

New CC>CC Claims Form

Enclosed in this issue of the magazine is the new, standardized CC & GTCC Claims Form. You MUST use this form to file a Claim against another Club member.

Up until now, there has never been a uniform, standardized way of filing a Claim against another member for an alleged Code of Ethics violation. Claims have been filed over the years in formats ranging from hand written notes, typed 5-6 page letters to just an email saying "I want to file a claim against ______".

Most of the time the information provided to the Club is vague and/or incomplete. The Claims Director may spend more time gathering basic information that should have been provided in the first place, than on resolving the issue at hand.

This form provides all the basic information needed by the Club, in written form, first hand from the member filing the complaint.

The process will work as follows:

- 1. Fill out the form completely, sign and date it.
- 2. Forward it Vice-President Wayne Thompson.
- 3. V.P. Thompson will make an initial determination on the Claim.
- 4. If further action or investigation is warranted, V.P. Thompson will forward the form to the Claims Director to open a Claims Investigation.
- 5. The Claims Director will work to mutually resolve the matter between the parties or if that is not possible, make a recommendation to the Board of Directors for the appropriate action.
- 6. The Board will act on the recommendation and the final report of the Claims Director. The parties involved will be notified of the final decision of the Board by Vice President Thompson.

IF you find it necessary to file a Claim against a fellow Club member, please help us to resolve the matter as quickly as possible by using the Claims Form.

*The form will be available on the Club website at www.ccgtcc.com for you to download and print out. We are working on a program that will allow you to fill out the form online and send it electronically to Vice President Thompson. We will notify the membership once this format is available.

Treasurer's Report

As of April 30, 2005, the cash balance in the Club's accounts is \$231,320. For the first four months of 2005, the Club treasury increased its cash position by \$45,980, excluding Convention tournament registration of \$9,200 and Building Fund donations of \$1,185. This does not include the expenditure for the Spring issue of the Club magazine. Please see the accompanying financial statements for more detail related to income, expenditures, and the breakdown of the equity accounts.

Highlights for the first 4 months of 2005:

- 1. 11 members became Life Members. The Club now has 109 Life Members and 5 Honorar Life Members.
- 2. Convention 2005 paid registration through April 30, 2005:
 - a. Pre-registration 192 for \$1,920
 - b. Banquet 137 for \$4,795
 - c. Poker Tournament 94 for \$7,520
 - d. Blackjack Tournament 21 for \$1,680
- 3. The balance in the Building Fund is \$59,438.
- 4. The audit of the 2004 Club records was performed on February 1, 2005. A hearty thanks to Mike Skelton, Dave Harber and Tyrus Mulkey for participating again and to Wayne Thompson for helping out this year.
- 5. The 2004 tax return was filed on February 15, 2005.

CC>CC Vision & Feasibility Committee Update

The following is the final memo from Jim Pierre, Chairman of the Vision and Feasibility Committee, to the committee members following meetings in Las Vegas earlier this year. After returning from this trip Jim became very ill and as many of you may know, passed away in April. The memo has been edited from its original form and comments added for clarity and context. The opening line is somewhat profound. We miss Jim very much and the committee will move forward with Jim Pierre listed as Chairman Emeritus. Respectfully submitted, Mike Skelton.

Hi Team - I have finally returned from an extended trip which included Las Vegas, Arizona and California (and recovered form a small bout of illness).

Here is an update on the Building situation. While I was in Vegas for the "Super Show" there was a coincident meeting the CC & GTCC Board, so Mike Skelton & Mike Quinlivan were also in town. Bill Judge, Tyrus Mulkey, Mike Skelton, Mike Quinlivan & I looked over the properties that Bill evaluated. There was one that was a standout.

This property is located on Convention Center Drive about a block off the strip and within walking distance of the Las Vegas Convention Center. It is almost directly across the street from where the new 500 will be going in. (There are redevelopment projects on the drawing board for both the old Royal Hotel and the Greek Isles Hotel, which are across the street from this location.) It is about a block south of the Riviera.

The property is a small strip mall

with spaces ranging from 990SF to 16500SF. The most appealing space was 1900SF at \$1.20/sf/yr. That figures out to \$27,360 per year. I am sorry that there was not enough time to bring everyone into the decision making progress, but the attractiveness of this site urged expedited action. The 5 committee members in attendance were unanimous in their approval of this site. (There was a definite consensus on this location, but there was no official, binding vote taken on this space by the committee or the Board. Everyone who saw the location agreed that this was an extremely attractive location for us, with reasonable costs.)

Mike Skelton, Tyrus Mulkey & I also met with David Schwartz of UNLV. There is no possibility that we will be able to obtain any space from them. "If we had any available space, there are lots of things we have that we would like to exhibit." (The entire campus is short on space. David's other telling comment was, "The only thing more precious around here than money, is space.") We agreed to work together and serve as resources for each other in the future. (In fact, I have already had an inquiry from Dave regarding the Four Queens 1995 UNLV chip.)

In other news, Sandra Harris has resigned as Director of the Neon Museum. In a separate meeting with Mike Skelton, she offered to help us, maybe even do some consulting work, if it became very involved from her time stand point, which I understand. She also said the Convention Center Drive site was better for us than even the Museum corridor. Location, visibility and independence from any one casino or

benefactor were positive factors. (These same comments were expressed by David Schwartz of UNLV.) We can go to everyone with our hand out! She stressed that if we really pushed a "retail" component at the location, we could offset most, if not all of our overhead cost.

Next step: Evaluate the feasibility of operating this property, which includes investigating overhead expenses, staffing expenses, alternative funding sources, estimated sales income possibilities. (Of course with Jim's illness and untimely passing, this was put on hold. We have some preliminary figures on the space cost, but Mike Quinlivan (who was sidelined for a while with his own illness), Bill Judge and Mike Skelton will be meeting with the building owner the last week of June, to discuss detailed costs associated with this location. The original 1900 sq ft space is still available at this time. Once we have all the numbers, a detailed and thorough cost analysis will be completed. The next step will be driven by the results of this analysis.

With Jim's passing, CC & GTCC President, Mike Skelton has assumed the acting Chairmanship of the Vision & Feasibility Committee. Committee member Tyrus Mulkey has stepped down from the committee due to time constraints stemming from his new business. Committee member Mike Quinlivan (who is also the CC & GTCC Treasurer) was sidelined due to illness, but we are happy to report he is feeling much better now. The current make up of the committee will remain as is for the time being. There may an additional committee member

added and/or some unforeseen cause for someone to step down. President Skelton will appoint any additional committee member(s) that may be required.

When there is additional information to report, that information will be published.

Please support the efforts of the Building Fund Committee at the upcoming Convention and throughout the year. We will make this dream become a reality one day!

The Robert "Bob" Mera Award

The Board of Directors has voted unanimously to rename the Recruiter of the Year award, The Robert "Bob" Mera Award. This award is given each year to the Club member who recruits the largest number of new members into the CC>CC. It is a fitting honor for a man whose recruiting activities were instrumental in the early growth of the Club.

CC>CC Hall of Fame member Robert "Bob" Mera was an avid blackjack player who eventually became a dealer in several Atlantic City casinos. It was as a dealer that he developed his love for casino chips. In the early 1990's, Bob began selling casino chips and related items from a pushcart at the Boardwalk One mall near Caesars Atlantic City. Soon he opened a retail shop in the mall and called it the "Gaming Emporium."

Bob's shop became the unofficial headquarters for chipping activity in Atlantic City, with many club members stopping in whenever they were in the area. As a result of his enthusiasm for the hobby and his unique exposure in the mall, Bob became the top recruiter of new members for CC>CC for an unprecedented five years in a row: 1990 through 1994.

In 1995, Bob became the driving force behind the formation of the Atlantic City Chapter of CC>CC, one of the Club's first chapters. He is credited with having recruited a majority of the members of the 350-member chapter.

Robert "Bob" Mera passed away in 1999, and was inducted into the Hall of Fame posthumously in 2002.

The Platinum Collection

The Platinum Collection

In several months collectors will have a unique opportunity to bid (or watch others bid) on one of America's greatest gaming collections that combines gaming check rarities and gaming tokens. The Platinum collection has two distinct characteristics that set it apart from other collections. As a collection of gaming tokens, it is the definitive collection that has almost every known specimen issued by Nevada casinos. As a collection of gaming checks, it features some of the great rarities from Reno, Lake Tahoe and Las Vegas. As a combined collection, it has the distinction of being a collection that can not be reproduced and is the single finest collection of Nevada chips and tokens in the world. James Campiglia, a consultant to the collection, has represented many of the collection pieces as being very desirable and extremely rare. Gaming Archaeology's considers the gaming tokens to be abundant in rarities in super condition. The collection is named for the unique platinum dollar gaming token that the Franklin Mint made for William Harrah in 1965 and is considered to be the first Nevada gaming token.

Building the Collection

The Platinum collection has a unique provenance that has given it both depth and quality. Major portions of the collection are the original pieces acquired by Harvey's Resort Hotel starting in 1965. Additional rarities from other great collections as well as single pieces that have surfaced over the last decade have been added to the collection in recent years.



Harvey's original collection contained more than 26,000 gaming checks from around the world and around 3,800 different Nevada gaming tokens. Between 1965, when the collection was started and the early 1990's, when the collection was sold, Harvey's obtained many of the rarest and highest quality gaming checks and tokens that were available when collecting gaming items was in its infancy. In several instances over the years, entire collections were purchased and combined into a master collection of checks and tokens. A number of dealers assisted in the development of the token collection including Elta Gray and Frank Mantell. Checks and tokens were constantly upgraded and duplicates were traded for additional items.

In the early 1990's, Harvey's collection was sold to new owners and the gaming checks were auctioned over a period of 4 years. Several casino check groups in the collection were purchased by a single collector who continued to acquire additional material that specialized on the strip casinos of Las Vegas.

