, Sr. After Martin's death in 1958, Joe Brown (Yes, the same Joe W. acquired the Broadwater. Brown known from the Horseshoe Club in Las Vegas, Nevada). His wife, Dorothy, became actively interested in the hotel and the construction of new units. Taking over the running of the hotel after her husband's death in 1960 and adding an additional 46 units.

Under Dorothy Brown's watch, the Broadwater became "the finest resort, sports complex, and convention facility in the South". Boasting 360 rooms, cottages, and suites. Two swimming pools, two 18-hole championship golf courses, and the largest covered marina in the South. The J.E.C. Corporation purchased the Broadwater in 1992. At the same time Broadwater Resort combined with the Broadwater East Tower (formerly the Grande Biloxi) and the Broadwater Inn (formerly Ramada Inn) for a combined total of three hotels with over 800 rooms. In 1992 the President Casino opened in the Broadwater Marina, being the second casino boat to begin operations on the Mississippi Gulf Coast.

The original riverboat casino was replaced by the current 38,000 sq ft facility in 1996 (which was the original Gold Shore Casino barge). In 1997 President Casinos, Inc purchased the Broadwater Beach Resort Broadwater East Tower, Broadwater Marina, and Broadwater Sun Course from the J.E.C. Corp to form the President Casino Broadwater Resort.

Harvey J. Fuller Honored with Life Membership in CC>CC



Harvey J. Fuller was raised and educated in Southern California. His original ambition was to be a rancher, but without financing in the 1930's he declined to become a ranch hand and had a chance to go to college. He majored in speech with the intention of becoming a radio announcer. Before he could begin an announcing career, World War II interrupted and he joined the army air corps. After returning from the war. Harvey joined the Los Angeles police department. From 1946 until his retirement in 1977 he served on the police force gaining a respect for and the knowledge of a good investigator. Where to go and what to ask became second nature to Harvey. As a child he collected street car transfers, a hobby that illustrated his nature as a collector.

During a vacation to the Lake Tahoe area, Harvey and his wife Eleanor visited Harvey's Resort Hotel. While standing in line at the coffee shop they noted a display of a collection of gaming tokens owned by the casino. Eleanor had several tokens in her purse that were not redeemable and on the spot, Harvey Fuller began collecting gaming tokens. As his pursuit of gaming tokens and later gaming chips continued Harvey found that there was a lack of information on where they came from or anything about the clubs that produced them. His natural instincts as a collector and his training as an investigator teamed up to find the information that was lacking. Initially beginning with casinos that issued tokens, he expanded in 1970 to finding information on all clubs that had live gaming.

In an chance encounter at the Senator Hotel in Reno, Harvey Fuller met Howard Herz, curator of the collection kept by Harvey's Resort Hotel. After a continuing correspondence, Harvey's Resort Hotel asked Mr. Fuller to complete a study of the Lake Tahoe casinos. This eventually evolved into a full study of the casinos of Nevada from 1931 to 1991. Fuller compiled a series of notes on casinos in Nevada using official records, newspapers and interviews. By using his well honed detective skills, he compiled the largest and most detailed record of the gaming industry operations in Nevada.

The value of his research lies in his through and tireless dedication to finding the locations and dates of operation of more than 2500 live gaming operations that have come and gone in Nevada. Fuller's work is distinguished by its accuracy.

Harvey Fuller's pioneering work "Fuller's Index of Nevada Gambling Establishments" brought thousands of bits of historical information into a single publication. Fuller's contribution to the hobby of collecting tokens, chips, ashtrays and other gaming artifacts lies in his fundamental research that provides collectors with an historical road map of gaming in Nevada. Harvey Fuller's contributions to the basic understanding of history will serve collectors well in the future.

We have all benefited from his diligence and determination. His legacy to us is the gathering and preservation of a history of gaming. "Clay" / Composition Gaming Checks Gaming Check Distributors



Warner opened a club room supply business under the name *Pioneer Club Supply*. Located at 1063 Howard Street in the Mission district, the company offered a wide range of gaming supplies. The gaming checks offered were made on the generic "diamond-square" mold of the Burt Company of Portland Maine.

A number of checks were produced by Pioneer for Nevada casinos, but most of the company's business was in the San Francisco Bay area and Northern California. Upon the death of Mr. Warner the company was purchased by the an employee who is the present owner. The company was moved to its present address at 5252 Mission Street.



The first listing for T.R. King that we have found appears in the 1924 Kansas City, Missouri telephone book where the company has a line listing and an advertisement in the business section under "playing cards". The address is listed as 616 Main Street with phone number DElaware 0628.

The 1925 KC City directory lists the company at a new address of 206 Admiral Blvd. and a phone number of VIctor 4299. Their business in listed as "novelties". This directory also has an individual listing for T.R. King as a person living at 2516 Montgall Ave, and associates this person with the company of the same name.


The 1926 phone book again lists a T.R. King at the Admiral Blvd. address and also has a business advertisement under playing cards. the 1926 city directory list T.R. King & Co., but now shows M.C. Anderson as the owner.

The 1927 phone books and directory listing are the same and the 1926.

The 1928 city directory lists a new address of 617 Grand Ave. and further lists the principal as (Milton C Anderson). The nature of their business is listed as "novelty mfg."

The 1929 and 1930 phone books continue to list T.R. King & Co. at Grand Ave. and the telephone number remains as VIctor 4299. No listing for T.R. King are found in Kansas City after the 1930 phone book.

In 1929 the United States Playing Card Co. archives record an order for 9,000 chips in 9 colors ordered for T.R. King & Co. Kansas City Mo. - ordered November 27, 1929. this is the first appearance of the large crown mold the T.R. King and we believe the earliest that the company offered custom chips on the large crown mold.



The 1931 Los Angeles city directory lists a

Subsequent listing for the company continue at several addresses in the Los Angeles area to date.

The small crown mold appears to have been developed in the late 1940's as a substitute for the worn out large crown mold. Checks from various casinos indicate that both molds were used simultaneously for a period of time until the large crown became too worn.

For brief period of time the company maintained a Las Vegas office.



Atlantic City in general, continues to cut back on releases of its new chip issues. Other than a complete change of rack chips at Trump Marina, as a result of a name change from Trump Castle quite some time ago, it's been relatively quite in "Vegas by the Sea".

