

The Early Bird reception is open only to members. If you have a spouse, child, or significant other that you are planning on bringing to the reception, they must be an Associate member if not a regular member. It would be very helpful to the registration staff if their membership was taken care of ahead of time. Mail in their membership application or renewal to the Membership Officer. MISCELLANEOUS MEMBERSHIP MENTIONABLES

- ** At the beginning of the January quarter the club had 2254 active members. The count is on a steady increase each quarter.
- ** Two more members converted to Life Member status. The club now has 23 Life Members. Life Membership is presently \$300.00. First Class magazine delivery is extra and can be paid yearly or in multiple year increments to save on postage increases.

Support your club, avoid the yearly renewals, be able to show a special permanent membership card, and attain the status of a special dedicated collector.

- ** If you are planning a move, or have recently moved, please send your new address to the Membership Officer. You can mail, phone, or email your new address. If you have your magazine delivered by standard mail, it may not be forwarded to your new address. Even by First Class mail, rerouting could delay your issue. If we have a wrong address, the club also pays 50 cents to receive an address correction notice from the post office, plus the postage costs on standard delivery magazines to receive back the undeliverable issue.
- ** If you let your membership expire for more than one quarter and you wish to rejoin, you will be issued a new membership number. Expired numbers are retired and not reused. This policy protects the status of your early membership number. It would not be fair for a member with a number in the low 100's for instance, to let their membership expire and then decide to rejoin a year later and be able to keep the same low number. Membership number status is important to many members and indicates how long they have been a continuous, active, supporting member.

SLOT TOKEN DESIGNS by John A. Bollinger #3119

In the couse of studying and enjoying my accumulation of gaming slot machine tokens, I am often suprised by small changes of designs or metals from the original issue.

I first noticed this occurance when I received the Diamond Jo Casino \$25 token from my new issue supplier. At first, I thought that my supplier had erred since he had sent me the original token just a year previous. However, I decided to compare it with the earlier piece for possible upgrading when everything fell into place.

Apart from a larger planchet plus different metals, it seems that Johnny Appleseed visited the Dubuque courthouse and planted a lush vegetation around the building. Plus an artist added some clouds in the sky to transform a rather drab looking token into an attractive screne setting. The only thing missing are birds in the air and children playing on the lawn to make the scene complete. Someone definitely "got it right" on this one.

The second set of tokens involves the \$5 Tiber Entertainment Group cruise line token. I distinctly remember that the one I already had was a copper-nickel speciman and was surprised to see a bronze example in a dealers display case at the Las Vegas CC>CC show last year. What is the story here?

Are there two different cruise ships with their own unique tokens?Did one token supercede the other one?.... or were the 2 different tokens in use simultaneously on the same ship?.... Does anyone know for sure?

The third set concerns the \$25 token of Foxwoods Casino in Connecticut. On my first visit there in 1997, the original silver token (GDC MINT) was still in use. However, on a subsequent visit in 1998, I noticed a brass alloy token with OPM mint mark. The size of the token was also greatly enlarged.

So, what do all these changes mean? To me it represents a challenge to always scrutinize every token whenever I visit a casino, to see if I can detect even the slightest anomoly and has given me even more enjoyment whenever I find one.







"WOW! Great find Gene and Robert! The 500 Club was one of Atlantic City's most famous night clubs... well before legalized gaming came to town. It was frequented by most influential people and featured top headliner entertainers for years. The place was owned by Skinny Damato... one of the most powerful politicians in Atlantic County. It was not a big secure that gambling was going on there. The secret has been ... up tell now... what did the chips look like that were is use there?

- ◆ The Gaming Table shows the address of the 500 Club as 6 South Missouri Ave, Atlantic City, NJ.
- ♦ The index card records of the Mason Co (who made the hub mold chips) shows about 8500 of these chips ordered and sent to 4 South Missouri Ave, Atlantic City, NJ. Three shipments of chips: 1934 thru 1937. The index cards show the "500 C" logo hot-stamp imprint, the same as on the chips!
- Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis first teamed up at the 500 Club.
- ◆ The club was destroyed by fire 6-10-73; it opened 1918. The mob controlled it.
- ◆ Frank Sinatra appeared there over a six year period 5 times. Also: Jimmy Durante, Donald O'Connor, Sophie Tucker, Patti Page, Joe E. Lewis
- In the 1940's and 50's it was the leading nightclub in Atlantic City. The showroom seated 1000 and the backroom was a plush
 casino.



The Casino Legends Hall of Fame One Collector's Dream

I'm sitting in the Casino Legends Hall of Fame, interviewing Mr. Steve Cutler. Every collector has a dream - and I am sitting in the middle of Steve's. The Hall of Fame is *really* a Hall of Fame where celebrity inductions take place amid a collection of Las Vegas memorabilia, gambling artifacts and... of course chips and checks.



What is in the Casino Legends museum is not just a single collection but a group of collections from matches, swizzle sticks, dice, advertising, plates to posters, chips and statues. It is a well woven fabric that ties together the history and feel of gambling, Nevada style. Steve Cutler has created the spirit and essence of Nevada gaming from when it was legalized in 1931 to today's mega casinos.



The artifacts of this museum give a thumbnail sketch of most of the gaming history of Las Vegas, Reno. Lake Tahoe and the outlying areas of Nevada. Classic photographs put the artifacts into perspective and some of the old time scenes are almost alive. Modern technology has not been neglected and the videos of implosions, star performances and history give the viewer a compact version of gaming history.



Steve comments that the Entertainment Industry has been a major part of the success of the Gaming Industry. His museum pays homage to not only the stars that made it to the headliner rooms, but also to the show girls that decorated the stages like frosting on an entertainment cake. Steve has been around the state and visited most of the museums that preserve Nevada's history. The lack of gaming history in other institutions was not lost on Steve. "It is almost as though they were ashamed of it" Steve comments. In fact Steve is right and has done something about it. With literally thousands of artifacts, The Casino Ledgends Hall of Fame fills a long neglected part of Nevada's past.