The entire gaming token collection remained intact and the new owner continued to collect as new pieces were issued by the casinos. In every instance, the best condition was

sought. In several instances entire collections were purchased to combine missing pieces with the master collection. These included the superb collection of Dr. Ariagno and the unique dies and samples of the 1965 gaming tokens produced by Osbourne Coinage Co. In the 1990's, the unique Harrah's platinum token was finally added to the token collection making it the most complete in the world.

Today, the collection represents the definitive collection of Nevada gaming tokens and contains numerous patterns, proofs and specimen strikes along with the standard business strikes.

Luck, fate and fortune have all played a hand in the creation of the Platinum collection. Despite being sold a number of times, many of the original checks from Harvey's collection are still in the group. Having been sold to some of America's top collectors of the day such as Gene Grossblatt, Bruce Landau and Jerry Wall, these pieces have once again found their way back into the collection.

Gaming checks and tokens are the tangible artifacts of a casinos existence. With many of the rarest and most historic checks and tokens included, the Platinum collection reflects the development of the Nevada gaming industry from the crowded club rooms of the 1930's to the Mega strip resorts of Las Vegas in the 21st Century.

As gaming checks and tokens continue to gain in popularity with collectors, this pioneering collection

will always be recognized as one of the defining collections of the hobby. With 2,400 plus gaming checks and more than 3,800 gaming tokens, the collection reflects the wide variety of gaming check and token styles that Nevada casinos have used for the past 74 years of legalized gaming. The Platinum collection reflects 40 years of collecting. Collectors and gaming historians can view the collection at www.chipsandtokens.com

Gaming Checks from the Platinum Collection

1 \$5 Harrah's Reno, Nevada - Circa 1950's

One of Harrah's first inlaid gaming checks. As Harrah's developed from a "tango" or bingo parlor to a full fledged gaming house, they began to expand on Virginia Street. At first they used plain hot stamped checks, but graduated to the more expensive inlaid checks in the early 1950's.

2 \$100 Colony Club Reno, Nevada (1946-1964)

This small casino was located on the corner of Virginia street and Commercial Row in downtown Reno. The owners would not sell to their neighbor Harolds club but leased the roof to Harolds for a sign. Every month the check for the sign rental came in from Harolds and the rest of the gaming profits were gravy.

\$5 The Town House Reno, Nevada - (Circa 1950's)

Featuring "The Riding Lesson" by Lou Hymer - a local illustrator's famous characterization of the dude ranch cowboy and two divorcees getting a riding lesson in a bar. The small club operated from 1932 to 1955. Its cozy atmosphere was favored by locals.

\$100 Bank Club Reno Reno, Nevada - (Circa 1940's)

Reno's most famous club of the 1930's and 1940's operated by Bill Graham and James McKay.

Originally opened in the basement of the building prior to the legalization

of gaming in 1931, the Bank Club moved up to the street level in April of 1931 with a "Grand Opening" that celebrated the legalization of gaming and its acceptance by Reno's citizens.

5 \$5 New China Club Reno, Nevada - (1952-1971)

One of Reno's clubs that catered to clientele of all races during the days when Nevada gaming was segregated. Bill Fong operated the club and featured keno as well as a full line of table games.

6 50¢ Zimba's Reno, Nevada (1969-1972)

A small club located in Reno's Commercial Row area. One of the more colorful checks issued in Nevada in a low denomination.

7 \$1000 Harold's Club Reno, Nevada (1935-1970)

Possibly one of Reno's most world famous casinos. A high denomination check featuring a portrait of its founder Harold Smith in his cowboy hat. The club actively promoted their business around the world with signs that noted the distance to Harolds Club. After years of family ownership, the Smith family sold the casino to Howard Hughes in 1970.

8 \$100 RR (Reno Ramada) Reno, Nevada (1980-1989)

A small casino operation to the northeast of the downtown center. The casino survived for 9 years but could not compete against the solid downtown clubs. Their brass core checks were an innovation in gaming checks. Dealers favored the weight

but sometimes complained that the edges were too sharp.

9 10¢ Palace Club Reno, Nevada (1934-1979)

One of Reno's oldest clubs that was operating before the legalization of gaming in 1931. The club was located near the train station and could trace its roots to the days before gaming was prohibited in 1910.

10 \$2.50 Primadonna Club Reno, Nevada (1955-1974)

Ernie Primm's club featured larger than life dancing girl statues over its entrance on Virginia Street. This style of gaming check features a "pie" color design. Ernie Primm was an experienced gambler from the card rooms of Gardena, California who moved to Nevada.

11 \$5 China Mint Reno, Nevada (1960-1963)

One of Reno's Asian clubs located on Lake Street between 1960 and 1963. The owners, Frank Chung, Henry Leong, Andrew Young and William Baily Sr. operated slots and table games. In 1963 they moved their license to the Happy Budda Club.

12 \$20 United Club Reno Reno, Nevada (1962-1964)

A small club located in Douglas Alley, an area where Reno's gaming started in the late 1920's. This club was owned by Gene and Tom Wong. They featured slots, 21 and a poker game. The Club closed in October of 1964.



13 25¢ Club Cal-Neva Reno, Nevada (1962-)

Originally located in the heart of Reno on the corner of Center and Second Streets, this club has expanded over the years to include the entire block. Besides featuring table games and slots, the club's owners have licensed sports books in many other casinos in the state.

14 \$500 Circus-Circus Reno, Nevada (1978-)

After a sucessful casino venture in Las Vegas, the owners of Circus - Circus bought a department store in Reno and converted it into a casino. Nevada's gaming control board certified that only two examples were not accounted for when they destroyed these high value gaming checks.

15 \$1 Christmas Tree Mount Rose Highway S. of Reno (1954-1959)

This small steakhouse featured mahagony broiled steaks and a view over Reno from the side of a mountain. Its "casino" usually had only a couple of table games. During the ownership of the restaurant by Guy and Gloria Michaels, Gloria's exotic lion pets were frequently seen.

16 \$25 Golden Bank Reno, Nevada (1955-1962)

When the Tomerlin brothers bought the Golden Hotel they had no gaming experience. In 1955 William and James Tomerlin combined the Bank Club and the Golden Hotel casino by cutting a doorway in the wall between the two operation to create the Golden Bank. The casino operated until destroyed by a fire in 1962.

17 \$5 Frontier Reno Reno, Nevada (1946-1956)

In the heart of downtown Reno, this casino featured the highest keno limit of \$10,000 in 1953. Only when Binion's in Las Vegas went to \$25,000 was the limit outdone. This club was absorbed into Harrah's in 1956.

18 \$100 Holiday Hotel Reno, Nevada (1956-1962)

Originally opened in 1955 as only a hotel without gambling, the property failed. In 1956, Newt Crumley of Elko, Nevada purchased in interest in the property and put in gaming. The property became successful until the untimely death of Mr. Crumley in an airplane accident n 1962.

19 \$2.50 Horseshoe Club Reno, Nevada (1956-1977)

This denomination was used to pay blackjack bets. The casino was in the heart of the downtown gaming block on virginia Street and owned by a group of investors. The horseshoe sign was touted as the biggest horseshoe in the world.

20 100 Mapes Hotel Reno, Nevada (1947-1982)

Downtown Reno's highrise hotel that featured a casino/dining room on the top floor. For years the Mapes offered Reno's top accommodations. This check features a metal wafer inlay popular in the late 1940's. The casino used two sets of gaming checks, one for the first floor casino and a second set at the Skyroom. This system allowed an accounting of the number of players who visited both casino areas.

21 \$5 Primadonna Club Reno, Nevada (1955-1974)

The Primadonna girl sits on a slot machine and offers a drink and a keno ticket. One of the downtown core casinos on Virginia Street, this gaming check is one of the older checks from the casino.

22 (no value) Nevada Club Reno, Nevada (1946-1988)

These chips were made for the exclusive use of Reno millionaire Lavere Redfield by the club owner Lincoln Fitzgerald. Their value could be determined at the time of play. Redfield and Fitzgerald had been friends from the days of the depression in Detroit where both men started their fortunes.

23 \$500 MGM Grand Hotel Reno, Nevada (1978-1986)


The first destination resort hotel to be built in Reno. The MGM offered guests a complete resort destination facility. The MGM was predicted to be the start of a massive casino expansion in Reno, but over the years, casino growth has declined in Reno.

24 \$100 Riverside Hotel Reno, Nevada (1954-1959)

The "hot stamp" check was used at one of Reno's oldest hotels.

Originally dating from the 1880's, the hotel was rebuilt by George

Wingfield in the 1920's with additions in the 1950's. The hotel still stands today and is used as an art complex. In its hayday, the Riverside featured top name entertainment and a full line of table games.



25

\$100 Cal-Neva Biltmore Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1952-1956)

This hotel catered to players from San Francisco who visited Lake Tahoe's north shore in the summers. Originally operating on a seasonal basis, the Biltmore featured hotel rooms and a separate casino. In 1956 the hotel was purchased by Lincoln Fitagerald and renamed the Nevada Lodge.

26

\$25 Cal-Neva (Lodge) Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1937)

These checks were featured at the famous Lake Tahoe lodge after a disastrous fire in May of 1937 resulted in a rebuilding of the property for an opening on July 4th!! Owners, Graham and McKay, excerised their considerable power in Reno to have the Lodge completed on time. The construction is still considered as some of the most beautiful at the Lake with the California/Nevada state line running through the Indian Room and the swimming pool.

27

\$500 Kings Castle Incline Village, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1968-1974)

A high value check from this Lake Tahoe casino that ran afoul of gaming regulations and was closed by authorities. Financed by the teamsters Union, the casino operated for several years until authorities questioned their accounting.

28

\$25 Crystal Bay Club Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (circa 1950's)

This early check may be the only

surviving example of the denomination. This club featured seasonal gaming in the 1950's and 1960's. Recently remodeled by new owners, the club now offers year round hospitality. The original casino housed a bowling alley with a spectacular open ceiling that now serves as the restaurant.