A \$5 "Gambling Legends" chip, (Frank "Buckskin" Leslie) the 8th in their series, was issued by Claridge, one of the A.C.'s more prolific chip issuers recently. This chip had an original production run of 5000 pieces. Due to less than anticipated sales the previous 5000 chip issue, (Bell Starr) the casino ordered 2500 of them destroyed and the next three upcoming issues in the series will also be limited to 2500.



Claridge has also issued a rather attractive \$10 house chip that is available for purchase at only one single roulette table. I understand that the pit bosses discourage use of the chip for placing bets however.



A few weeks prior to Trump Castle chips being replaces with the new Trump Marina issue, Russ Diaz spotted a variation on the old \$5 chip. The green edge inserts are significantly lighter on quite a few of the new found variety.

As my lead-off commentary for this quarter has indicated, Trump Marina issued a completely new rack of \$1, \$2.50, \$5, \$25,. \$100, \$500, \$1,000, and \$5000 chips. This issue, like the Castle issue which preced-

ed, also has a few color variations that some collectors seem to thrive on. Roulette collectors/harvesters are patiently awaiting the appearance of the soon to be introduced new Trump Marina roulette chips.

NEW 50¢ TOKENS AT THE CLARIDGE CASINO HOTEL

The Claridge tokens were manufactured by Roger Williams Mint, the nation's largest private mint.


ATLANTIC CITY CHAPTER HONORS ARCHIE BLACK by Jerry Birl





If you've been to Las Vegas lately and collect silver strikes, you needed to get a armored truck to haul home all your new additions. Ain't it great!!!!!

As collectors, we all want to know how our hobby is doing. Well, checking the results of the last Roadhouse silver strike auction, we find the rarities making new records for high bids. How about this:

\$7 Harveys Tahoe train \$50

\$10 Sierra Sids eagle solid window \$525

\$20 Fitzgeralds Mr. O'Lucky \$60

\$40 Caesars Tahoe Airport strike it rich \$475

\$40 Reno Tahoe Airport strike it rich \$355

\$200 size Sierra Sids 25th anniversary token \$450

This was the 4th silver strike auction for the Roadhouse which has included nearly every Nevada strike including the Treasure Island \$40, Flamingo Rocketts, Circus Circus Las Vegas with Reno clown, McCarren Airport 21 spades, and all of the rare \$7. The casinos recently removing their machines making there silver strikes obsolete include: Harrah's Tahoe; Comstock, Reno,. Silver Smith and Stateline in Wendover. Also, the Riviera Casino in Las Vegas discontinued their machine in June after being one of the original players. They left a legacy of some rare strikes and a short mintage for 1999.

Sierra Sid's got our attention in the north by issuing the four remaining strikes for 1999. With the exception of "Jake", the casino's mascot cartoon character, the series commemorates 6 events very popular in northern Nevada. "Rockin Jake" is for Hot August Nights; "Camel Jake" is for the camel races in Virginia City; "Burning Jake" is for the burning man gathering in northeast Nevada; and "Rodeo Jake", "Balloon Jake", and "Fair Jake" are self explanatory. Along wit being dated 1999, all are original art work and certainly a great set to collect.





Another great set is that of the Hard Rock Cafe in Las Vegas. Four \$20 and four \$10 make up a complete set of collectible guitars. From the north, Harrah's Reno, put three new ones in play; Babe Ruth lifetime batting avg. .342, Babe Ruth Hall of Fame member, and added .999 to the reverse of the genie on the lamp token.



Also, the Reno Hilton put some new designs into play depicting Reno area events. The Atlantis offered new art work commemorating their large flames that now overlook Virginia Street. Las Vegas has been keeping all of us on our toes. 1999 may be a record year for new strikes issued. Two of the newest hotels offer a chance to take home a strike, the Bellagio and the Venetian offer some beauties. All but three casinos have added the .999 to the center silver by summer.

How to Buy a Safe

CRIME & NUMISMATICS

You should consider a variety of features when choosing a safe to protect the collection or inventory you carefully assembled over many years.

OST COLLECTORS, DEALERS and investors do not have a clear understanding of the security necessary to protect their investments from burglary or fire. Secure storage often comes down to choosing between a safe and a safe-deposit box at a bank. If you like the flexibility of a safe in your home or business, there are a number of factors you should consider, whether purchasing one for the first time or replacing an older model.

Cost

WHEN IT COMES to security, you get what you pay for. Safes are not cheap, but then neither is the material you're protecting. Prices of high-security safes range from \$1,000 to \$10,000, depending on size and level of protection. It is up to you, the buyer, to evaluate the relative importance of the options and advantages. Expect fees for de-

Insurance Requirements

livery and installation to vary as well.

TO INSURE THE contents of your safe against burglary, most insurance underwriters advise using an Underwriters' Laboratories (U.L.)-tested, -approved and -labeled product. Carriers also take into consideration the safe's location, and internal or external alarms.

Tool Resistance

THE MOST POPULAR ratings for tool-resistance are the Underwriters' Laboratories TL-15, TL-30, TL-30X6 and TRTL-30X6.

TL-15: resists entry for a minimum of 15 minutes when the door is attacked with common hand tools, picking tools, mechanical or portable electric tools, grinding tools, carbide drills and pressure-applying devices.

TL-30: meets the same standards as the TL-15, but resists entry for a minimum of 30 minutes.



TL-30X6: offers the same, 30-minute minimum protection as the TL-30, but resists attack on all six sides.

TRTL-30X6: provides the same protection as the TL-30X6, but also resists oxygen-fueled cutting or welding torches.

Fire Resistance

UNDERWRITERS' LABORATORIES ALSO tests safes for intense heat and re-cooling, dropping and re-heating. Because paper begins to char at around 450° F., units should maintain an interior temperature of less than 350°. Older safes sometimes contribute to rather than prevent problems. As an example, steel offers very little resistance and even creates an oven effect. Safes made with today's composite materials are more effective in dissipating heat.

When shopping for a safe, look for the U.L. rating that expresses the degree of fire protection desired.

Class A: 4-hour protection at 2,000°F.

Class B: 2-hour protection at 1,850°F.

Class C: 1-hour protection at 1,700°F.

Classes B and C (I - and 2-hour protection) are the most popular ratings in the coin and jewelry industries.

Composition

REMEMBER, OLDER SAFES were designed to withstand attacks by the tools and techniques in existence at the time they were built. Modern, high-tech materials and construction make penetration extremely difficult, if not impossible. Compound nuggets are buried deep within a high-stress, concrete aggregate, and internal drill-deflector bars are sandwiched between extra-hard steel plate.