Steve's personal history with Las Vegas began in 1953 when his family moved to the small town with a population of around 40,000. "My parents were pack rats and I became one. At first I collected coins and Coca-Cola memorabilia." Steve began collecting gaming items when he entered the gaming industry in 1972 and has not stopped. His passion for coins and other collectibles has been completely replaced by his love for gaming memorabilia.

Steve's museum began with a small display at the Pioneer Club in downtown Las Vegas in 1994. From the Pioneer the museum was transformed into the Nevada Gold Museum for the Hilton Corporation as a traveling exhibit. After a stay at the Reno Flamingo Hilton and the Laughlin Flamingo, it was time for the display to return to Las Vegas. By repackaging the exhibit and creating the Casino Legends Hall of Fame, Steve was able to land 7,200 square feet of space at the Tropicana, its present location. As Steve's interest and his collections grew, his original collection of chips expanded to include all gaming items.

Having gone from a 500 square foot display area at the Pioneer to the extensive spread at the Tropicana - where is Steve headed now? He will not say, but the gleam in his eye indicates that he is thinking about bigger and better displays. Steve sees his next project in terms of more than 10,000 square feet and very interactive.

Keeping track of the items in the collection is more than just an exercise in inventory and accounting, it is also the documentation of gaming history. The headliner entertainers and not just memoralized with photographs, but with their contracts, paychecks and programs. This gives a fuller picture to their life and times in Las Vegas.

With thousands of items in the collection, space has become a premium. More than 3,000 roulette chips have surrendered valuable display space to an exhibit on the "Rat Pack". When the future provides a greater area, they will be back on display. And if you are curious about the authenticity of the artifacts, only two are reproductions, the first Nevada gaming license and the death certificate of Bugsy Siegel.

The Hall of Fame memoralized several categories of history. Movies filmed in Las Vegas are one of the categories. Visionaries like Howard Hughes and Benny Binion who were willing to put their money on the line for Las Vegas is another category. Headliners that made Las Vegas the entertainment capital of the World are a Hall of Fame category. Showgirls, the icon of Las Vegas have their own category of Fame. Famous gamblers are also one of the categories. Even some of the more infamous personalities of Las Vegas are memoralized in a display of the Mob and Las Vegas.

With the CC>CC convention in the same building as the Hall of Fame, the 2000 gathering will offer collectors a great opportunity to brouse through the museum. I would recommend a visit just to familiarize yourself with some of the memorabilia that was a part of the lively action that the gaming chips witnessed. The museum features a number of integrated displays so all of your favorite chips and checks might be in several cases. Brouse, learn and enjoy, you might get an inspiration for your own museum!







Who knows someday you might run across one at a swap meet, etc., and at least you would know what it was

Former Splash Casino Owners Re-open at Mhoon Landing Tunica County, MS

Part I: The Investors

The last decade of the Twentieth Century ushered in legal gambling in Mississippi. When a New Orleans entrepreneur named Fernando J. Cuquet, Jr., dropped by in 1991 to assess Tunica's interest, the county board of supervisors not only helped him find a site but paved the road leading to it. Splash Casino, a converted barge trimmed with pink neon, opened in 1992 to such phenomenal success that its operators literally couldn't count the money fast enough. The owners recouped their original investment of \$21 million in 60 days and netted \$85 million in profit in the first year. In the casino industry, the success of Splash was akin to striking oil. The night Splash opened, huge Hollywood-style searchlights flashed into the black night sky, giving low-hanging clouds a peculiarly eerie glow. Splash folded in 1995, pushed out by the more upscale casinos that moved into Tunica.¹

As their newest gambling venture in the Twenty-First Century, the original owners and investors in Splash plan to open Mhoon Landing Casino at a location of the same name in the spring of 2000 if the river water levels cooperate.

Heading up this project is Fernando J. Cuquet, Jr., the same pioneer that opened casino gaming on the Mississippi River near Memphis. Born in 1919 in New Orleans, he graduated second in his class from Tulane University Law School with a Juris Doctor Degree. Before being admitted to the Louisiana Bar, he was appointed law clerk to the Chief Justice of the Louisiana Supreme Court.

Cuquet's life has taken many interesting turns on his road to success. During World War II he was an FBI agent working in Iowa, West Virginia, Washington, D.C., New York, Miami, San Antonio and the Rio Grande Valley of Texas. He volunteered for the FBI Secret Intelligence Service and served abroad in that division as an undercover agent and spy until his return to law in 1946.

Shortly after that, Cuquet acquired a sizable and valuable part of metropolitan New Orleans with a substantial interest in 50 oil wells in southwest Louisiana, losing both in an attempt to rival Texaco. He then became one of the larger contractors in America moving industrial plants from the northern rust belt to the sunny South. Acquiring and operating three million square feet of warehouse space in New Orleans, Houston and Beaumont with four ocean-going bulk carriers plying the waters from New Orleans to South and Central America and from Hawaii to the West Coast, Cuquet moved forward.

Not wanting to miss any financial opportunities, he became the controlling stockholder (52%) in one of the largest banks in the New Orleans area, established an international transmission business, acquired an office building in Los Angeles, and participated in obtaining one billion, eight hundred million dollars of financing to acquire the All American Pipe Line extending from Los Angeles to Houston.

These successes brought Cuquet to Mississippi to establish the Splash Casino, more profitable than Monte Carlo and the billion dollar palaces in Las Vegas and Atlantic City, making him the catalyst in creating 20,000 jobs in the poorest county in the poorest state, transforming Tunica County into the nation's third gambling Mecca after Las Vegas and Atlantic City.²

He now lives at the Belmont Plantation, 8 miles south of Greenville, Mississippi and has just finished his 524-page autobiography to be published next year. In this new Mhoon Landing enterprise, Mr. Cuquet will act as a consultant, just as he did with Splash.

The marketing manager for the Mhoon Landing Casino, Marguerite Berrigan, a 37-year old native of New Orleans, now resides in Tunica County, MS. She is married to Joseph J. Berrigan, a graduate of Notre Dame and the University of Georgia Law School with licenses to practice law in Georgia and Mississippi.