29

\$25 New Cal-Vada Lodge Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1956-1958)

Operating for a brief time in the 1950's, the casino was purchased by the Nevada Lodge after an arson attempt failed to ignite the building. The closed casino was used for storage until it was sold and remodeled as a brewery.

30

\$1 Cal-Neva Lodge Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1955-1958)

One of the various ownerships of the lodge issued this check in the late 1950's. Seasonally operating, the casino was open from Late May through Labor Day.

31

\$5 Joby's Monte Carlo Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1955-1956)

Operated by Joby Lewis for two seasons, the casino was bought by the Nevada Lodge and annexed as a bingo room. Mr. Lewis moved to Hawthorne, Nevada and opened a casino also named the Monte Carlo.

32

roulette Cal-Neva (Lodge) Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1937)

One of the beautiful pine cone motif roulette chips used on the casinos roulette tables. These chips were issued following the May 1937 fire that destroyed the original casino.

33

\$5 Sierra Tahoe Incline Village, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1965-1966)

This operation lasted for a single year on the north shore of Lake Tahoe. Today the building, on the shore of Lake Tahoe, operates as a restaurant only.

34

\$100 CLN (Cal-Neva Lodge) (1948-1955)

One of the most intriguing lettering styles on a Nevada gaming check. One of the mysteries of this check is why the full name of the casino was not used. It is possible that this high denomination was used for special play or for a special game.

35

\$20 Nevada Club Nevada Lodge Reno & Crystal Bay Nevada (1958-1988)

A denomination that was popular in the 1950's that corresponded to U.S. currency values. In the 1960, almost every casino used the \$25 denomination that encouraged gamblers to play an extra \$5. Lincoln Fitzgerald operated both the Nevada Lodge and the Nevada Club in Reno.

36

\$100 Ta-Neva-Ho Crystal Bay, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1937-1940's)

This small gaming casino eventually developed into the Crystal Bay Club. With seasonal gaming and several changes in ownership over the years the club had erratic operations until Johnny Rayburn took control and developed the property into the Crystal Bay club.



37\$5 Dopey NormanStateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (circa 1953)

Raymond N Reinberg operated a card game in Vallejo before moving to Lake Tahoe and operating a small club squeezed between the California state line and George Cannon's Gateway Club. Raymond's nickname "Dopey" was given by George Cannon and other friends for his more than frequent drinking.

38

\$5 Barney's Casino Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1967-1983)

Started by Barney O'Malia in 1967, this small club had been the Circus Room. When Harrah's expanded Bill's Casino, they purchased Barney's and incorporated it into the expansion. Barney O'Malia's gaming career included gambling in Hawthorne and Fallon, Nevada.

39 \$5 Nugget Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1965-1968)

This small casino was owned by a group of partners. Several years after the principal partner, Dick Chartrand, was killed by a car bomb, the casino was sold.

40

\$100 State Line Country Club Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1953-1956)

Originally built in 1931, the club had a casino and show room. After a number of ownerships and casino operators, the club was purchased by Bill Harrah and operated for a year as Harrah's Stateline Country Club before it was torn down in 1959 for the building of Harrah's Tahoe.

41 \$5 South Shore Riverboat Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1970)

A one season operation casino that lasted for two months in the summer of 1970 The single 21 table and six slot machines filled the club.

42 \$2.50 Harvey's

Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1963-)

Starting in 1945 as Harvey's Wagon Wheel Saloon & Gambling Hall, Harvey and Llewellyn Gross built a small restaurant into Lake Tahoe's first high rise hotel. By staying open during the hardest winters and working 20 hour shifts, they managed to survive the seasonal tourist fluctuations of the Lake.

43

\$100 John's Tahoe Nugget Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1981-1991)

John Fultz purchased the South Tahoe Nugget from the estate of Richard Chartrand and operated the club for 10 years. After ten years of operation the casino was again sold.

44

\$25 Harrah's Club Reno and Lake Tahoe (1956)

Bill Harrah purchased George Cannon's Gateway Club on the west side of highway 50 in 1955. At the time Harrah's Club had a logo featuring a sultan with his harem. This logo was a part of Harrah's famous campaign slogan "I hit the jackpot at Harrah's". A local rumor has it that someone once commented that the chip was Bill Harrah and his wives a quip that resulted in the demise of the logo.

\$2.50 Sahara Tahoe Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1965-1983)

The Del Webb corporation leased land from Park Cattle Co. and built a hotel casino at Lake Tahoe. Taking the name of their flagship property, the Sahara in Las Vegas, they created the Sahara Tahoe. This \$2.50 blackjack check featured their Lake Tahoe logo.

46

\$20 Sahara Tahoe Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1965-1983)

In 1965, the Bud Jones company developed a metal center plastic gaming check. This example from the Sahara Tahoe is one of the earliest checks of this type. The \$20 denomination was frequently used for baccarat tables.

47

Tahoe Village Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1949-1951)

This metal wafer roulette chip is one of a series featuring the recreational assets of Lake Tahoe. The Tahoe Village featured a full line of gaming. Located about one mile north of the stateline, the property overlooked a meadow that went down to the lake.

48

\$100 Sky Harbor Stateline, Lake Tahoe Nevada (1949-1951)

Located about a mile north of the stateline, Sky Harbour was south Lake Tahoe's only airport. A small casino was located near the highway 50 end of the runway. Operating seasonally, the club featured full gaming and a showroom.



49

\$100 Golden Nugget Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1970's)

From the casino that was the focus of downtown Las Vegas for decades. The golden Nugget was first opened in 1946. Its colorful entrance symbolized the bright lights of Glitter Gulch, the tacky name for Fremont St.

50

\$5 Bouder Club Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1931-1960)

The Boulder Club was considered as a working man's joint. It gaming checks featured the image of Boulder Dam, the club's namesake. The pattern of arrows and dice around the center inlay is the manufacturer's "mold" pattern. This "arrow-die" mold is one of the most popular with collectors and this issue of the "Boulder Club" is one of the top 10 checks from Las Vegas.

51

\$25 El Cortez Hotel Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1947-1963)

This gaming check is a classic example of the artwork of the 1950's. For years the hotel was operated by Jackie Gaughan, the dean of Las Vegas gamblers. Customers could find Jackie picking up papers from the carpet or just looking around at the action.

52

\$1 Fremont Hotel Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1956-1985)

This classic "arrow-dice" mold gamingcheck is one of the more colorful issued by the hotel. Its attractive colors and early issue make it one of the more desirable checks for collectors.

53

\$5 Lucky Casino Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1963-1967)

At the present time, this is the only known example of this check that is undrilled. It is one of the super checks from downtown Las Vegas. Like other casinos in the area, this operation was boght by the Golden Nugget and its building incorporated into the Nugget block.

54

\$25 Binion's Horseshoe Club Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1951-1958)

Benny Binion was a true gambler. His Horseshoe Club remained one of the purest gambling houses in Las Vegas. Your first bet was your limit. This club held a number of firsts including a single million dollar roll of the dice on the craps table to the World renowned World Series of Poker. This check is one of 7 in collections.

55

\$5 Cotton Club Las Vegas, Nevada (Westside) (1947-1948)

The Cotton Club was located on the West side of Las Vegas. In the segregation days of Las Vegas even the most famous entertainers like Sammy Davis Jr. had to stay in this section of town.

56

\$1 The Mint Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1957-1966)

This casino was opened by Sam Boyd and a group of investors. The casino was slowly expanded as other adjacent properties became available. In 1966 the Del Webb corporation purchased the property and built a hotel. The crown mold on this check is from the T.R. King Co. of Los Angeles.

57

\$25 Pioneer Club Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1948-1956)

The pioneer was located in the heart of Glitter Gulch. It's famous sign featuring the cowboy Vegas Vic dominated Fremont street and for years was the symbol of Las Vegas. The casino is now a gift shop, but Vegas Vic continues to wave.

58

\$25 The Westerner Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1954-1960)

Located at 22 Fremont street, the Westerner was once operated by Benny Binion when he first arrived on the Las Vegas scene. The casino featured a western atmosphere in the heart of Glitter Gulch.

59

\$5 Las Vegas Club Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1951-1961)

The famous Las Vegas gaming check featured the one armed bandit slot machines that the Las Vegas club was famous for. These slot machines were housed in hand carved wooden statues of outlaws made by Frank Polk.

60

\$1 Silver Palace Downtown Las Vegas, Nevada (1963-1964)

This gaming check features a likeness of the U.S. peace dollar that circulated up to the silver crisis days of 1964 when rising silver prices drove the last of the silver dollars off of the gaming tables of Nevada.



\$100 Dunes HotelLas Vegas strip, Nevada(1983-1988)

With one of the largest neon signs on the strip, the casino specialized in junket flights from the east coast. With an adjoining golf course, the hotel was a choice property and when Steve Wynn saw the chance, he bought the hotel, imploded it and built the Mirage in its place. This check features the top section of the famous Dunes sign.

62

\$1 Milton Prell's Aladdin Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1966-1968)

Milton Prell's dream to build a resort hotel came true with the Aladdin in 1966. After two years of operations, the hotel fell on hard times and was taken over by the Parvin-Dorman group. This original issue gaming check was used in the card room of the hotel. At the present time, it is one of three known examples.

63

\$500 Milton Prell's Aladdin Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1966-1968)

This high value check is not only colorful but highly collectible because of its "pie" color combinations and its denomination. An original issue of the Aladdin in 1966.

64

\$25 Wilbur Clark's Desert Inn Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1950-1967)

Wilbur Clark's dream hotel was the Desert Inn. Although financial problems required that Clark take on additional financial partners, the Desert Inn was always considered to be the Clark's. Over the years Wilbur Clark became one of the most outstanding hosts of Las Vegas. His golf Tournament of Champions became famous throughout the country.

65

\$100 Hotel Bonanza Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1967-1973)

The Bonanza was built on the corner of Flamingo and Las Vegas
Boulevard when the strip was still
developing southward. It operated for
a few years until an enterprising man
named Kirk Kerkorian purchased the
casino and built the MGM Grand on
the property. The Bonanza had a
western theme but was never a great
success.