Size

DO YOU HAVE enough space for trays or storage containers? Room for memo items and consignments? Buying an additional safe later can be costly. Calculate the size you need now, then *double* it! Once you decide to invest in a high-security safe, the next larger size costs little more.

Installation

BEFORE BUYING AND installing your safe, plan carefully where to place it. Location is important for maximum efficiency, as well as access. The size and configuration of halls, doorways and elevators can limit access. Floor-load capacity also limits location possibilities; the ground floor generally is the best choice.

Locks

A VARIETY OF locks provide an equal variety of security, convenience and operation. Some are mechanical while others are electronic. The

latter allow immediate programming and change, and can be connected to a silent alarm. A basic safe usually is equipped with a main combination lock and often an auxiliary key lock.

Boltwork

MOST SAFES ARE manufactured with bolts on the hinged and leadingedge door. High-security safes generally have door bolts in *all directions*. Interior boltwork designed with fewer moving parts offers the best security; multiple welding and gearing have a greater chance of failure.

Re-Lockers

INTERNAL RE-LOCKERS, EITHER active or passive, offer the best security. Hidden in the door, these devices cause bolts to lock in the closed position when a safe is attacked by jackhammer, heavy shock, torches, explosives, or high-speed or carbide-tip drills.

Alarms

MANY SAFES ARE equipped with external alarm contacts; hidden internal alarms often are an option. Internal (private) lockers frequently are included, and heat and motion sensors are useful additions. On some sophisticated systems, an internal microprocessor and modem can activate an alarm via telephone.

Warranty and Service

MANUFACTURERS USUALLY OFFER a one-year warranty on parts, labor and material, but in many instances, suppliers can extend the term. You cannot afford to have a problem opening your safe. A good supplier will offer complete service.

Trade-Ins and Used Safes

YOU MAY CONSIDER keeping your old safe for minimum-security storage. However, if you want to get rid of it, you will probably get a much better price is you sell it yourself. Retailers may offer less because the safe lacks a U.L. label or has an old, plate-steel construction.

So should you buy new or used? Used safes may cost less, but most are not covered by warranty, and bolts and locks in poor condition could cause a *lockout*.

When purchasing a safe, investigate your options and invest a little more money for maximum security. You'll rest easier!



Drawbacks of Safe-Deposit Boxes

- Safe-deposit boxes are sealed upon the death of the owner and their contents held for probate or will disposition.
- Safe-deposit boxes generally are smaller than safes.
- Most banks do not insure against both burglary and fire.
- Contents of safe-deposit boxes can be viewed only in a bank cubicle.
- Safe-deposit boxes cannot be accessed in emergency situations.





"Are Those Really Collectible?" by Vince Mowery R-360

At a recent show, a matronly lady approached our table, stared at the chips in our display case and asked emphatically: "Are those really collectible?" (With strong emphasis on the last word). "Yes ma'm," I said, "this is a rapidly growing hobby with over---."

"Harump," she interrupted, "some people will collect anything!" And she strolled off down the aisle.

A short while later, a young teenager stopped at the table and glanced at the chips. "Look Mom," she shouted, as she turned around, "Pogs! I didn't think anybody collected those any more." "No-no" I said, "these are limited edition, commemorative ch---." "Oh yeah--SOOO!" she muttered as she hurried off to catch-up with her mother.

"Ya-know, I hafta agree with her," said Slots Silverstrike, who was standing close by, "they do look like pogs. And not only that, but with the flood of them that's come out, they're starting to all look alike."

"Funny thing," I said, "last time I talked to Bruce Landing, he said almost the same thing: from a few feet away most limited edition chips are beginning to look alike--kinda boring."

"Not only that," said Slots, "but the Silver Strike makers must be trying to copy the chip factories. In the past couple months, over 80 new silver strike tokens came out; and that's just in Nevada. I'm getting saturated--think I'm gonna give up trying to collect that kind of stuff."

Harry Hardway, who came up to the table about the same time, said "Yeah, I'm getting filled up to here with all these Limited Edition Commemorative chips they keep pouring out. Can't keep up with them, and most are kinda blah. I only collect a few that I like."

"You're the third person this morning that's told me essentially the same thing," I said.
"That may help explain why you see so many LEs on the tables in some casinos. And not just the new ones. Some are well-worn - obviously passed through the hands of many people who didn't consider them collectible."

And I commented: "With the reemergence of More Queens downtown as a chip-factory-outlet one more time, I was reminded of an incident at a show over a year ago where a stranger was looking through page after page of More Queens' chips. Finally, he said to me: 'I went down to their cashier's cage late last night and they kindly helped me - with the help of a hefty tip - to buy this one, and this one, and this set, and this one----,' pointing to many of the LE chips we had on display, some which I thought were long obsolete. Guess they didn't sell-out when they came out, or some have been turned in by disillusioned collectors." Eventually, the stranger closed the books and strolled off with a

smile on his face.

"And how about their set of dog chips," I said. "Boy that's leaving themselves wide open to some wise cracks."

"Reminds me," said Harry, "during my last visit to Laughlin, I saw many posters in the Edgewater advertising New Years chips for 1995,96,97 and 98. Wonder if they just replenished their stock?".

And Slots interrupted: "Yeah - wonder how many more years they might do that? Like New Yawk New Yawk reissuing their Grand Opening chip long after they opened."

"Then down Casino Center Drive at the Flamingo," continued Harry, "I saw unlimited tons of LIMITED EDITION Civil War Commemorative chips on the tables, and they looked like they'd been through the war. Obviously they really weren't much of a collectible to a lot of people."

"Or maybe many collectors just turned theirs in; they are kinda ugly," said Slots. "I know I did!"

"On the same tables they had a bunch of automobile LIMITED EDITION chips," said Harry, "and they all looked like wrecks. Obviously, since they came out long ago, not many people thought they were collectible. Cars have probably been the most commemorated things ever on chips - and maybe tokens too, probably because so many casino bosses loved to collect old automobiles."

And Slots interrupted: "Yeah - I dumped all my car chips, except for the Corvettes. And Zodiac Signs seem to be popular with the LE promoters, maybe 'cause that way they can sucker ya into a dozen trips for a dozen chips. Sorta like the Back To the 1940's Collection fiasco at the Ramada. Or like the Millennium Collections, where some scalpers scooped up all of at least one of the issues, making it impossible for honest collectors to fill out their collections, except at sky-high prices."