Marguerite received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Centre College in Danville, Kentucky after spending her junior year abroad at the University Paul Valery in Montpellier, France, and received her Masters Degree in Business Administration from the A. B. Freeman School of Business at Tulane University in New Orleans.

While serving as marketing manager for Splash Casino, Ms. Berrigan earned in a single great coup 10 million dollars for the casino. This happened when another corporation offered to buy the casino for eighty million dollars; but upon further inquiry, this offer proved to be self-serving for the corporation and not the casino, causing the Splash partners to reject their offer. The offeror then returned with a new proposal to pay more than a 100 million dollars, and in advance, placed with Splash a ten million non-refundable deposit. After this offer was accepted, the offeror failed to pay the balance of the purchase price and therefore forfeited the deposit. Marguerite's business savvy had once again proved invaluable to the investors in Splash. She will serve in that same capacity for the new Mhoon Landing Casino.

Serving as the CEO of the Mhoon Landing Casino will be Matthew Boykin Walker, a native of Mobile, Alabama and a member of the most prominent family, socially, financially and politically. Being a very shrewd operator, he amassed a fortune with very little help. Buying inexpensive houses and rebuilding them for sale, Matt and his wife earned enough capital for even larger and riskier ventures. Placing this profit in real estate near the airport, he patiently waited until the city of Mobile moved in that direction, making his investment worth millions. Matt and his extended family own 6,000 acres of timberland just north of the city. This tract has been the basis of their international lumber business that Matt runs for his family.

But because of his love of boats and the sea, Matt created in the 1980's an offshore supply vessel enterprise to service the oil industry in Brazil. In March, 1996 he sold the business to Marine Operators at a handsome profit.

As a partner and owner Matt financed the highly successful Splash Casino which netted 85 million dollars in 1993. In 1994 and 1995, as an owner, he financed and ran the Cotton Club Casino which earned over 14 million dollars at Greenville, Mississippi in the location where Jubilee Casino now docks. Later the casino was moved to Lakeshore, MS.

The fourth person to re-join this casino venture is Douglas McCarlie, a native of Pike County, MS where he now resides. Doug graduated elementary and high schools in Las Vegas, Nevada and attended Arizona State University at Tempe

where he graduated in 1976 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in General Business Administration.

Reared in a gaming casino family, Doug and his brother followed in their father's footsteps. Working as an operator and owner in Mississippi, Nevada, and the West Indies for over half a century, he immersed his sons in every aspect of the profession. Doug's older brother, Gene, ran the Horseshoe Casino in Las Vegas for more than 20 years for and under the owners Bennie and later Jack Binion.

After graduation from college, Doug worked as a craps dealer at the Royal Inn Hotel & Casino in Las Vegas; as a dealer at the High Sierra Casino in Sparks, Nevada; as executive supervisor at the Aruba Concorde Casino in Aruba, Netherland Antilles; as a shift boss at the Gold Club Casino in Sparks; as a 21 supervisor at the Golden Nuggett Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas; as an assistant pit manager at the Tropicana Hotel and Casino; and as an assistant casino manager at the King International Casino, Holiday Inn Hotel in Aruba.

In 1991, he, his brother, and father selected the casino supervisors and trained all the dealers for the Splash Casino at Mhoon Landing. Doug, as casino manager and part owner, became the sole manager and had complete control of the casino operations, winning about 150 million dollars in one year and from that earning a net return of 85 million dollars, making this the most successful operation in the world. He will serve as casino manager in the new Mhoon Landing Casino. (Part II: The Vessel)

NOTES ON SOME "ORIGINAL" DOLLAR SLOT TOKENS by Ken Hallenbeck, Colorado Springs

Many of us who collect chips, silver strikes, and slot machine tokens today either weren't around or weren't involved in collecting them in the mid to late 1960's. There were probably only a hand full of chip collectors, silver strikes as we know them today were virtually non-existent, and any slot tokens were few and far between. Slot tokens were coin of the realm. Everything from cents to silver dollars were used in slot machines. Even today, nickels through half dollars are extensively used. But not silver dollars. In the mid 1960's silver and gold prices went sky rocketing upwards with gold going over \$800 per ounce and silver topping \$50 an ounce. The rise in silver prices resulted in gamblers keeping the silver dollars they got in the casinos. Many casinos ground off the dates on silver dollars in a futile attempt to thwart collectors and keep the coins in play. But it wasn't collectors as much as it was silver hoarders/speculators that caused the silver dollars to disappear.

Dollar slot machine tokens cam into prominence around 1965-66-67 as a substitute for the silver dollars. This has been a boon to our hobby. It has also provided cheap souvenirs to gamblers and tourists as well as a bit of a profit for casinos. Since it costs considerably less than a dollar to produce dollar slot tokens, for every one that walks away as a souvenir, a profit goes to the casino. Even higher profits come with higher denominations.


Bit back to the silver dollars. Awhile back a lady came into our coin shop with alot of coins for sale, including a large number of silver dollars which we purchased. In a separate little bag were eleven (11) silver dollars pictured in this article. I bought them as ordinary silver dollars. The lettering and numbers on the coins is obviously nail polish. I seriously considered using nail polish remover, lacquer thinner or acetone to remove the nail polish. Then it struck me that these were pretty neat souvenirs and possibly winnings from slot machines. They may be "original" dollar slot tokens. They're interesting and make a nice little collection.










The Mapes

Featuring entertainment, food and gaming on both the street level and the top, the Mapes soon became the best hotel in town. As a child I recall seeing Edgar Bergan and Charlie McCarthy in the Sky Room at the Mapes. My parents attended a number of shows that were for older folks and I would get a post card or a program from the nights show.

The Mapes was THE hotel in town and featured a coffee shop, fine dining in the Sky Room and a fully equipped casino. The popularity of the Sky Room became a problem when the limited number of elevators could not handle the flow of people. As a solution, the lobby that originally had shops and the registration desk was converted to a casino at street level.

With a location on the river, the Mapes competed with the center of gaming two blocks north on Virginia Street. Featuring golf tournaments and unlimited class boat races, the Mapes sponsored events that began to draw a large number of tourists to Reno. Their famous logo featured two cowboys standing together with their legs forming the letter "M'.