66

\$1000 Desert Inn Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1988-2003)

After the days of Wilbur Clark, Howard Hughes and others, the DI and its golf course maintained a solid position on the strip. But all good things in Las Vegas have to make way for better things and today the once proud property of the DI houses the newest (for the moment) creation of the city in the form of the Wynn Hotel.

67

\$5 Ceasars Palace Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1966-1969)

The original issue of Caesars
Palace featured Caesar on a couch. A
modern tribute to the opulence of
Rome and the Caesars all on the
northwest corner of Flamingo and Las
Vegas Boulevard south. Caesars
quickly became the home of the high
rollers in Las Vegas and still holds
its own on the strip where a world of
gilded glitz and glitter abound.

68

\$5 Dunes Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1955-1956)

The original Dunes gaming checks featured a giant Arabian palace guard complete with symitar and turban. As one of the rarest and most sought after gaming checks of the classic period of the mid-1950's, this check is a true treasure.

69

roulette Dunes Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1955-1956)

The roulette wheels of the Dunes featured their classic Arabian palace guard logo. One of the most popular roulette chip series for collectors, this yellow issue is one of 4 or 5 know to have survived over the years.

70

\$5 Hotel Dunes Card Room Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1970's)

This special use check has a non-negotiable value of \$5 for use in the card room.

71

\$5 Dunes Hotel Country Club Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1956-1980)

This check shows a portrait of the hotel as it appeared in its later years. This extremely hard to find check is popular with collectors.

72

\$25,000 Dunes Baccarat Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1989-1993)

This extremely high value check was strictly for high rollers in the Dunes' baccarat game.



73\$25 The FlamingoLas Vegas strip, Nevada (1946)

Benjamin Siegel ordered these gaming checks from the B.C. Wills Co. of Detroit in late 1946 for his dream casino. A flat check with a metal wafer inlay was used on the craps tables.

74

50¢ Flamingo Capri Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1973-1979)

This small neighbor of the well known Flamingo began as a motel and a coffee shop. The coffee shop became a small casino with slots and then gaming tables.

75 \$25 El R

\$25 El Rancho Vegas Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1949-1960)

Most of the old timers in Las Vegas will tell you that Bugsy Siegel did not start the strip - and they will point to the El Rancho Vegas as evidence. Built in 1944, the El Rancho was located on the corner of what is now Sahara and Las Vegas Boulevard. On June 17, 1960 the casino burned in a spectacular fire. The gaming check is one of those recovered from the fire.

76

\$100 The Flamingo Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1946)

When the Flamingo opened, they used the B.C. Wills "Grecian design" checks on the blackjack tables as opposed to the smooth craps checks. Both issues had the metal wafer inaly. This classic original issue of the Flamingo was one of 19 found in a small hoard in the 1990's. The demand for this check far outstrips the quantity available.

77 25 The Flamingo Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1947-48)

One of the hardest to find checks of the Flamingo with only 2 known examples as of this date. A beautiful and classic check, this issue appeared after Siegel was gunned down.

78

Flamingo Las Vegas strip, Nevada (early 1950's

This smooth "crest & seal" roulette has the Flamingo's famous "bubble tower" that was put up in the early 1950's.

79

\$100 Flamingo Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1971-1990)

This issue of the Flamingo was made after the property was purchased by the Hilton Hotels. The gaming check is an example of a "house" mold. In the 1970's, a number of manufacturers offered customers the advantage of having a house mold rather than the manufacturers mold design. This additional security devise is now used by most of the larger casino in the world. This Flamingo issue, although later in the history of the casino still merits considerable attention from collectors.

80

\$25 The Flamingo Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1967-1973)

This Flamingo issue was made on the "H" mold by the H.C. Edwards company of New York. A very rare and sought after issue by the hotel in the 1970's.

81

5 Hotel Last Frontier Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1942-1951)

A smooth style craps check of the "crest & seal" type made by B.C. Wills for the hotel during the war. The Hotel Last Frontier featured a number of original buildings brought in from ghost towns in Nevada and California.

82

\$25 New Frontier Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1955-1956)

In the 1950's, the Frontier
Hotel caught the fever of the modern
times and remodeled. After a year
and a half of operation the hotel folded - apparently caught between its
historically oriented western past and
the modern era of formica and
modern styling. The property morphed into the Silver Slipper Gambling
Hall.

83

\$500 Frontier Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1967-1988)

Shortly after its opening by a group of investors, Howard Hughes swooped in and purchased the property. Located just a short distance from his recluse quarters at the Desert Inn.

84

\$5 New Frontier Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1955-1956)

One of the very few gaming checks made for a Nevada casino with the "hourglass" mold of Rigdon & Co. This check and an earlier issue on the "rectangle" mold of the Langworthy company apparently were used in the shrot 18 months of operation of the casino.



85

\$25 El Rancho Vegas Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1944-1947)

Wilbur Clark operated the El Rancho Vegas in the mid-1940's. As the first casino/hotel on what was to become the famous strip, the El Rancho became famous as a Las Vegas landmark.

86

\$500 Jockey Club Baccarat Las Vegas strip, Nevada (Gaming Never Opened-1980's)

Sometimes opening a casino can be a catch-22 situation. Licensing is a major consideration and more than once a group has been denied a license at the last minute. Ordering the gaming checks takes time for production. In the case of the Jockey Club, the checks were ordered, but the license did not come through.

87 \$5 Hacienda Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1956-1972)

From the first ownership of the casino, this check is one of the more popular checks with collectors with possibly only two know examples.

88

\$25 Landmark Hotel Las Vegas, Nevada (1969-1978)

The Landmark was located near the Las Vegas convention center, rather than on the traditional strip. It was built in 1967, but the original builder/owner went into bankruptcy. Howard Hughes purchased the property in 1969, completed construction and had a grand opening on July 1, 1969. Bob Maheu, who managed the Hughes properties, recalled the opening as "frantic" as the eccentric

Hughes refused to make final arrangements for the opening until the last moment.

89

\$10,000 Little Ceasars Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1970-1994)

Despite its small size, Little Caesars had one of the largest trades in sports betting in Las Vegas. High value sports bets were encouraged, thus the large denominations, especially for a small casino.

90

\$100 MGM-Sands Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1988-1989)

When Kirk Kerkorian sold his original MGM Grand property he purchased the Sands, Desert Inn, Marina and the Tropicana Country Club to park his money for the building of the new MGM Grand. His brief ownership resulted in an issue of gaming checks for his ownership under the name of the MGM and each of these casinos.

91 \$5 MGM Grand Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1976)

This bicentennial check is one of a dozen or so issued throughout the state. A number of casinos issued checks in 1976 that were termed "patriotic" with red, white and blue colors, but not with any direct statement of 1976 or "Bicentennial".

92 \$1,000 MGM-Desert Inn Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1988-1991)

One of Kirk Kerkorian's purchases following the sale of the original MGM.

93 \$5 Riviera Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1955)

This is one of the earliest issues of the hotel. The "balloons" or colored circles were used on the stationary for the grand opening press kit. This hotel is one of the last remaining of the group of hotels that were built in the 1950's as the Las Vegas strip expanded to the south.

94

\$25 Royal Nevada Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1955-1957)

When Sid Wyman and Charles "Kewpie" Rich had built the the Sands into a successful casino, they wanted their own resort hotel. After two years of financial problems with their new venture, they sold to the Stardust. The Royal Nevada Hotel was blended into the Stardust property.

95

\$25 Sahara Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1952-1961)

The property was built by the Del Webb corporation (who would eventually own the hotel). The second issue of gaming checks featured the hotel portico. This gaming check is presently the only known example of the denomination.

96

\$5 Sahara Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1952)

The first issue of the Sahara featuring the pyramid and Sphinx logo. This crest & seal is certainly in the top 10 issues of Las Vegas. We believe that the smooth surface check was used on the craps table.



97 \$5 The Sands Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1952-1967)

The Sands hotel second issue gaming check. This example is drilled (cancelled) in two places. Despite the cancellation, it is one of the rarest strip hotel gaming checks. The Sands featured the motto "A place in the sun." This incredibly rare check now has its own place in the sun.

98

\$100 The Sands Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1952-1967)

This is considered to be the 4th gaming check issue of the casino. The large sunburst and the stylized logo make it both a rarity and classic strip check. The Sands made history with entertainers like Frank Sinatra and the "rat pack".

99

\$25 The Sands Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1952-1967)

One of the more colorful issues of the Sands hotel from its early years. "A place in the sun" logo dates the piece to the early 1950's.

100

\$100 Silver Slipper Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1951-1956)

Certainly one of the top 10 best gaming checks from the Las Vegas strip casinos. The early zig-zag mold is combined with a high value to give this check spectacular popularity. Presently unique.

101

\$25 Silver Slipper Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1956-1968)

This classic gaming check has a secret. Hidden in the scroll work below the denomination is the name of one of the owners of the casino - "Shelby Williams". This intricate design work was recently discovered by collectors when the original art work for the check was examined.

102

\$25 Stardust Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1955-1958)

The first issue of the casino in 1955. The logo for the casino bares a striking resemblance to one that was in use in Covington Kentucky in the 1940's by one of the casino's owners - Moe Dalitz. This interesting piece is popular with collectors. The casino is one of the few surviving 1950's strip hotels.

\$25 Thunder Bird Hotel Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1949-1964)

Certainly an early issue of this casino as the thunderbird appears on the grand opening key chains. The "arrow-die" mold makes this a very collectible check and its rarity is the reason that it is missing in most collections.

104

\$5 Thunderbird Hotel (1949-1964)

The colorful thunderbird is taken directly from the large sign that stood at the edge of Las Vegas Blvd. The logo is one of the more colorful in Las Vegas.

105

\$25 Hotel Thunderbird Las Vegas strip, Nevada (1949-1964)

Listed as the 6th issue of the hotel, this denomination is very hard to find in any condition. Considered to be in the extremely rare category, this check is missing in almost every collection.