Then I volunteered: "Recently, we visited the Nevada Palace and noticed they removed all their regular \$5 chips and replaced them with LEs all over the place, including the white 1996 New Years and the orange 1997 Oktoberfest chips. Needless to say, this color mixture confused some players and dealers. But it just goes to show that even LEs issued years ago, and thought by some to be obsolete and therefore subject to hefty price hikes, are available for picking - right off the tables."

"Definitely looks like some places, rather than destroying old LEs that they couldn't pawn off on gullible collectors, are dumping them on their tables as regular everyday chips," I added.

About then, Larry Lineaway joined the conversation; "And since someone, or some group, cornered most of the 1998 CC>CC convention chips just for the greedy purpose of gouging club members, I for one will never buy one. For me it's not really a collectible! Like many other manipulated chips, we should all boycott them, otherwise we're just encouraging further manipulations."

And he continued his harangue: "Like the notorious Topicanta, where they give out false or misleading information on when many of their LEs will be available to the public; and in some cases, especially when small numbers are involved, correct information is leaked to a few select individuals who then corner the market, and within 24 hours they're on the internet at many times face value. Such insider information manipulation may not be illegal, but it's certainly unethical."

And he went on: "And how about these casino chip factory outlets that have conducted lucrative mail-order businesses, shipping their LEs all over the country, and maybe the world, and sometimes most or all of some issues to select dealers, leaving few if any for direct sale to collectors. But don't mind me, I just lost at the crap table."

"Well," interrupted Slots, "it must be a great business for the casinos - pay less than a buck for a trinket and sell it for \$5, \$25 and \$100, especially if ya can turn it into a quick phony rarity."

Then I pointed out, "Early this morning, a young couple stopped by our table with a loose-leaf notebook full of \$25 and \$100 MGM fight chips. A little while later, after making the rounds of all the tables in here, they returned with the same notebook full of the same chips, and again asked if we wanted to buy any. After we again said no thanks, they turned and hurried out the door - shaking their heads."

"Yes", Larry chimed-in, "and history is loaded with examples of planned rarities, with the promoters spending big bucks on fancy ads in newspapers and magazines, that we've all seen over and over. And today these fancy 'collector' plates, model cars, pretty dolls, or whatever are worth a fraction of the prices paid by sucker collectors. Just like the commemorative coins issued by the U.S. Mint. Are Limited Edition chips like these phoney collectibles, or maybe baseball cards - one more time? Let's hope our hobby doesn't repeat the past mistakes of history!"

"Well," I finally said, "despite all the problems and abuses of LEs, I'm still hopeful they will make a contribution to the hobby. Even though they're discouraging and turning off some collectors, let's hope exposure to LEs attracts even more long - term collectors. Sort of like eBay, where sky-high prices for some chips are making dealers very happy. But will these novice collectors be turned off when they learn true values? Let's hope that eBay, like LEs, will help the hobby grow by gaining much broader exposure of what really are great collectibles."

THE INFORMATION BOOTH

Welcome to another installment of "The Information Booth." For those of you who are reading the column for the first time, I try to provide some information about unidentified flying chips (UFC's) submitted by members for identification, and to answer questions about casino history, chip history, or related subjects.

As I always do, I'll begin with some answers to previous UFC questions. Also, I repeat my request for participation by club members. This column is only of value if you take time to write to me with identifications of chips you recognize here in the column, and if you send *legible* photocopies (full size is a must; black and white is preferred, and please *do not send enlarged copies or color copies*) or samples of chips you'd like identified. Please don't assume that if you recognize a chip, someone else will. Don't assume that "everyone knows what that chip is." If you have information which may be of help to other members, please share it through this column.

There are always far more unidentified chips than there are members who write to me with answers. The purpose of this column is to try to identify chips that our members ask about. It's important to share your knowledge of chips that your fellow members may not know about. Come on, collectors: help!

You will notice that very few of the chips which appear in the column are simply photocopied. That's because many older chips do not have enough contrast to photocopy well, and if they will not photocopy once, they certainly will not photocopy a second time when the magazine is published. As a result, I handillustrate most of the chips pictured here. It's a painstaking process, because I make every effort to make sure that each chip illustration is as close as possible to its original version. That way, recognition and identification may be possible.

Please follow the following simple rules when submitting chips or copies for inclusion in "The Information Booth:

If you have a chip that will not photocopy well,

please send it, packed carefully. If you'd like me to return it, please enclose return postage.

Black and white photocopies only, please! Believe it or not, it's actually more difficult to work with color photocopies than with black and white, even though they look prettier when you copy them!

No electronic scans, please! Scans are virtually impossible to work with, because they're almost never actual size. If you have a scanner, I know you like to show off the results, and electronic transmission is certainly faster and easier than (gasp!) taking pen in hand and writing a note, but please, if you want your UFC to appear in this column, don't send me scans!

Legibility is the key: Please realize that if you cannot read what is printed on a chip clearly after you photocopy it for the column, neither can I, and illustrating it will be impossible. In such a case, you may send the chip to me, with return postage if you would like the chip sent back to you.

Also, please realize that if you recognize a chip published here as a UFC, you have information that your fellow collectors do not have. Please share. That's the whole point of this column. What is common knowledge in one area of collecting is completely unknown in others. For those of you with answers or questions, please share your information by writing to me at P. O. Box 340345, Columbus, Ohio 43234.

As usual, we'll begin with some identifications of previously-published UFC's. The volume and issue number of the magazine where the chip first appeared is shown in parentheses so you can see the illustration if you wish.

UFC 404 (5/1): The **Delta Club** chip was originally attributed to an illegal club in Greenville, Mississippi. The state was right, but the town was wrong: the chip's from a club in Hollandale, MS.

UFC 1208 (11/4): Doc Finstuen recognized this inverted horseshoe and has taken time to send us a

very complete story about the chip and its owner. The chip was made for Tom Connelly Moore, who used them in high stakes poker games at the Stephen F. Austin Hotel in Austin, TX in the 1930's. In 1949, Moore moved to San Antonio and opened the Navy Club on Broadway. The chips may well have been used there as well. In the early 1960's, Moore sold the Navy Club property and built the Circle M Ranch on Kings Trail (Hwy. 35N) in San Antonio on the way to Austin.