Over the years the Mapes hosted events and celebrities. Divorcees seeking freedom from the bonds of marriage could be found in the lobby and in the casino - frequently finding a new partner before they had dispensed with the last one.

In 1950, Lou Wertheimer operated the Sky Room casino for the Mapes family while his brother Mert operated the competition in the Riverside Hotel. Because gaming was legal in Nevada, the RFC (Reconstruction Finance Corporation) had loaned money for the hotel operation and was the object of an inquiry by a senate group headed by William Fullbright. Interested in some of the RFC lending practices, the senate committee questioned the loan to "known gamblers". Defending the loan, RFC director Harvey Gunderson contended that where gambling is legal, as it is in Reno, it is no more wrong to loan money to a hotel with a gambling casino than it is to loan money to a hotel with a bar.



Over the years, celebrities visited the Mapes and earned the hotel a reputation for high society events. Marilyn Monroe visited while filming "The Misfits." Shirley Temple sought refuge during her divorce and Ava Gardner visited during her divorce residency before splitting the sheets with Frank Sinatra.

300 Room Mapes Hotel Opens in Reno

Under construction for over two years, the spectacular new Mapes Hotel in Reno officially opened December 17, 1947, it was announced by the owner, Charles W. Mapes, Jr.

Completion of the twelve-story building marks the realization of a three-generation dream of the Mapes family, pioneer Reno residents. Originally the First and Virginia street site on the north bank of the Truckee river, was the location of a feed store operated by George W. Mapes. Many years later it was purchased by his son, the late Charles W. Mapes, Sr., as a future hotel site. Accomplishment of that dream has been carried out during the past two years by Charles W. Mapes, Jr., who supervised the construction of the new structure in the heart of Reno's business section.

The basic elements of the hotel are its 250 rooms and 40 apartments, but the seven shops, numerous concessions, casinos, cocktail lounges, and dining rooms make the hotel virtually a "city within itself."

From the walnut-hued thick-carpeted lobby to the Sky Room's fabulous casino, cocktail lounge and dining mecca on the 12th floor, the hotel is a symphony of design, and skill in workmanship. Experts said it was "impossible," that a first-class metropolitan hotel could not be built in the midst of today's shortages and lack of materials, but endless searching and tireless effort decried the challenge to produce one of the finest metropolitan hotels on the coast.

In the downstairs cocktail lounge and casino, is a curving bar of fine walnut. It is backed by huge wall covering mirrors. The room is a harmonious blend of color, indirect lighting, mirrored pillars, carpeted floors, and modernistic design. The entire south wall is ceiling high glass looking out on the famous Truckee River which flows by the foundations of the structure, The room has three entrances, two from the lobby, and one from Virginia Street.

The lobby is trimmed in natural walnut woodwork, mirrors, and blending colors. Located in the lobby are the cigar and newsstand, travel bureau, and florist

shop. A row of gleaming automatic floor leveling and door opening elevators are situated just opposite the desk.

The coffee shop with an entrance from First Street, as well as the lobby, will handle over 180 customers at any one time. On opposite walls are room length murals which depict contrasting western and ocean scenes. On the west is a sea-shore view with sail boats and expansive beach, while on the east is a typical Nevada sagebrush mountain panorama. A long counter extends nearly the full length along the east wall and a red leather cushioned row of booths along the west. A double row of similar booths runs down the center.

Three complete and separate kitchens are installed, one for

the coffee shop, one on the mezzanine floor to handle the banquet room and the other on the top floor to take care of the Sky Room and Prospectors Club. Ultra-modern stainless steel fixtures, electric ranges, charcoal broilers, the latest in modern dish washing and sterilizing equipment make each a culinary dream.

Barber shop facilities, a turkish bath, drive-in garage, and valet service quarters are all to be found in the basement. Cars can be driven into the garage for parking and patrons may take an elevator to the upper floors.

The banquet room on the mezzanine floor is capable of seating 400 persons. Smooth inlaid hardwood floors make it readily changeable into one of Nevada's largest ballrooms. Separate kitchen facilities insure ideal service. An arching ceiling and steel constructed roof leave the main floor clear of pillars. Also on the mezzanine floor will be a beauty salon, featuring the latest in equipment and technique. The operator comes direct from Antoines of New York City.

Each of the 250 rooms and 40 apartments are equipped with a shower and bath. Inner-spring mattresses, matched dresser sets and thick carpets are common to each room. Every room features outside exposure. Apartments are composed of kitchenette, dinette, living room, bed room, tile bath, and as many additional connecting bed rooms as desired.

On top of all is the beautiful Sky Room, destined to become one of the must night spots of the nation. Not like so many of the rooftop clubs, which were installed after the hotel itself was in operation, the Mapes Sky Room was designed from the outset to be just what it is, a masterpiece of designing and planning skill.

On the north end is the dance floor, dining room and band stand. An inset sky-blue ceiling with indirect lighting casts illuminating shadows on the inlaid, hardwood floor.

A curving bar similar to the one on the ground floor, but much longer, extends along the Virginia Street side. Instead of facing a back bar, patrons are treated to an unexcelled view of the winding Truckee, countryside, and mountain background.

The ceiling to floor length windows encompassing the entire twelfth story gives unobstructed view of the whole Truckee Meadows. The snow-capped Sierras, color - changing foothills and mountains, and a great western panorama awes the daytime visitor; at night the dazzle of Reno's "white way," Virginia Street, blinking colorful miles of neon signs, a giant Nevada moon illuminating the countryside into fluorescent shadows reflecting from the turbulent Truckee gives an entirely different view.

The Sky Room casino with all types of games is located in the southwest corner. The glass-enclosed southeast corner is reserved for Reno's exclusive Prospector's Club. The Mapes reigned as Reno's premier hotel through the 1960's and into the 1970's. As competition and age began to trim the hotel's profits, the Mapes slowly declined. In the early 1980's the Mapes family faced financial problems and on December 17, 1982, exactly 35 years to the day after its opening the Mapes closed. for years the building sat vacant as Reno's gaming fortunes declined in the downtown area. A group of local citizens proposed various uses for the hotel in an attempt to save this Reno landmark. After a prolonged period of time when numerous developers failed to reopen the Mapes, a condemnation action prevailed. With a blast of dust and brick, the Mapes fell on super Bowl Sunday - January 29, 2000.