50 Cents Tropicana (1968-1972)

One of the most colorful checks issued in a "pie" configuration of colors. This casino is still the home of one of the longest running floor shows - the Folies Bergere.

107 \$500 The Sands (1960's)

In an attempt to cater to the customers who preferred the elegance of Monte Carlo, several Las Vegas casinos tried Baccarat in the 1960's. Using French style "plaques", the casinos ran the game in the subdued atmosphere that would be found in French casinos. The games failed to attract sufficient players and the casinos discarded the French style plaques and jetons. This great example from the Sands has two "lunettes" and a serial number.



Grand Sierra

Resort & Convention Center Reno

On May 11,2005, Caesars
Entertainment Inc. announced that it
has entered into a definitive agreement to sell its Reno Hilton casino
resort to Grand Sierra Resort Corp., a
Nevada-based hotel and resort developer, for approximately \$150 million.
The transaction is expected to close
by the end of the fourth quarter of
2005 and is subject to customary regulatory approvals and closing conditions
outlined in the purchase agreement.

With nearly 2,000 rooms, ten restaurants, 200,000 square feet of convention space, a world-class dinner theater and 107,000 square feet of gaming space with more than 1,300 slot machines, the Reno Hilton is one of the premier casino resorts in Northern Nevada. Grand Sierra Resort Corp. plans to reconstruct the property to create an entertainment destination, which will include one of

the world's largest indoor water parks. Upon approval of the Nevada Gaming Control Board and the Nevada Gaming Commission, Larry Woolf, former chief executive officer and chairman of MGM Grand Hotel, Las Vegas, will lease the property's gaming operations from Grand Sierra Resort Corp.

"We have some very exciting plans for the Reno Hilton, which I believe is one of the most exceptional properties in Nevada," said Thomas J. Schrade, president of Grand Sierra Resort Corp. "We will disclose further details of those plans as we move forward. Right now, we simply want to say that we are looking forward to working very closely with the people and public officials of Reno to develop an extraordinary resort that will create significant economic benefits for the community."

Under the terms of the agreement, Grand Sierra Resort Corp. will purchase certain assets of the Reno Hilton and will assume certain related current liabilities. In addition, a subsidiary of the Navegante Group will purchase certain of the gaming assets of the Reno Hilton from Caesars Entertainment and will assume certain gaming-related current liabilities. Pending regulatory approval, the Navegante Group will operate the casino at the Reno Hilton pursuant to a casino lease agreement with Grand Sierra.

Grand Sierra Resort Corp., a
Nevada based company, was formed
by a group of developers and
investors who collectively have more
than one hundred years of experience
in real estate development, hospitality, and gaming. Grand Sierra Resort
identified the Reno Hilton as having

the capacity, both in land and structure, to support one of the world's largest indoor water park and entertainment destinations. Grand Sierra plans on redeveloping the property by creating a synergistically themed resort, blending hotel, condominiums, indoor water park, retail stores, restaurants, theme parks and midways elements into an unparalleled guest experience.

The Grand Sierra Resort's condominium-hotel rooms offer spectacular views of the Reno Valley, only minutes away from championship golf courses, hiking and biking, along with world-class fishing and boating on Lake Tahoe, and some of America's finest ski resorts.

The Grand Sierra Resort is offering condominium-hotel rooms on the top floors of the Sierra Tower for purchase. Each unit is entitled to full hotel privileges, including daily housekeeping service, valet and preferred parking, gym access and concierge services. Private elevators provide owners and guests with security, safety and peace of mind. Owners have the opportunity to participate in the Grand Sierra Resort rental program. This option allows owners to rent their suites to conventioneers, long-term guests, and visitors seeking an elite hotel experience and share in the revenue generated from these rental sales.

Developers say it will take seven years to turn the Reno Hilton into one of the west's premiere resorts. Phase One will start sometime in September. It will include a 150-thousand square foot indoor water park, along with remodeling the top six floors of the hotel into high rise condos. You may also see some changes to the exterior of the Hilton. Phase two of the project won't start until the fall of 2007. That's when developers will build the resort.

It should take three years. During that time, a second tower will be added. It will have a 1000 to 1200 new condos, anchored by a 250-thousand square foot water park. The third phase of the project will be the development of commercial and retail

stores along the lake and Truckee River. Developers say the Hilton will stay open during the construction.

Sorting Out Harrah's

A recent discovery in the Nevada Club warehouse by Ron Gillio has produced a clarification of some of Harrah's early gaming check issues. A group of intertwined key chains that was apparently used by the cashier's cage at the Nevada Club to help cashiers sort out the chips of neighboring Harrah's Club also clarifies some of Harrah's issues. Combined with photographs from the files of Central Credit for chip identification, Harrah's multiple issues can be sorted into three of Harrah's seperate operations. During this period of time, Central Credit lists 4 seperate locations for Harrah's chips - Harrah's (Reno) - Harrah's Restaurant (Reno) -Harrah's Tahoe - Harrah's Stateline (west side of highway 50). Chips for Harrah's Restaurant had a Hat & Cane mold while the other three locations all used B.C. Wills small Grecian key checks.

Septemver 13, 1945

Folsom's Guest Cottages on US Highway 91, six miles south of Las Vegas, had been closed since 1941. Harold Folsom had died and his widow, Maggie, just couldn't run the place. On September 13, Maggie received a long distance phone call from an attorney named Greg Bautser, who lived in Los Angeles. Mr. Bautser told Maggie that he had a client who wanted to buy the Folsom Cottages including the dilapidated buildings and 30 acres of property. Bautser's client would pay all the back taxes due on the property and would put \$500 in Maggie's pocket.

That afternoon, Mr. Bautser flew to Las Vegas with his client and the \$500, met with the Folsom widow and, over lemonade, a deal was signed. The client was Morris Sedway, who was employed by Ben Siegel..

Little Moey, as he was called, held onto the Folsom property for less than two months. Following the ownership trail on this piece of property - Moe sold the land and cottages to his attorney, Greg Bautser.

Greg was representing his client, Billy Wilkerson in the transaction. Wilkerson owned two successful Hollywood nightclubs, Ciro's and the Trocadero, and was sole owner of the Hollywood Reporter, the movie industry newspaper.

Now, again following the ownership of the property, Billy Wilkerson held the Folsom Cottage property for less than a day.

November 24, 1945

George Raft's home on Coldwater Canyon Drive in Beverly Hills. There was a dinner at George's house. After dinner, Benny Siegel asked Raft to leave, his house was being used to lay out the building of the Flamingo Club in Las Vegas. The Flamingo Club was going to be funded and owned by a new California Corporation to be known as the Nevada Projects Corporation. The company that would build the Flamingo Hotel in Las Vegas.

Benny Siegel had already met with his general contractor, Del Webb, and his architect and builder, George Russell and Dick Stadleman. The working number that Benny had in his head was going to be one million dollars for the project. One million dollars would be needed to build Ben Siegel's Flamingo Club. (The earliest references to the Flamingo Hotel, in the newspaper articles of 1944 and 1945, referred to it as the Club - It became the Flamingo Hotel for licensing purposes in late 1945.)

The meeting was the normalization of the Nevada Projects Corporation. It was funded and the Flamingo Hotel was about to come off the drawing board.

Allen Smiley, a friend of Ben's (Smiley was sitting on the couch next to Ben when he was killed)
15 shares

Louis Pokross, fronting for 15 people in the New York mobs unknown number of shares

Morris Rosen – also from New York and fronting for Frank Costello in most of his business deals in the 1940's 100 shares

Meyer Lansky 100 shares

The same day the ground was broken for the Flamingo, Ben Siegel's wife, Esta, established residency at a guest ranch just outside Reno, Nevada. She had to be a Nevada resident for six weeks before she could file for uncontested divorce. (As an aside, in 1931 the Nevada legislature passed a series of measures that helped insulate the state from effects of the Depression, (these included

legal gambling, instant weddings and quick divorces, and legal prostitution). It was an amicable settlement. The two daughters would stay with Esta and Ben would pay for their schooling and expenses until they were married, \$350 per week plus school tuition. Esta would get the house that Ben purchased at 200 Delfern Drive in Hollywood, their New York apartment, Ben's Cadillac and would also receive \$600 per week for the rest of her life.

This was 1945, postwar 1945, and building materials were very hard come by. Apparently, however, this was not the case for the Nevada Projects Corporation. With the help of his partner, Billy Wilkerson, Siegel obtained lumber and pipe right from the movie studios. Wilkerson applied pressure to his friends in the studios, and before long, trucks from Culver City and Hollywood were crossing the desert loaded with lumber and pipe heading for the Flamingo Hotel's building site. Ben imported expensive marble and decorative woods for the Flamingo's lobby through the Mexican black market. (Conveniently, he was involved in the drug trade in Mexico and his Mexican partners paved the way for him).

Siegel had truck loads of celebrity and political friends. One of his best friends was Pat McCarren, (US Senator from the great State of Nevada). McCarren reprioritized the building needs list for projects going on in southern Nevada so that Ben and the Nevada Projects Corporation could receive the copper, fixtures and tiling they needed to get the Flamingo up and running by Christmas 1946.

There were protest meetings held in Las Vegas and Boulder City by the VFW and the Elks. (Their members were finding that they couldn't get any of the fixtures and building materials needed for their projects.) All the building material seemed to be going to that "Gangster 'Bugsy' Siegel's joint, the Flamingo!"

While the Flamingo Hotel was being built, Ben and his girlfriend, Virginia Hill, were living down the road at the Last Frontier. They had rented Suite 401 on a yearly basis. Each morning Ben would drive down to the Flamingo worksite and sign for the morning deliveries. He wanted to be totally involved in the Flamingo construction, but he didn't know about business, especially, the construction business. During the day many of those deliveries would disappear out the back gate. The next day the same items would be resold to Ben and the Flamingo. One truckload of lumber looks pretty much the same as every other truckload of lumber, right? Ben's lack of business acumen mixed with his volatile personality ultimately contributed to the fact that Flamingo Hotel really wasn't going to be ready by Christmas, 1946 ...