The Circle M burned down, and Moore moved his "private club" to his large residence at 6701 West Avenue in Castle Hills, a San Antonio suburb. Whether these chips were still in use at that time is unknown. In 1968, Moore moved to Reno, where he bought the Holiday Hotel from Newt Crumley.

All that history from what appears to be a "generic" poker chip! Just proves once again: assume nothing!

UFC 1209 (11/4): We're not sure of this attribution, but the Country Club chip with a pictograph of a top hat may be from an illegal club in Dickinson, TX. UFC 1211 (11/4): The Lady Luck Casino (LLC) was a card room in Livermore, CA which closed in 1997. UFC 1214 (11/4): According to *The Gaming Table*, this DOC chip was shipped to W. H. Bartlett in West Yellowstone, MT, in 1947. I'm not sure what the letters stand for.

UFC 1216 (11/4): What I thought might be an illegal club chip, a raised circle mold with a center inlay picturing a **flamenco dancer**, turns out to be considered a poker chip. Allan Myers suggested I look at Dale Seymour's *Old Poker Chips*, and there it was, with the identification code PE-HF.

UFC 1231 (12/1): The April, 1998 issue of Gaming Times magazine had a cover photo showing chips used in illegal clubs in the New Orleans area as well as a number of generic poker chips. Several readers pointed out to me that the 544 Club chip is among them. The article in that issue doesn't mention the 544 Club by name, so for now we'll attribute the chip to the New Orleans area. Perhaps more definite information will surface.

Now for some new UFC's sent in by members for this issue. As always, I use a \$ next to the chip illustration to indicate that there is a denomination on the reverse side. If you see no \$ or other notation, you may safely assume that both sides of the chip are identical.

UFC 1254: The **Pacific Club** was a high stakes private club in Honolulu, Hawaii.

UFC 1255: This **MSC** chip was probably used on the **S.S. Monte Carlo**, the gambling ship off the coast of California in the 1930's. I'm not sure if it will reproduce, but the "B" chip is a photocopy of one of the MSC chips found in this group, with a rubber stamp that says "S.S. Monte Carlo, 1375 W. 7th St., Long Beach."



UFC 1256: Now here's another interesting chip! I'm hoping it copies well. It says El Rancho, Haiti. This casino has been known for some time, but its chips have been elusive at best. *The Gaming Table* shows the casino in Petionville, Haiti. That's near the capital city of Port-au-Prince. Oddly, when these chips surfaced, I'd just been rereading Vincent Teresa's *My Life In The Mafia*, written with Thomas Renner. In the chapter entitled "The Mafia in Haiti," Teresa explains that in 1967 there was only one casino in

explains that in 1967 there was only one casino in Haiti, the International, run by friends of Meyer Lansky and Joe Bonanno. The New England mafia approached "Papa Doc" Duvalier, the Haitian dictator, with plans to open a casino at El Rancho, and to run gambling junkets to the hotel. The book explains how the Esquire Sportsman's Club was established to run junkets from Boston to El Rancho, how Duvalier got his kickbacks, how mobsters from other U.S. cities got in on the action by running junkets from their cities to El Rancho, and how the games were rigged to counteract a hot run by a junketeer.

It's a fascinating story, and here's the chip that goes with it!

UFC 1257: This copy was sent in asking for confirmation that the chip was used as a roulette chip at the Mapes Hotel in Reno. It seems unlikely. The H&C rim would be a bit out of place for the Mapes, which used many other types of mold designs, most of them earlier than the H&C rim. The M (or is it a W?) also seems to be the wrong type for the Mapes. Can anyone confirm the origin of this chip?

UFC 1258: Another unlikely—but possible —attribution. Was this MC chip used at Las Vegas' Monte Carlo Club in the early days? Someone sold it as such; can anyone confirm?

UFC 1259: Once again, an unknown chip is sold on the basis that it was from early Las Vegas. This one, a crest and seal chip, is said to have come from the Las Vegas Club. If so, it's the only known crest and seal chip used there, the earliest known chips being hostamped large crown chips. Given that the Las Vegas Club opened in 1931, though, it's not impossible that a U.S. Playing Card Co. crest and seal chip was used there. Can anyone give us the real story?




UFC 1260: There are several Log Cabins which are known to collectors (The Gaming Table lists eleven of them!), but chips aren't known for most of them. It seems most likely that this chip was used in the Log Cabin card room in Yreka, CA.

UFC 1261: This chip was made by the U.S. Playing Card Co. The detailed designs on this crest and seal chip are the **Mexican national emblems**. Does anyone have any idea who they were made for or where they were used?

UFC 1262: The Club was an illegal casino in Fairbanks, Alaska. This USPC crest and seal chip is from the 1930's, so **The Club** was in operation quite some time ago.

UFC 1263: Ted Brown says this is a plastic injection-molded diamond rim chip with a paste-on label center. Mexico hasn't had gambling since 1935, so if it's from Acapulco, Mexico, it's not a gaming check. The Acapulco Bar could be from the U.S. somewhere though. Does anyone recognize it?

UFC 1264: The rim and age of this chip indicate that it's from a CA card room, but I can't find one listed anywhere with the name **United Cigar**. Was it a card room, or perhaps an advertising chip?








Treasure Maps of Information: Collecting Gaming-related Maps

Have you ever studied maps from Nevada and its cities, or other gaming jurisdications, in order to learn where a casino was located, how its interior was laid out, or how it related to other casinos of the same era?

"X" marks the spot

Researching the history of clubs and casinos requires some resourceful sleuthing, including the use of old directories and phone books, records from chip manufacturers, if available, and collecting "collateral" materials such as books and magazines, advertising and logo items, postcards, matchbooks, along with the primary gaming collectibles – chips, tokens and




dice. The fundamental information on casinos – location, open and close dates, etc. – gets better each year with the publication of various chip guides. But to get a better feel for a club or casino from an earlier era, there's no substitute for photos or descriptions from the time the club was operating. One source of information that I find useful (and fun to collect, too) is maps of the location in question.

Aerial Maps

Aerial maps are particularly interesting, in that they photographically record the layout of an area at a point in time. One of my favorite Las Vegas items is a view of Las Vegas from space in the 1980's (see image below). In the reduced size shown here, it looks pretty blurry, but I'll bet you can recognize the airport, and also the distinctive curve of the "Strip". (The green golf courses look darker because the image was taken with infrared film.) I also have some aerial maps taken from an airplane by a professional service which maps areas for real estate purposes. Such aerial photos can be purchased commercially if you're interested.