ATLANTIC CITY REPORT

It would be safe to say that Atlantic City's casinos have slowed down the new issues pace for awhile. The burst of year-end activity of Millennium issues has faded real quickly and not too much has happened since the flip of the calendar to 2000.

Claridge continues to be the leader of the pack with eight chips issued since my last report. Atlantic City's smallest casino continues issuing the bulk of A.C. chips. A \$5 Swiftwater Bill Gates and \$5 Tom Horn issue finished up the Gambling Legends series in early December, which was followed by FOUR (two \$5's and two \$10's) "Seasons Greetings" chips later the same month and a \$5 and a \$10 Millennium issue in January %Ûl.. plus, two more on the way in mid-March for St. Patrick's Day.

Six other properties in town also got on the Millennium bandwagon with issues of their own. A \$5 Hilton; a \$5 and a \$10 from Sands; a combination 20 year anniversary on one side and a millennium commemoration on the other side was issued by Bally's Park Place. Taj Mahal also issued a \$5 Millennium chip and Tropicana did a beautiful \$100 Millennium chip that featured a neat hologram center inlay. Caesars issued two \$25 chips to close out the year. A Cher chip was issued to celebrate Cher's New Year's Eve headliner performance at Caesars and then a \$25 Millennium issue which "borrowed" the same reverse design of the Cher chip was also put into play.

In January, Trump Marina did a \$5 issue of Alice Cooper's R&R Tour. The following month, Tropicana put out a \$5 Year Of The Dragon chip.

As this report is being written, Atlantic City collectors are awaiting the issuance of Claridge's \$5 & \$10 St. Pat's chips and Trump Taj Mahal's \$100 Millennium chip with The Donald's photo and a \$5 Year of the Dragon chip from Taj. Showboat continues to be the only A.C. casino that has never issued a commemorative chip%ûl.. never! I wonder why that is???? Perhaps with Harrah's now owning Showboat that will change.

Sorry, but there is no news for Atlantic City token collectors in this issue.

If anyone hears of any new A.C. token activity, please pass it along to me.

California Chips

Few California chip collectors don't know this is the Year of the Dragon on the Asian calendar as the number of card rooms and Indian casinos issuing commemorative Asian New Year chips seems to increase every year.

In the far south, Viejas again issued a series of five \$5 chips to win the prize for most dragon chips. San Manuel in Highland came out with a very attractive yellow dragon Chipco. The Commerce Casino issued a \$25 dragon chip, using a different Paulson mold on each side. The Bicycle issued \$25 and a \$100 dragon chips. Some of the most sought after annual Asian New Year chips, the bimetal Hollywood Park trio, were late and did not arrive at the casino in time for the holiday.

Artichoke Joe's in San Bruno came out with a Year of the Dragon medallion which looks exactly like most silver strikes, complete with protective case. The medallion doesn't have a face value and was given to players enclosed in the traditional "lucky" red envelope at midnight on February 5. Lucky Chances in Colma issued a Chipco plaque which commemorates the Year of the Dragon on one side and the Millennium on the obverse. Although it is marked \$8 and was sold briefly for that price plus tax in the gift shop, the plaque is not redeemable at the cage. Many of the 2,000 plaques were distributed to customers and employees free, again in a red envelope. Lucky Chances also replaced their regular \$20 and \$100 chips in early February while keeping the lower values the same for now.

The Los Angeles area added still another card room, The Club Caribe Casino in Cudahy, which opened in mid-February with a rack featuring their logo of two palm trees and the sun. No word yet on the opening date for Larry Flynt's Los Angeles-area casino, or whether the name of it will be changed from Hustler Casino to placate his neighbors.

Two Bay Area card rooms changed their racks in December: The Outpost in San Ramon and the venerable Garden City in San Jose. The Wagon Wheel in Mountain View closed on December 31st under political pressure. Their last chips were Chipcos from the closed Queen's Casino in Petaluma. Spotlight 29 issued a \$5 chip marking the Third Annual Tribal Gathering in December.

PHIL'S FORAYS by Phil Jensen

-PARTING SHOTS-

When I began writing my memoirs in the summer of 1998 I promised a short series of articles on my chip collecting adventures in Nevada. I've attempted to do this by either writing about individual towns or several places strung together. In doing so I've covered most of the state except for a few places which I 'll touch on now.

One of those was Tonopah which was actually one of my favorite spots. In the late '60's and early '70's the two main joints in town were the Mizpah Hotel and Tonopah Club. They both had live gaming and were a rich source of chips both for the ones in use and obsolete issues which turned up over the years.

The Tonopah Club was an old-time place which, I imagine, didn't change much over the forty or so years it was in business. There was an old bar, probably built by Brunswich, and a neat cashier's cage with ornate brass bars and fancy hardware. There was a 21 and crap table which was one of the longest I'd everr seen. In the back was a Keno game that featured a huge board and a lot of old-fashioned equipment. It was quite an operation. Unfortunately, the joint was destroyed by fire and eventually torn down. Nothing remains today except a parking lot.



Across the street was the Mixpah Hotel which has been through several different owners over the years but at the time was owned by Lester Short. One day he took me into his office and gave me an old yellow twenty five dollar chip from the Mizpah the likes of which I'd never seen before or since. I was real proud of it. Lester also offered to sell me the whole operation for \$400,000. I liked the place so much I probably would have boufht it except I didn't have the money. In fact I was lucky to have enough to stay in one of the rooms overnight which I did on several occasions. Later on the place was bought by Frank Scott of the Union Plaza in Las Vegas and remodeled extensively.



There were a couple of other places in town with live gaming. One was the Tonopah Belle which was the Ace Club a couple of years earlier. It had a 21 and crap game and was owned by Bob Perchetti. The chips were pretty plain with only his initials - RWP.