Regarding his quick-trigger temperament, most people gave Siegel a very wide berth. (Apparently his craziness was based on real-life insanity.) He was a powder keg and, once he exploded, there wasn't much that could be done to calm him down. Abe Schiller was the central figure in a public episode of Siegel's volatile personality. (I've read in a number of places that Schiller was entertainment director at the Flamingo Hotel, but no one probably mentioned that to Chuck Gaskill, the general manager and entertainment director for the 65day life of the Flamingo. Nor did anyone tell Jake Katleman, Bernie Van Der Steen or the Hall brothers, Joe and Vic, the owners of the El Rancho Vegas, who at the time were giving Abe Schiller a paycheck every week to be the promotional director over there! There are many different versions of the incident described below, but I believe this is the way it happened.

On March 1, 1947 the Flamingo Hotel reopened as the Fabulous Flamingo. The grand re-opening was held on a Saturday morning.

There was no fanfare, but the hotel's front doors were opened by the Andrews Sisters, Patty, Laverne and Maxine. All three gals mingled with the guests, as did Joan Crawford and the Ritz Brothers.

There was free food and free drinks plus hot dogs and hamburgers out by the pool. People were encouraged to "bring the kiddies." One of the families showing up at the grand re-opening was the Schillers, Abe, Doris and their three kids. Although Abe worked over at the El Rancho, he wanted to see what was so fabulous about the Fabulous Flamingo. He and the Missus and kids got their swimsuits and drove in from Henderson to try out the Fabulous Flamingo pool, and the free grub.

Ben had heard that Abe Schiller was encouraging his comedians, (especially Joe E. Lewis), to joke about "that gangster up the road, Bugsy Siegel."

Normally Ben Siegel didn't carry a piece. He had three regular bodyguards who watched his every step, but Ben knew that his days were numbered and that there was a contract out on him. So besides his three regular guns, he hired one of the top button men in the country to become his fourth bodyguard, a monster named "Hooky" Rothman.

To be on the safe side, Ben was also packing a piece. He and his entourage were walking by the pool when he saw Abe Schiller in a swimsuit. He exploded. He hated Schiller and anyone else who criticized his Flamingo, so he took out his gun and pistol-whipped Abe Schiller to the ground. Then in front of Abe's wife

and kids plus 200 or so Flamingo guests, Ben made Schiller crawl around the entire Flamingo pool. Ben was walking alongside him, kicking him and shooting over his head into the pool.

Hooky Rothman pulled out his piece and made damn sure no one stood up, or did anything else. The guests and the Schiller family watched in horror as Abe, bleeding from his pistol-whipping, continued to crawl around the pool. Only then did Ben let another of his bodyguards, "Fat Irish" Green, take him inside. But that all happened on March 1, 1947.

Let's go back to December 26, 1946 at the first grand opening...

Ben Siegel had three Las Vegas managers: Moey Sedway, Davie Berman and Solly Solloway. Again, Solloway was family, he had married Ben's sister.

The properties that Ben controlled were the Northern Club, he had actually purchased controlling interest for \$50,000 in 1944, and the Frontier Turf Club. Ben had just sold his interest in the El Cortez, and his partner, Meyer Lansky did the same. The horse book at the Golden Nugget was run by Ben's bodyguard, Fat Irish Green, (the same guy who helped Schiller at the pool). Hymie Segal, another bodyguard and no relation to Ben, was running the horse book at the Las Vegas Club.

Ben also had a piece of the El Rancho Vegas. His racing wire, the Trans America Service, operating out of Los Angeles, was in place in every single horse parlor in Las Vegas. (The competitive racing wire, the Continental Wire Service based in Chicago, was managed by a man named James Regan.) For a number of years there was open warfare between the two services. Even

though 1946 wasn't a great year for Ben Siegel, James Regan was cut in half with shotgun blasts in Chicago during the grand opening week of the Flamingo.

Ben's chief lieutenants were Little Moey Sedway, who controlled many of Ben's Las Vegas ventures plus his warehouse business is Los Angeles, and Gus Greenbaum, who was living in Phoenix and running the gambling business for Ben in Arizona.

In 1944 Ben bought a warehouse in Cerritos, California, along with his friend Alan Smiley. They called it the California Metals Company, and were buying millions of dollars worth of stolen iron and other metals at very reasonable prices, and then reselling them to the government. Moey Sedway was in charge of California Metals.

Sedway was beginning to make some decent money, but, apparently, he was getting too full of himself for Ben Siegel's liking. Ben had Moey physically thrown out the front door of the Flamingo Hotel and told him that he would be killed if he ever entered the Flamingo again.


Very surprising because, for years, Moey Sedway was Ben Siegel's "Go-To" guy. If something needed doing, it was Moey who made sure it was done. If someone needed something from Ben, they had to clear it through Moey first. In a fit of rage and frustration, mostly aimed at the construction delays, Ben threw his number one ally out. But Moey Sedway did what many mobsters from around the country did, they reinvented themselves in Las Vegas and became respectable citizens. Then Moey went one step too far for Ben. He was asked to run for the Nevada State Assembly. Whether it was jealousy or not, Moey was definitely persona non-grata in Ben Siegel's world.

Moe Sedway was liked by almost everyone in the community. He got things done, to be sure, and he did them with style. He was on the board of aldermen of Clark County, being paid \$1 a year for his services. He was head of the United Jewish Appeal in Las Vegasand he was on the board of directors of the Clark County Library.

Ben Siegel was another story. The merchants downtown, and the small casino owners were aware that he was going to be taking over Las Vegas. He had already gotten points in every casino which had a horse book, and the writing was on the wall. Ben represented organized crime, and organized crime was something that Las Vegans didn't want. When the Flamingo Hotel was ready for its opening, a whisper campaign was conducted all over Las Vegas. Dealers, deskmen, bellhops, valets, waitresses and other hotel personnel were told to speak to guests and gamblers about staying away from "that gangster-ridden Flamingo..."

Local Las Vegans also began shying away from the Flamingo that opening week. In Hollywood, one by one, stars like Spencer Tracy and Katherine Hepburn, who had told Ben that they'd love to come up to the Flamingo for the grand opening, came up with an excuse. Clark Gable developed a head cold. Marlene Dietrich sprained her ankle, Gary Cooper said his mother was sick and he had to fly to Texas to see her. It seems everyone was pulling out of a commitment they'd made to show up at the grand opening.

The MGM movie stars were told by William Randolph Hearst, known to close friends as "W.R.", that if they valued their careers, they'd stay out of the Flamingo. MGM stars were banned from the hotel for months. One of he reasons that Hearst hated



Ben Siegel was Marian Davies. Hearst had information that Ben and Marian apparently had 30 or 40 onenight stands. This was just after Marian and "Daddy,", as she privately called W.R., had stopped seeing one another. Ben, among his other enterprises, also owned the Screen Extras Guild. He could and *did* hold up studios for extortion money or he would and *did* pull the "extras" off the shoot at a moment's notice. Hearst had a lot of friends in the movie business who hated Ben Siegel.

But the actors were not part of this group. Ben socialized with everyone in Hollywood. It was the studio heads who hated him, especially Hearst. W.R. let it be known that no motion picture star, especially those with MGM, was to show his or her face at the Flamingo, or else. Billy Wilkerson, Ben Siegel's original partner in the project, was still involved with the Flamingo. Wilkerson tried to promote the Flamingo among his movie-star patrons at Ciro's and the Trocadero, but with little success.

George Raft did recruit a number of his friends to the grand opening at the Flamingo Hotel, an event starring Rose Marie and Jimmy Durante.

Numerous articles have been written about the disastrous opening night at the Flamingo. Though Ben had hired twelve uniform guards to watch the patrons, many of the dealers were helping themselves to money. Luck was running against the house and two rival casino owners, Tutor Scherer and Beldon Katleman, both won nearly \$100,000. The decks and the dice were running cold. George Raft was the only well-known loser that first night, it's said he dropped \$75,000 at baccarat. But even with that net gain, the house was down nearly \$200,000 on its first night ...

The Flamingo Showroom was barely half filled. The great Durante played to fewer than 80 people on opening night. Ben had leased three TWA Constellation jets to fly the rich and famous guests from the Los Angeles area to Las Vegas, but the weather kept all of the planes grounded. The following night, December 27, was much worse. Rose Marie played to fewer than 20 people and Jimmy Durante said it was the smallest crowd he'd ever seen, even back to his saloon days. New Year's Eve was a little better, Lucille Ball and Desi Arnez were guests of the hotel, as was Georgie Jessel and Leo Carillo, better known as Pancho, the Cisco Kid's sidekick.

One of the problems was that the Flamingo Hotel wasn't really a hotel, It was a casino with a showroom and a coffee shop. It only had 90 rooms and they were constantly being worked on. Each of the rooms, per Ben Siegel's instructions, had its own private sewer system and furnishings were running at nearly \$11,000 per unit. Without hotel rooms to keep the guests on your property, they're going

to play for a while and then head back up to the El Rancho or the Frontier where they had paid \$5 for their room for the night, it was a long drive back to the Flamingo. "So how about if we play right here at the Last Frontier after dinner, Mildred?"

The Flamingo Hotel lost in the neighborhood of \$700,000 during the 65 days it remained opened. By the first of February, Ben had closed some areas of the casino, the Flamingo Showroom and the outside bar. The casino still had a blackjack table, one craps table and the slots on the east side of the casino. Those gamblers and vacationers who wanted to see the Flamingo and try their luck there were soon chased out by either the constant noise of hotel construction or the occasional very scary glimpse of Ben Siegel and his muscle, the four bodyguards scowling at everything walking through the casino. Dealers would cower hoping than Ben wouldn't stop at their table.