Postcard and Poster Maps


Las Vegas has been the subject of map diagrams on postcards over the past 20 to 30 years. I've seen similar diagrams for Atlantic City too. Recent diagram-representations have shown up in poster size images, as Las Vegas has grown. The diagrams can reveal interesting relationships among casinos of the same era. One note of caution: the artists sometimes goof or use outdated information. I've seen closed or not-yet-open casinos depicted on postcards and posters, so cross-check your dates if using the image for research purposes.

Oil Company Road Maps

Road maps of different eras are useful in understanding how Las Vegas, Reno and other gaming jurisdic-

Left: Reno city road map insert from a 1936 Standard Oil map for Nevada.


Above: Las Vegas city road map insert from a 1953 Chevron map for Nevada

tions developed. Comparisons of the same location for different years is particularly revealing. The major oil companies began producing free maps for travelling tourists after World War II, although some pre-War street maps are available. (Example: Reno map above is from 1936, just five years after Nevada relegalized gambling. In those days, the population census on the map shows Reno to be larger than Las Vegas! How times have changed!)

Advertising Maps

Maps were used to promote area businesses, so a map which combines advertising and street layouts is a very exciting find. The two images below show downtown Las Vegas and the Strip in 1947, when Las Vegas was still small and informal. "The Strip" was


still labeled as Highway 91. Curiously, the El Rancho Vegas is not shown, although it was open in 1947. (Maybe they didn't want to pay for an ad??)


Today's modern maps are even more detailed, with the major casinos in Las Vegas routinely marked in their proper location. Unfortunately, I still find occasional errors in name or location, even on modern maps!

Hotel Casino Maps

As Hotel Casinos have grown into "self-contained cities", it's sometimes necessary to refer to a map of the property, just to find your way from the hotel to the casino, the pool, the restaurants or the parking lot. Multi-level casinos can be particularly challenging sometimes.

Many of the larger properties publish maps for guests. It's easy to build a collection of hotel-casino maps as you make the rounds for chips & tokens, slot cards and all the other casino collectibles. Just ask for a facility map at the front desk or the bell desk, in most locations. Check for maps in your room, if

you are staying at the property.

Hotel-Casino maps are particularly good references when updated to reflect a casino's changing layout and size as new additions are made over the years. For example, look closely at the Luxor map below (dated 1995). The Nile River Ride is still located on the lower floor. This isn't the first Luxor map, as the Poker Room had been moved to the interior of the casino floor.

Casino Maps as Collectibles

Casino maps are not one of the primary casino collectibles. Certainly not in the league with chips or tokens. Not even as collectible as dice or postcards or slot cards. Not even as visible as ashrays or swizzle sticks. But as sources of information to better understand a casino's operation, or to confirm or cross-reference some other bits of historical information, I think casino maps can be as valuable as buried treasure, where "X" marks the spot!

ANTIQUE COLLECTIBLES by Dale Seymour & Ken Craig


Were back! Sorry we didn't submit an article for the last quarterly issue. Too many personal deadlines conflicting. However, new finds of antique gambling chips keep surfacing. Collectors are still finding more ivories that haven't been seen than clay poker chips. Remember, in this column, we are addressing mainly ivories and early clay poker chips. We both like illegals and early club chips but we'll let someone else research those categories.

The elder member of this writing team (obviously Dale) has just returned from visiting the flea markets and antique stores in Paris. Lots of antiques in Paris --- but not much gambling paraphernalia. The highlight of the Paris trip was a visit to the Caro Company in East Paris. The company has manufactured gaming equipment for more than 150 years. In the show-

room, which contains all kinds of gaming tables, wheels and modern day French gambling equipment for sale, was a 6 foot by 8 foot framed display of the most beautiful gambling chips you have ever seen. (In France, you ask for *jetons*, not chips).

There were about 80 spectacular *jetons* in the frame. Most were large, thick, engraved mother-of-pearl pieces, but there were also maybe a dozen ivories. If you are ever in Paris, it is worth a subway trip to the National Palace (Nation Station) just to see this display. You will never see a more awesome display of gambling chips. The address is 252 Boulevard Voltaire.

Their 19th century ivory chips were quite different from the American or British chips. The ivories contained club logos or fancy monograms, but were not engraved. They were dyed a darker color, then the design was removed from the dyed jeton, leaving the white logo or monogram. Examples of the French-style mother of pearl chips are shown below.






Ivory Chips

Collectors of ivory poker chips are often asked "How can I tell ivory from bone?". The answer to this question can get a bit complex. There are several ways. But there are also different kinds of ivory --- elephant ivory, walrus ivory, and so on. Three of our senses, sight, feel and sound, are most helpful. Bone has a parallel grain that often looks like whiskers, while the grain on ivory is a complex curving reflected grain. Of course, what you see on a chip depends on whether the ivory was cut across the tusk or parallel to it. Remember that a tusk is like a tooth. It has a nerve hole in it. If the ivory was cut across the nerve hole, the hole will show. Many ivory chips contain nerve holes. The graphics shown on this page reveal how an ordinary photocopy machine will exaggerate the nerve hole and the structure around it. It becomes almost like an x-ray machine as the photocopy setting becomes darker. The curving doublespiral grain often does not show on the chip. Ivory is "slicker" and "smoother" than bone. If you tap an ivory chip on your teeth it will make a sharp "click", while the bone, will not produce as much of a "click".




Parallel grain in bone chips. (Chips enlarged 29%)





The two ivory chips (shown enlarged 29%) reveal more of their growth structure pattern when photocopied at different settings.


Sometimes on ivory chips you can see the intricate spiraling structure lines which are reflections of themselves. An attempt to show this pattern is shown in the illustration below.




Spiral structure in ivory cross-section.

Some ivory is very white and shows little or no signs of nerve holes or spiraling grain. Some bone is denser and whiter than other bone and is close to looking like ivory. Fortunately for collectors, for the most part, the design and style of bone and ivory gambling chips is quite different.


In Paris, Dale found a new style of plain ivory jeton which is shown below.



John Benedict found the new star code ivory shown below at the Biloxi show. The 12 notches at the edge are evenly spaced on one side and the 12 on the reverse are also evenly spaced staggering on the other side. The engraving ink and the notches are brown.




John Benedict also submitted the two ivories shown below. We redrew the graphics on the computer as the photocopy was not too legible. These chips do not have that graphic on the reverse side. The recent "Mather" monogram chip was engraved on one side only. Very few ivory chips were done on one side only.