The Rex Bar also had a 21 game with chips stamped REX. Bob also owned this place and I was able to get an assortment of old Tonopah Club chips from hime after much pleading.

Next door was the Pastime Club and although the 21 table was still there the luve gaming had ceased around 1969. Luckily the bartender was able to scrounge up an errant chip from a drawer in the back bar and I was happy to get it.

This picture shows Tonopah Lil's Big Casino which was either someone's idea of a joke or a casino owner who ran out of money after the sign was painted. Anyway, it never existed. The place was a bowling ally and later used as the Mizpah casino while the hotel was being remodeled.

Another of my favorite small towns was Beatty, which was a couple of hours south of Tonopah. The main place there was the Exchange Club which still exists but has been drastically remodeled. There was a 21 and crap game there and they used a blue hotstamp dollar chip with a picture of a burro on itl. Every time I'd go in I'd buy a couple. They were always a favorite of mine.

Directly across the street was the Beatty Club, which is still open, but it was owned by a gentleman by the name of Ray May then. It have live gaming for years but by the early '70's all that remained was a roulette table that served as a display rack for some bottles of wine. I asked Ray if he had any of the Beatty Club chips around and he led me to a small room off the bar. Stacked on a shelf were maybe a dozen boxes of chips and he said I could look through them and buy, at face value, whatever I wanted. I picked out a five, two ones and four twenty-fives centers, handed him eight dollars and left-happy to have added to my small town collection. Sometime after that I had talked a couple of people into collecting so I thought I'd better pick up a few extras. The next time I was in Beatty I asked Ray if he'd sell me a few more of the Beatty Club chips. He told me that he had burned them all and there were none left. I was disappointed and a bit skeptical so I figured I'd give it some time and ask later.

It was probably a year and a half later that I strolled back into the Beatty Club. There was Ray, behind the bar as usual. I ordered a beer and looked for a sign that he might remember me. I saw none. Then I popped the question- any Beatty Club chips around? As soon as I did I knew I had make a mistake. Ray's eyes narrowed and he yelled - I TOLD YOU I BURNED THEM ALL! Embarassed, I slipped out of the bar convinced that there were no more chips. At least the ones I had were rare!

Up the road from Beatty was the turn-off to Death Valley and Scotty's Castle. There was an old bar called Slim's Place and one day I stopped to check it out. As I sat at the bar I noticed a shrine-like structure in the corner. There was a poker table and a lot of pictures and old newspaper clippings about Death Valley Scotty. There were also about twenty boxes of chips stacked on the poker table and on close examination turned out to be old roulette chips from Wilbur Clark's Desert Inn. There were about 20 different colors and varieties and the bartender let me have one of each. I wasn't too thrilled as I didn't really care for roulette

chips much but I fugured they were better than nothing.

Anyway, as it turned out, the bartender told me that Death Valley Scotty had died in that bar. I was skeptical so later I did some research and foung that on January 5, 1954 Scotty was experiencing severe internal bleeding at the castle. They loaded him in a car and headed for Las Vegas which was 185 miles away. They only got to Slim's Corners which was what the junction was called in those days-today its called Scotty's Junction-and Slim Riggs, the proprietor and good friend of Scotty carried him in the bar where he laid him on the floor to await the undertaker. I don't know if Slim built the shrine to Scotty but I imagine old Scotty hoisted a few in that bar. It wasn't long after my stop that Slim's burned to the ground-memorabilia and all. I still have a matchbook from there and whenever I drive by I think of that old bar and Death Valley Scotty.

Lovelock was a welcome stop along interstate 80 and Felix's Bank Club was the main joint in town. I got to know Felix pretty well and although I didn't get much in the way of old chips out of him he was always good for a story or two. He liked to talk about his father who operated the old Northern Club in Reno. Unfortunately for Felix authorities found evidence of creative dealing at his club and closed him up around 1977. Felix attempted to sell the place but it never reopened. I sure do miss old Felix's!



I never did get to see the Big Meadow Hotel in Lovelock. It closed in 1963 and burned years later. I was able to buy most of the chips however.

Gerlach is 112 miles north of Reno and not on the way to anywhere, in fact the pavement ends just outside of town. The main place there was Bruno's County Club, which was a very unlikely name. It had a 21 and roulette game and Bruno Selmi was the owner and bartender. He was a pretty crabby old guy but he did give me a set of his roulette chips that had a picture of a bulldog and his initials, B.S. on them. His wife was the 21 dealer and there was a five dollar maximum limit on the game. One day I was rat-holing some chips and accidently let a four dollar bet ride. She got real mad at me and threw the money back at me. I have no idea what she would have done if she had caught me taking chips!

Bruno's brother, Joe, owned the joint next door called Joe's Gerlach club. For some reason, which I never did find out, the two brothers hadn't spoken in twenty-five years but they still operated side by side. Joe had one 21 table which I never did see open. Luckily, Joe's wife, Ann, was really nice and gave me some of the chips. They were just hotstamps and had JOES in large letters. There was a 50ϕ , \$1, and five with the square-in-circle mold that I really likes.

The Desert club was located next door but I don't remember too much about it as it closed in the early '70's. The owner took his 21 game to Gabbs and used the Desert Club chips at the Keystone Club there for a while.

One day I met a lady by the name of Vera Cross who, with two other people, owned the Miner's Club in Gerlach. She told me that one day she went to work and found one of her partners had left town with the bankroll. That was pretty much the end of the club she said. She gave me a pink one dollar chip with the initials RVW and said the V was for her, the W stood for Walt and she could't remember what the R stood for. I didn't ask but I've got to think that Walt was the one who took the bankroll!


I was also able to find some Capooch Club chips which, like the Miner's Club, closed in the mid 1950's. I always longed to be there twenty years sooner!

Cactus Pete's as it appeared in 1969. Today it looks like a Strip Hotel.





Well that about wraps it up. I know I've omitted a few things, but you get the idea. For twelve years I travelled the hiways and back roads of Nevada indulging in a hobby that was mostly ignored. I tried to persuade others to collect but it was a tough sell and I got a lot of funny looks.