Enough was enough! On February 6, 1947, Ben Siegel told his two publicists, Paul Price in Los Angeles, and Hank Greenspun in Las Vegas, to prepare press releases that the Flamingo Hotel was temporarily closing but would reopen as the Fabulous Flamingo within the month, billed as the World's Most Glamorous Hotel!

The Fabulous Flamingo did open within the month, on Saturday, March 1, 1947. The Andrew Sisters and the Ritz Brothers, two of the hottest acts in the country, were booked to open. And, as they say, the rest is history. In retrospect, I think many Las Vegas historians would agree that were it not for "Bugsy" Siegel, there possibly might not have been a Las Vegas.

Regarding the murder itself: Ben was 41 years-old the evening he was shot. He had gone out to dinner with his friend and partner, Allen Smiley.

(Smiley was Russian, something that's not often reported). They went to Jack's on the Beach in Santa Monica then came back to Virginia Hill's mansion at 810 North Linden Drive in Beverly Hills. Ben was on the couch reading the newspaper when someone fired a 30-caliber army carbine rifle nine times through an outside window. Four bullets hit Ben. (Apparently the first shot hit him in his eye, it was found on the fireplace hearth across the room.) Of the four hits, two were head shots and two were body shots. According to the police report of the shooting, the distance from the window to where Ben was sitting was "between 4 and 4.5 feet."

There are many theories on who killed Ben Siegel. It's generally agreed that his death sentence was voted on during the Mafia meeting on December 26, 1946 held on the penthouse roof of the Hotel Nacional de Cuba. Do you remember the scene in the second Godfather movie where Hyman Roth is showing off his birthday cake to everyone while Michael Corleone and the rest of his group are soaking up the Havana sun?

To this point we've covered the Flamingo from its beginning to the evening of June 20, 1947. On this day Ben Siegel was gunned down at about 10:40 p.m. Two hours later, at about midnight, Little Moey Sedway and



Morris Rosen walked into the executive offices of the Fabulous Flamingo as the new bosses. The very next day there was a meeting of the stockholders at the Flamingo. Attending the new Flamingo owner's meeting were: Joey Ross, Beverly Hills (an attorney representing Ben Siegel's interests), Meyer Lansky, New York and Havana (de-facto chairman of the group), Morris Rosen, New York and Las Vegas (representing the mob and the Fabulous Flamingo), Gus Greenbaum, Phoenix and Las Vegas (Ben Siegel's #1 man in Phoenix and #2 man in Las Vegas), Moey Sedway, Las Vegas, Joe Epstein, Chicago (a mob lawyer)

If you take a look at the cities that these men traveled from, and then realize that this meeting took place less than 24 hours after Ben's death, there has always been speculation that this group was already in Las Vegas when Ben was shot.

After the discussion about the future of the Flamingo without Ben, Lansky and the Flamingo board of directors took a break. They went downstairs to the Flamingo Sunrise Chuckwagon, (all you can eat for only 99¢ per person), then they began interviewing two potential groups to manage the Fabulous Flamingo.

Charlie Resnick, Sanford Adler and Israel "Icepick Willie" Alderman were invited in to discuss the Flamingo. Their resumes: Charlie Resnick, a 33% owner of the El Rancho Vegas in 1947. Sanford Adler. Back in June 1947, when this meeting took place, Sandy Adler was one of the owners of El Rancho Vegas. In later years Adler became famous as the casino boss at Caesar's who pulled a gun on Frank Sinatra during a fistfight they were having at the \$100 minimum craps table. Sandy was a tough no-nonsense guy. How many people do you imagine would

get into a fight in Las Vegas with Sinatra and then pull a gun on him? Sandy Adler, like other casino owners, didn't back down easily. Israel "Icepick Willie" Alderman. Willie hailed from the Twin Cities of Minneapolis and St. Paul. It was said if you got Icepick Willie drunk enough, he loved to share his story about the "even dozen" guys who got in his way and never lived to tell about it. His nickname came from the signature method of ending discussions known as the quick icepick lunge. It seems if you quickly jam an icepick into someone's ear, death is instantaneous and quiet. It looks like the person has just fallen asleep. After he left the Twin Cities there were very few of these unsolved murders with that particular signature around any more. But some did show up in Las Vegas in the late 1930s and early 1940s.

Charlie, Sandy and Icepick made their presentation, thanked Meyer for his time, and left. The next group making their bid for the Flamingo management included Davie Berman, a friend and assistant to Gus Greenbaum, Al Abrams, who ran one of the big legal brothels just outside Las Vegas, and Sam Diamond, a Bigtime bookmaker.

The decision that Meyer Lansky and the other Flamingo owners arrived at was they wanted Sanford Adler to be their new front man, their man in the counting room. The "skim" was the main reason for the mob's intense interest in the new ownership.

Sandy Adler bought the Fabulous Flamingo along with his partner, Charlie Resnick. Icepick Willie only had a small piece of the ownership. Sandy and Charlie were both current owners of the El Rancho at this time, and they were looking to expand because the El Rancho was beginning

to "slide" a little. Remember, this was 1947, the year before Beldon Katleman came into the El Rancho Vegas scene.

A final price of \$3,900,000 was agreed to. Sandy Adler and Charlie Resnick only had to put down \$550,000 to secure the purchase.

Sandy and Mrs. Adler moved into the "owner's suite" at the Flamingo on June 21, 1947. (The owner's suite was formerly Ben's.) It was the steellined penthouse on the third floor of the Oregon Building, the one always pictured behind the Flamingo swimming pool. The building came with escape tunnels, buried floor safes and all-bulletproof windows.

Sandy, Charlie and Icepick, and Mrs. Sandy, Mrs. Charlie and Mrs. Icepick, were enjoying the perks of being casino owners. In 1947 Las Vegas was a still a pretty small town. And being a casino owner, or being the wife of a casino owner, was pretty big juice. You got to socialize with the upper crust of Las Vegas society. It meant when BMI, Basic Magnesium, Incorporated, was having one of their formal balls and dances at the country club, you got invited. Or when the Cashmans or the Squires were having couples over for dinner, you got an invitation. Can you imagine how Mrs. Icepick Alderman felt when she got an invitation from Mrs. Tom Hull to attend afternoon tea at the Last Frontier to meet the guest of honor, Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt? This was real heady stuff.

As far as Sandy Adler himself goes, it sure was fun owning a hotel like the Flamingo. More benefits than you could possibly imagine, most can't even be discussed here. All in all, it was a happy time for all the owners and their wives. Only the real owners of the hotel, Meyer Lansky and Company, weren't at all happy. In the

short time period since Ben Siegel was killed, the Flamingo still wasn't making money. Meyer's daily question was: "Who ever heard of a casino not making money?"

Sanford, Charlie and Icepick knew the Flamingo wasn't making money in the nine months since they took over. So, one day in April 1948, Sandy Alder got a call from Jake Lansky, Meyer's brother.

Sandy Adler: "Hello?"

Jake Lamsky: "Sandy? This is Jake. Meyer sends his regards and says he wants for you to sell your interest in the Flamingo back to him. OK, Sandy?"

Sandy Adler: "What? No way am I gonna' sell out of the Flamingo. You tell Meyer that our luck's been running a little cold, but it's about to turn around."

Jake Lansky: "Oh! and Sandy? I was also told to tell you that you and your partners are going to have your throats cut and buried out in the desert if you don't sell out right now. And Sandy? Give my best to the wife and kids."

Again, Sanford and the boys were very happy owning the Flamingo. They all agreed: "No way are we gonna' let them kick us out. No way!" Sanford and Charlie Resnick, and their junior partner Icepick, decided to talk to the "law." Actually, it was the Nevada State Taxing Authority who controlled casino licenses in the 1950s. They told the tax boys that they were being "elbowed out" by the mob.

All three of them flew to Carson City to meet with the Nevada taxing guys. The tax guys kind of agreed with them, they shouldn't be kicked out of the Flamingo if they didn't want to go. So it very quickly became public knowledge that the "supposed" ownership of the Fabulous Flamingo and the "real" ownership of the

Fabulous Flamingo probably weren't one in the same. That was something that the Nevada Tax Commission found very interesting. Even you and I know that when you take the mob's money and get into bed with them, you're not supposed to go crying to the law about it. Unless you're ready to go into hiding, that is.

But Sandy Adler made a mistake. After his trip to Carson City, he went back to the Flamingo. When he was walking past the reception desk in the lobby, he ran into Morris Rosen and a couple of his gorillas. Moe Rosen snarled at Adler and said: "We talk – Now!" Sandy Adler was quoted as telling Moe Rosen to "Go f___ yourself". To the horror of guests in the Flamingo lobby, Sandy Adler was restrained by two mobsters while two others beat him unconscious.

Adler woke in up 10 hours later in the hospital and came to his senses. He realized what he'd just done. He was released from the hospital and Sandy and Mrs. Adler immediately drove to Beverly Hills. There Sandy stopped at the Beverly Hills Police Department and explained the entire situation to his friend Clint Anderson.

Chief of Police. Chief Anderson told him it probably wouldn't be safe for him to move to Beverly Hills. So the Adlers moved to Reno and, with the help of their attorney on the very day they arrived in town, they sold 100% of their stock in the Flamingo Hotel.

The very next day, Gus Greenbaum was named president of the Flamingo.

The day that Sandy Adler was selected, he hired Abe Schiller from the El Rancho Vegas to start work as the Flamingo's new publicity and advertising director. That same day, Hank Greenspun, Ben Siegel's long-time publicist, resigned his position as the Flamingo's publicity and advertising director.

Greenspun went to work for a small Las Vegas weekly newspaper, then joined Wilbur Clark for several years while the Desert Inn was in its planning stages. He eventually ended up at the Las Vegas Sun, working his way up to publisher.





In early 1993, Goeglein joined with Terry MacRae, founder/owner of Hornblower Dining Yachts, Inc., forming Madison Landing Associates, a joint venture company focused on the pursuit of gaming opportunities on the Ohio River in Indiana. Hornblower operates some 26 vessels providing high-end dining and entertainment services while cruising the various harbors of California.