Colin Narbeth submitted graphics and data on the three British ivories and the Roman-Greek bone gaming counter shown below. The five and ten pound pieces are part of the Montague Guest collection housed in the British Museum since 1907. The chips could be 18th or 19th century pieces. The five pound chip is white with black lettering while the ten pound chip is olive green with black lettering. Both sides of both chips are the same. The ivory containing the engraved horse also belongs to the museum. The three chips are shown actual size.

The bone counter, dating to the 4th century, is inscribed with the Latin "VIII" (No. 8) and also the Greek 8 (letter H). This piece was obtained in Cairo by the Rt. Hon. Robert Erkskine.




Michael Richter from Boca Raton has a five dollar ivory chip that is blank on the back side. Collectors have found quite a few ivories that vary from front to back even though they weren't supposed to. Those carvers back in the 1880's were often trying to beat the New York horse and buggy traffic home on friday nights and didn't finish their task. Maybe when they picked up an unfinished chip on monday they omitted a second ring.





Ivory engraving error where back side was not engraved.



As I write this we are on the eve of the annual convention at the Orleans in Las Vegas, June 17-19, 1999. By the time you read it the big bang will be all over for another year. Most of us will be looking at great new additions to our collections and empty wallets!!

If you were unable to attend this year, I hope you will make an extra effort to get here next year. You cannot imagine what a great time is had by all and there is no way I can put it in words that comes anywhere near adequately describing it, except, "WOW! What a great get-together!!" A few changes are being made in my way of doing things. We have sold our California Card Room collection, so this check list will no longer be available with the O'Neal check lists. I will still try to keep up with the Indian Casinos, but I need some California club members help as I know there are some out there I don't have any information on. If you can't send the chip, a good scanned image from the internet collectors will do.

After many months work I have finally finished the slot card check list. Almost 1500 cards world wide, with all varities described obverse and reverse. This list is 60 pages of computer print out and is available for \$6.00.

The single casino playing card collections that we have had for sale are no longer available. All other chip and token check lists are still currently the same.

The Venetian LV (old Sands property) is open, but nowhere near finished yet. Another huge facility. Resort at Summerlin LV opens 6-29-99. Paris LV opens in September 1999 and the Aladdin is going full speed ahead. Hotel tower steel work looks just about to be topped off.

Rumblings from Steve Wynn's camp are the Boardwalk property will have some announcement in the near future. Sahara Hotel & Casino has demolished the entire front north end (old casino part) of the building to construct a new race car themed area and restaurant. Stratosphere is still promising to resume construction any day now. So you can see there is never a week goes by that something in this town doesn't change.

We have been informed by member #R-0291, Mel Jung that there has been a deal struck with the Reno Hilton Casino in Reno to sell some of the accumulated older commemoratives to collectors that the casino had intended to destroy. Varities of Casino 93 chips are \$1 BJ metal centers--(1) white 3 dark grn, logos cut in-lathe center, "Jackpot, Nevada" letters close together, (2) wht 3 light grn, logos cut inlathe center, "Jackpot, Nev" letters close together, (3) wht 3 light grn, logos embos-lathe center, "Jackpot, Nev" letters spread apart, (4) wht 3 light grn, logos embos-smooth center, "Jackpot, Nev" letters spread apart-thin lines on rim, & (5) wht 3 medium grn, logos embos-smooth center, thick lines on rim. \$5 red 3 brn logos embos -lathe center, thin lines on rim, \$5 red 3 brn logos embos-smooth center, thick lines on rim.. Our \$25 is dark grn 3 pnk, logos embos-lathe center, thin lines on rim. Again there may or may not be a \$25 smooth center. Some places in the hinter lands never have changed the \$25 chips!!



And last there is Stateline Casino, Wendover. \$1 BJ metal centers, (1) dark gray 3 org, logos cut in-lathe center, cowboy face left, (2) gray 3 org, logos cut insmooth center, cowboy face left, (3) dull gray 3 org, logos embos-smooth center, cowboy face right, & (4) dark gray 3 org, logos embos-smooth center, cowboy face right. \$5 red 3 wht/blk/wht, (1) logos embos-smooth center, cowboy face right, "Wendover Nev", thin letters & (2) logos embos-smooth center, cowboy face right, "Wendover, Nev", thick letters. Our \$25 is grn 3 wht/org/wht, logos embos-smooth center, cowboy face right. My guess is there should be a \$25 logos cut in-lathe center, cowboy face left (?) or right (?) but we have not seen any.

PHIL'S FORAYS LIVING LARGE IN LAS VEGAS

Although I preferred living in Reno, every couple of years I'd move to Las Vegas just so I could hunt for Southern Nevada chips. Las Vegas in the late '60's and early '70's was a far cry from what it is today but I still had a lot of fun exploring the Strip and the small clubs on Fremont Street. There were places like the Red Garter, Nevada Club, Frank Schivo's California Club, Pioneer, Club Bingo, Sinabar, Carousel, Mint, and Honest John's downtown. All have been absorbed into the few large casinos that make up Fremont Street today. Places like the Horseshoe and Golden Nugget were a lot smaller and more fun too. I spent many hours playing the old nickel machines at the Golden Nugget which dropped an \$8.00 jackpot into the coin tray all at once.



Here I am playing a penny slot at Diamond Jin's Nevada Club on August 25, 1965. tI would be another four years before I would get the bright idea to collect chips.

Most of the places had quarter craps so there were plenty of low denomination chips to collect. Some even had ten and fifty centers. Even though I got to visit a lot of the joints that are no more, I regret not seeing places like the Bird Cage, Fortune Club, Savoy, and Boulder Club. They must have been pret-

ty neat.


One of the activities I enjoyed was exploring the small clubs in North Las Vegas. A good friend of mine, Warren Stanley, was the constable out there for many years and knew a lot of the old time operators. He was able to get me quite a few obsolete chips from long closed places and relate many stories about them.

One of those places was the Town Hall Round-Up Club which was so named because a lot of North Las Vegas city officials would gather there for lunch. Supposedly, a lot of business was conducted there. Across the street was the Embassy Club which, in addition to gambling, had burlesque-type entertainment. At the time it was the only place like it in town and was pretty popular. At night cars would be parked for blocks along the boulevard.