Anyway, I was on a fantastic run of luck although I didn't realize it at the time. I guess I thought the good times would never end - I was yound and there was no stopping me. Then, on August 9, 1981, it all came to an abrupt end. Someone broke into my house and stole all my precious chips! I was decastated to say the least. For fifteen years I blocked out the memories and tried to ignore chips in general.

Then at the 1996 chip convention in Las Vegas I was browsing through a dealers stockbooks-not looking to buy anything-but just reminiscing. Then I began to recognize a lot of familiar stuff-REAL familiar stuff. In the old days I used to buy drilled chips on keychains and plug them up and paint them. The exact same chips were in the book! In fact I had collected every chip there. It only took a few minutes to realize what I was looking at-my missing chips! I walked away not knowing what to do. Eventually, I told my friend Howard Herz about my discovery. He knew the dealer who turned out to be Steve Passalacqua. I didn't know him but that was about to change. Howard and I went over to Steve's table and we told him the story. I pretty much stood around and let Howard to the talking and I'm thinking to myself that I've got about as much of a chance of getting my stuff back as a busted out crapshooter getting his bankroll back.

Anyway, the details of what took place have already been told in a story that Steve wrote later on so I wont' go into that. In a nutshell, Steve came over to me and said that he would return the chips! At first, I didn't thimk I heard right but he said yes, that was true.

Anyway thanks to Steve, I was able to write this series of articles. I enjoyed doing it and sharing my memories of the good times I had prowling the towns of Nevada. The hobby has grown tremendously and the chips I bought for face value have increased beyond anything I ever dreamed of. I don't collect old chips anymore by I remember them all with great fondness and emotion. Anyway, thanks for reading my stuff and thank-you Steve Passalacqua!

¹Collecting Casino Chips and Memorabilia: Advice for New Collectors

Beanie babies, teddy bears (this year there is a limited edition Mardi Gras bear on the Gulf Coast), and Shirley Temple dolls. War memorabilia, stamps, and coins. Family heirlooms, antique photographs, and baseball cards. Rocks, art masterpieces, and Disney memorabilia. Sea shells, antique hat pins, and casino chips. What do these many varied groupings have in common? They, along with innumerable categories, are collectibles. Some people spend years of their lives aggressively collecting items, objects, and memorabilia and hours scrutinizing each piece for variations and flaws. Others just pick up items as the objects of desire cross their paths. But according to Gene Trimble² most people collect something in their lifetime, describing this burning desire as the pack-rat syndrome.

People understand why I have my father's WWII medals and citations framed or why I showcase old photographs of our family that date back to the turn of the 20th Century. But when I display my books of casino chips for close scrutiny and appreciation, people look puzzled. Who are these people and why do they collect casino chips for a hobby? The following information resulted from my survey on the web site www.thechipboard.com.

The collectors are as diversified as the chips they collect, coming from many backgrounds: University professors, public school teachers, antique dealers, self-employed businessmen, the ministry, engineers, the computer industry, skilled workers, real estate developers, lawyers, chefs, gaming magazine writers, casino employees, and many other walks of life. The list is endless.

When asked why they collect casino chips, better known in casinos as cheques, collectors respond with the following: the enjoyment of traveling to the casinos and collecting firsthand; as an investment in current chips that immediately converts to cash; the camaraderie with other collectors either on-line or at chip shows; participation in a new-enough hobby to still be interesting and not overcrowded; chips and other casino memorabilia provide souvenirs and memories of vacations and cruises; the love of gaming; the history behind the chips, documenting both illegal and legal gaming in this country as well as abroad; some collect simply because the chips have beautiful graphics; and there can even be a romantic twist--memories of a particular person with you at the time you acquired the chip.

Another point of interest, particularly to new collectors, is how to find those "hard to get" chips? Albert Scalzo takes a humorous, even if truthful, approach when answering, "Pay enough money and it is not that hard to find them." John Long, specializing in cruise ship chips, finds his in many places: auctions; flea markets; antique shops; trade with other chippers; pawn shops; coin shows; and from friends who take cruises. Travis Lewin of NY follows eBay, an on-line auction

house, and shops through gaming magazines like Casino Chip and Gaming Token Collectors Club's Casino Chip and Token News, a magazine representing and published by collectors of all kinds. If you are interested in becoming a part of this collector's club, mail your inquiry to CC & GTCC Membership Officer, James Steffner, P.O. Box 368, Wellington, OH 44090. Dues are \$20 a year.

Greg Susong attributes his finds to his large presence on the web. He maintains the web site <u>www.thechipboard.com</u>, an on-line interactive message board read daily by hundreds. You can pose or answer questions, advertise a sale/show, buy ads for business interests, and converse with other collectors. *Greg Susong's CyberGuide to Casino Chips* contains nearly 4,000 color photos of chips organized by state and casino. The *Chip Links* section lists hundreds of other chip collectors along with their collecting interests and links to their personal home pages and email addresses.³

Collectors have very definite and different plans for their collections. On the serious side, Mark Leighterman, who researches and specializes in Florida illegals, plans to donate his collection of chips, representing years of hard work, to a museum. Some have left provisions for the sell of their collections in wills and still others will pass it down to heirs. John Long hopes to leave his legacy in the form of a book about cruise ship chips that displays his collection. Others take the subject lightly. Jeffery Amoroso from Connecticut, who claims his wife thinks he and his collection are crazy, says he plans to collect 'till the day he dies. But fifty years from now when his children's children inherit it, they will be glad he was crazy! And Jim Kruse figures that when he dies his wife will sell all the chips at a garage sale.⁴

Still people ask what sparks a person's interest in collecting casino chips? Several men from the web survey say they began by just looking for a hobby, and this one seemed like fun. Some admit that while gambling, they noticed chips that were different from the regular house chip. Curiosity led them to explore further and a hobby was born. Others found a chip or two in their pockets on returning home from casinos and threw them into a drawer; from their the early beginnings of a collection took shape and later turned into a hobby. Travis Lewin went looking for a good set of clay design chips for his local small-stakes poker game. He kept finding interesting designs and got hooked. Albert Scalzo reminisces about finding an old \$10 sterling silver Sahara token that belonged to his dad; from that one coin his collection grew to an amazing 2800 chips. I personally began to collect when a friend's vast collection caught my eye; when asked to help him collect chips from MS, I decided I could get one for myself too. And now I am downsizing my collect to include only Mississippi riverboats and Indians both current and obsolete. (Watch for later articles on obsolete riverboats.)