Warren or "Stan" as he preferred to be called, was also able to dig up chips from the Oxford, Zanzibar, Louisiana, and Brown Derby Clubs. Some were located on the West Side and I was afraid to go into them.

Just down the street was a place called Bill and Bud's Montana Bar which is still in business as the New Montana Bar. There was a single twenty-one table in there and every time I went in I'd grab a few chips. They had one and five dollar denominations and for the \$25 chip they used a hot-stamped 25¢ Chesterfield Club which was what the joint was called previously. Anyway, one day I was playing and the pit-boss left to use the rest-room. I asked the dealer, who was obviously new, what the chips in the middle were. She looked at one and said it was just a 25¢ chip. I asked her if I could buy four of them and be obliged. I quickly stuck them in my pocket just about the time the boss returned to his post. He immediately noticed the missing \$100 worth of chips. "Where did those chips go?" he screamed. The frightened dealer quickly pointed at me as I sat there with an innocent look on my face. "Give those back-they're worth \$25 each" he said. "Oh, I thought they were only worth a quarter" I replied as I gave up my treasure. Anyway, they used a red 10¢ hotstamp that matched the yellow one for drink tokes and I was able to get several of those. So I still wound up with a Chesterfield Club chip for my collection.

Farther north on Las Vegas Boulevard was a joint called Al's Liquors and it was kind of a tough joint. There was one 21 game in there and they have one and five dollar chips. One night I was playing and rat-holing chips whenever I thought the dealer wasn't

chips and some articles and pictures of the fire at the Million Dollar Museum. For my effort he gave me a couple of his \$10,000 chips that were salvaged from the fire.

About this time - around 1974 - Bob bought the old Sinabar downtown. It was one of those sneak-joint bars where the dealers would drink on their breaks. Bob added a couple of 21 tables and a crap game. I went in on opening night and Bob was watching a 21 game. When he saw he reached into the rack and tossed me a \$5 chip - a brown hotstamp top hat and cane mold, I was thrilled to add it to my collection.

After about a year Bob changed the name of the Sinabar to the Vault Casino. Up went the panels of dollar bills that had been a familiar sight at the Museum. He also made one and five dollar gaming tokens by pasting stickers over washers for use in the slot machines. I sure hated paying six dollars to add Another of my favorite past times was hanging out on the Strip. In those days, there were twelve major hotels that included the Sahara, Thunderbird, Riviera, Stardust, Frontier, Desert Inn, Sands, Flamingo, Dunes, Aladdin, Tropicana, and Hacienda. There were other, smaller operations with live gaming but I thought I'd get all the \$5 chips from the big hotels first. I figured I'd hit one or two hotels a week and spread out the cost.




Flamingo in the days of the Bubble Tower

The first place I went was the Dunes Hotel, one of my favorite places. I asked the cage cashier if I could buy a \$5 chip and she said sure but did I want some of these obsolete ones she had in the back of the drawer? It wasn't in my budget but I agreed and would up with four or five different chips. I left with mixed emotions about spending so much money but was glad to get

them. I had the same experience at other hotels and in the end wound up with a fairly good collection of old chips. Even some f the older places had only been around for twenty years or so and with little competition, I had a fairly easy time finding stuff.




Flamingo in the days of the Bubble Tower





PHIL'S FORAYS LIVING LARGE IN LAS VEGAS

by Phil Jensen

Although I preferred living in Reno, every couple of years I'd move to Las Vegas just so I could hunt for Southern Nevada chips. Las Vegas in the late '60's and early '70's was a far cry from what it is today but I still had a lot of fun exploring the Strip and the small clubs on Fremont Street. There were places like the Red Garter, Nevada Club, Frank Schivo's California Club, Pioneer, Club Bingo, Sinabar, Carousel, Mint, and Honest John's downtown. All have been absorbed into the few large casinos that make up Fremont Street today. Places like the Horseshoe and Golden Nugget were a lot smaller and more fun too. I spent many hours playing the old nickel machines at the Golden Nugget which dropped an \$8.00 jackpot into the coin tray all at once.



Here I am playing a penny slot at Diamond Jin's Nevada Club on August 25, 1965. tI would be another four years before I would get the bright idea to collect chips.

Most of the places had quarter craps so there were plenty of low denomination chips to collect. Some even had ten and fifty centers. Even though I got to visit a lot of the joints that are no more, I regret not seeing places like the Bird Cage, Fortune Club, Savoy, and Boulder Club. They must have been pret-

ty neat.

One of the activities I enjoyed was exploring the small clubs in North Las Vegas. A good friend of mine, Warren Stanley, was the constable out there for many years and knew a lot of the old time operators. He was able to get me quite a few obsolete chips from long closed places and relate many stories about them.

One of those places was the Town Hall Round-Up Club which was so named because a lot of North Las Vegas city officials would gather there for lunch. Supposedly, a lot of business was conducted there. Across the street was the Embassy Club which, in addition to gambling, had burlesque-type entertainment. At the time it was the only place like it in town and was pretty popular. At night cars would be parked for blocks along the boulevard.

Warren or "Stan" as he preferred to be called, was also able to dig up chips from the Oxford, Zanzibar, Louisiana, and Brown Derby Clubs. Some were located on the West Side and I was afraid to go into them.

Just down the street was a place called Bill and Bud's Montana Bar which is still in business as the New Montana Bar. There was a single twenty-one table in there and every time I went in I'd grab a few chips. They had one and five dollar denominations and for the \$25 chip they used a hot-stamped 25¢ Chesterfield Club which was what the joint was called previously. Anyway, one day I was playing and the pit-boss left to use the rest-room. I asked the dealer, who was obviously new, what the chips in the middle were. She looked at one and said it was just a 25¢ chip. I asked her if I could buy four of them and be obliged. I quickly stuck them in my pocket just about the time the boss returned to his post. He immediately noticed the missing \$100 worth of chips. "Where did those chips go?" he screamed. The frightened dealer quickly pointed at me as I sat there with an innocent look on my face. "Give those back-they're worth \$25 each" he said. "Oh, I thought they were only worth a quarter" I replied as I gave up my treasure. Anyway, they used a red 10¢ hotstamp that matched the yellow one for drink tokes and I was able to get several of those. So I still wound up with a Chesterfield Club chip for my collection.

Farther north on Las Vegas Boulevard was a joint called Al's Liquors and it was kind of a tough joint. There was one 21 game in there and they have one and five dollar chips. One night I was playing and rat-holing chips whenever I thought the dealer wasn't