If you are a new collector, don't despair! Casinos, riverboats, Indian reservations, Las Vegas nights, race tracks with poker rooms, or some other form of legalized gaming exists in 48 states. A new collector can start anywhere and build an impressive collection of chips in a short time. Begin your hunt at the casino cage. A small tip to a casino cashier will, in most cases, get you all current chips in the best condition. Many new collectors begin by specializing in just riverboats,

Nevada, Atlantic City, or specialty chips: grand openings; anniversaries; holidays such as Christmas; special events, such as the Copa Harley chips in Gulfport, MS; those honoring celebrities (check Harrah's Millenniums) who have performed within the casino, including boxers, singers, comedians, TV and Hollywood movie stars; and historical events such as the Bi-Centennial and Millennium chips. Many casinos issue these as limited editions and number the chips, making them valuable when they are no longer available at the casino cage. And then collectors enlarge their collection as they gain confidence as well as an area of interest and expertise.

Another resource for collectors new and old is attending chip shows. If you have the time and means, a collector can browse chip shows all across the country. In Southern California, Jim Munding's Casinorama (the first casino collectibles show in America) displays his and other dealers' collections twice a year. This year's events occur March 25, 2000 and later October 21, 2000, both at the Arcadia Masonic Hall in Arcadia, CA. For more information on this regional show, call Jim Munding (626) 919-0603 or email him at MUN3335@aol.com. Bill Neal of Illinois produces a similar showing Saturday, March 18 at the Holiday Inn (Holidome) in Elmhurst. Hotel reservations before March 3 offer discounts and can be made by calling (630) 279-1100; dealers and collectors call (708) 562-6060 for more information about the show. And of course the club representing collectors all across America, CC & GTCC, meets annually in Las Vegas with the first show of the new millennium July 20, 21, & 22, 2000 at the Tropicana Hotel & Casino. Collectors share their pride in the hobby all across the country by continually opening new chapters of the CC & GTCC and producing outstanding shows.


Collecting chips isn't the only advantage to attending a show. Not only can you meet wonderful people who share your hobby, but a collector can glean a good deal of information by attending showings. Consider the one Bob Gabel annually produces on the Mississippi Gulf Coast. This year the Third Annual Blast From the Past: Then and Now Casino Chips & Collectibles Show & Sale, hosted for the second year by the Imperial Palace, Biloxi, MS the weekend before Thanksgiving, promises to be of equal quality with shows in the past. The Blast From The Past Chip Show features dealers from California to Pennsylvania to Florida with a variety of chips including Indians, Riverboats, and Casinos, both legal and illegal. The show sets aside one night prior to opening to the public for dealers to look over the collections and make purchases and trades. Also appearing and speaking the past two years have been club owners such as Rip Poulos from the illegal days of Mississippi gaming, who authenticated illegal Mississippi chips. Another speaker, Fernando J. Cuquet, opened the first legal casino, Splash, in North Mississippi, and plans now to re-open the closed Cotton Club from Greenville, MS as the Mhoon Landing Casino in Tunica, MS. Also represented are the chip collectors' club CC & GTCC, Greg Susong's web board, magazine publishers and writers, special interest speakers on Indians, riverboats, ivories, state illegals, and a collection of chips and memorabilia from all over the world. To find out more about the Mississippi Blast From the Past, email the producer at GABELS@prodigy.net. Attending shows and club meetings makes adding to one's collection easier by putting hard-to-get chips in one location at a relatively smaller cost than traveling the country and picking them up

firsthand.

Even though the hobby of chip collecting is predominantly male-oriented, men welcome and encourage women to participate. Women have served as officers on the board of CC & GTCC, and the current editor of the club news is female. In addition, ladies publish many of the top gaming magazines found in casino poker rooms. The current collectors and organizations look forward to assisting new members in forming the basis of what can become an impressive collection of chips and casino memorabilia.



19th Century Bone Gaming Counters


Animal bone was the most common material used to manufacture gaming chips or counters in the nineteenth century. Clay chips first appeared about 1890 and were used mostly in America, while chips made of ivory were too pricey for the average game player. Wealthy European gamesters played with chips made of mother-of-pearl. Metal counters were nearly as common as their bone counterparts, but have seemed to generate little interest among chip collectors.

Bone counters can be classified into the following categories: plain, numeral, monogram and design. Monogram chips were custom made for a few clubs or casinos as well as individuals. The most common sets were dyed in four colors and contained no engraving. Each set usually contained square, rectangular, and small and large circular counters. Some early sets were all fish carved of bone. Photos on the following pages show examples of the various types of bone gaming counters.




Nineteenth Century Monogrammed Bone Counters




Nine examples of sets of fancy bone game counters. Each set came in quantities of four different colors. Counters are 85% of actual size.




A variety of bone counters and bone trump indicators used in such games as loo, quadrille, chemin-de-fer, Pope Joan, ombre, poque and brag.

Occasionally a few bone chips or sets will surface in the states or Canada, but most of these chips are to be found in the antique shops, flea markets and auctions around London and Paris. The engraved, colorful chips are definitely old, interesting and collectible. One more reason to plan that trip abroad.

Concentric Bone Counters



Several ivory chip souvenirs were made around the 1920's. These commemorative chips most often were engraved with the names of Mississippi river boats. Many contained the initials "U.S.M.P." which stood for "United States Mail Packet". It is obvious on some of these chips that they were made from used ivory chips by shaving down the old engraving and then re-engraving the commemorative message. About two dozen different commemoratives have been found. A similar number have been counterfeited. A new find which is a legitimate twenties commemorative is shown below. The fact that the ivory chip contains a "\$50" on one side and a "\$20" on the reverse strengthens our conjecture that these chips were only commemoratives and never used for playing Faro or Poker.