In mid-year 1996 Goeglein joined the Sommer Trust with the purpose of fleshing out the Aladdin Gaming Resort/Casino and Shopping complex concept. January 1997 Goeglein became President & Chief Executive Officer of Aladdin Gaming Holdings where he remained through September 2001. Was instrumental in putting together the capital structure of the company and lead the team to ultimately raise approximately \$600 million, closing on the transaction in February 1998. The Aladdin Resort & Casino complex consists of 3.3 million square feet of facility and was built at a cost of just over \$1 billion. Additionally, Goeglein created the operating company, which opened with approximately 3,000 full-time equivalent team members. Goeglein was also a member of Aladdin Gaming Holdings, LLC and Aladdin Gaming, LLC Board of Directors. The company is privately owned.







This year the Riviera Hotel and Casino celebrates it's 50th anniversary. The Riviera opened on April 20th, 1955 and was built at a cost of \$8,500,000 by the Taylor Construction Company. The hotel had 9 floors, 350 rooms and suites on 25 landscaped acres. The Chairman of the Board was M. M. Mason and the President was David Gensburg. The opening day act was Liberace with George Liberace and his Orchestra featuring Joy Roberts, Sally Blythe, Mark Alden, Buck Young, Dickie Lerner, Emmaline Henry and the Riviera Girls.

Following is a timeline of the Riviera from opening day to 2005.

April 20, 1955

Riviera opens. Liberace is the opening act. Joan Crawford is hostess. The Treniers open the lounge.

May 1, 1955

Riviera's first acting assigned, hosting a live telecast of Liberace directly on stage on the Colgate Comedy Hour TV show.

May 12-16, 1955

Helldorado parade - Riviera won the Grand Sweepstakes award with her entry "Red Shoes". The base of the float was designed like the sole of a shoe and perched high on the top was Sharon Christian, queen of the ballet.

September 28, 1955

Gus Greenbaum, Willie
Alderman, Dave Berman, Sid
Wyman, Elias Atoll and Joe
Rosenbergand previous investors of
the Flamingo, along with two unidentified men, were granted a lease on
the Riviera.

1956

Orson Welles makes his stage appearance at the Riviera.

May 16, 1958

Riviera gave Liberace special birthday present, a new red Mercedes Benz.

August 4, 1958

Riviera had one of the busiest nights since she opened when hundreds upon hundreds of anxious

> fans tried to get in to see Red Skelton, both for the first and second shows. Many stood and waited, even after the show had

started, hoping the Maitre d' would find some available space. Countless had to be turned away.

December 2, 1958

Riviera big-wig, Gus Greenbaum, and his wife were killed in their home in Arizona.

December 5, 1958,

All gaming at the Riviera was closed from 9:00am to 6:00pm as simultaneous services were held in Vegas and in Phoenix for Mr. & Mrs.
Greenbaum.

1960

Riviera changed the Clover Room's name to the Versailles Theatre, showcasing the Andrew Sisters; Louis Armstrong; Tony Bennett; George Bums; Red Buttons; Sid Caesar; Cathcart Orchestra; Carol Charming; Cyd Charisse; Vie Damone; Dennis Day; Destry Rides Again starring Gene Barry/Monique Van Vooren/Warde Donovan; Dorothy Dorben Dancers; Jack Elliott; Totie Fields; Eddie Fisher; Joel Grey; Buddy Hackett; Johnnie Haymer; Sammy Lewis Presents In An Intimate Revue starring Patrice Munsel; Sammy Lewis Presents Ted Lewis/Sophie Tucker/Paul White/ Elroy Peace/Ted Shapiro/Lee Berger/June Taylor Dancers/Ray Sinatra Orchestra; Dean Martin; Tony Martin; Mills Brothers; Jaye P. Morgan; Patti Page; Paul Reed; Rowan & Martin; Riviera Dancers & Models; Connie Russell; Sarah Vaughan; Earl Wild; and World of Suzie Wong.

August 1961

Kaye Stevens recorded her album Ruckus at the Riviera, now a cult classic.

November 25, 1963

The Riviera, as well as other resorts in Vegas dimmed their lights and stopped all gambling from 7:00am to 12:00am to honor the funeral of John F. Kennedy.

May of 1967

Ann-Margret and Roger Smith married at the resort. Hotel PR Director Tony Zoppi and Hotel Manager Dick Chappell served as witnesses for the ceremonybefore District Judge John Mowbray. Margret had just signed a contract to headline at the resort for \$40,000 a week.

1967

The Riviera added a 200-room wing, an elevator penthouse, a 9,000-square-foot lobby, and 10,000 square feet of office and meeting space.

October, 1968

Completion of the 220 room south wing, it now held 770 rooms, suites and convention facilities. The \$5 million addition soared 12 stories into the horizon. Offices representing four major airlines occupied

the ground level of the new building as well as the shops and the Montmartre convention center. The

property was flanked by walls of glass, accented by tasteful landscaping. Its massive stone entrance is manned by a staff of doormen garbed in uniforms patterned after those worn by the French Foreign Legion. Dick Chappell was the Manager with assistants Pat Egan, Bill Barry and Eimo Ellsworth.

1969

Bob Hope joined headliner Totie Fields on New Year's Eve and surprised audiences with a 15 minute ad lib performance.

1969

Dean Martin became a 10 owner with approximately 8,000 shares and Dino's Den was named after him.

1969

Riviera showcased Dean Martin Presents Englebert Humperdinck marking Humperdinck's debut in Las Vegas.

September 20, 1970

Riviera hosted the Friars' Club 550 a plate roast of comedian Joe E. Lewis, bringing together some of the greatest stars in show business for a total of 1,300 honoring him. The host was Dean Martin, the co-host was Frank Sinatra but he failed to appear, and the emcee was George Jessel. Those appearing at this roast were Marty Allen, Jack Benny, George Burns, Vikki Carr, Jimmy Durante, Buddy Hackett, Jack E. Leonard, Tony Martin, "Swifty" Morgan (Damon Runyon's famous Lemon Drop Kid), Jan Murray, Harry Richman, Toots Shor, Phil Silvers, Ed Sullivan, Louis Armstrong, Pearl Baily, Telly Savalas, and John Conte. Other attendees included Nevada Governor Paul Laxalt, Sands Hotel's Jack Entratter, Nate Jacobson, and Caesars/Circus Circus creator, Jay Sarno. The guest list amounted to 1,000 people. SUN columnist Ralph Pearl suggested the tribute and Zoppi helped organize the event.

1970

During a strike occurring at various resorts. Bob Hope was in the

audience at the Roger Miller & Jack E. Leonard shows at the Riviera. During one of these shows Hope hopped on stage and joined the headliner. He stated "I am available as bellhop, cocktail waiter, short order chef or casino dealer. In my tax bracket, I'll do anything to make an extra buck."

1972

Four championship tennis courts were added near the pool. They were the site of the Dewar's Celebrity-Pro Tennis Tournament, which drew top professional athletes from around the world.

February/March 1973

Meshulam Riklis, the majority stockholder of American International Travel Services of Boston (AITS) bought the Riviera for \$56 million.

June 15-17, 1973

Riviera hosted the Celeb Invitational Tennis Tournament with Gary Crosby, Edgar Bergen, Johnny Carson, Paul Anka, and Dinah Shore.

1975

Riviera added its 17-story Monte

Carlo tower at a cost of \$20 million. It consisted of 300 rooms, 60 suites, and an elaborate penthouse, giving the resort a total of 1,000 guest rooms.

1977

The Riviera's San Remo tower added 200 rooms to the south side of the resort, as well as the elegant Ristorante Italiano, a 100-seat gourmet Italian restaurant.

1981

Paul Anka made his Riviera debut. During one of Paul Anka's perform-

ances, more than a dozen ringsiders climbed onstage for the finale.

Anka decided to create an impromptu chorus

line with the zealous fans.

1983

Meshulam Riklis made the Forbes 400 with his 60 of Rapid American Corporation worth \$133 million. Riklis was an exchange student (Turkey, through Israel), who became a securities analyst. He took over

undervalued companies to finance others; "calls leverage the effective non-use of cash."

June 21, 1985

Riviera took at bold step toward providing a new type of showroom entertainment, unveiling "Splash", starring Frank Gorshin in the Versailles Theater, an all-new production so unique that it captivated audi-

ences and garnered an unprecedented number of awards for best production show in

Las Vegas. The "aquacade of music and dance" took place in and around a 20,000-gallon aquarium while featuring numerous performers and speciality acts.

September 18, 1985

Riviera introduced Norbert
Aleman's "An Evening at La Cage,"
in the Mardi Gras Showroom, a
Parisian-style revue of female
impersonator's and cabaret
dancers. The star of the
show was a 20-year-old
Frank Marino.

May 4, 1986

The Riviera introduced the comedy Club that opened as An Evening At The Improv.

September 21, 1987

The Riviera set a precedent on the Las Vegas Strip when the Cray Girls - Fantasie de Paris opened on this night.

1988

The Riviera added the 24-story Monaco Tower costing \$28 million and nearly doubling the resorts size to 2,100 rooms.

1990

The Riviera expanded its casino to 70,000 square feet for a total of nearly 125,000 square feet out to the sidewalk, making it one of the largest casinos in the world offering reel slots and video games, table games, poker, keno, bingo, and a complete race and sports book.

1990

Frank Sinatra performed twice at the resort in 1990, including New Year's Eve when he played to more than 2,000 people in the Superstar Theatre. Room 2902 of the hotel's Monte Carlo Tower was redesigned to Sinatra's specifications so he could enjoy his stay.

June 17, 1995

Jeff Kutash's Splash II opened at the resort including Wally

Eastwood, and The Dragon
Masters. This version of
Splash cost \$5 million (\$1
million in showroom renovations alone). This particular
version offered raincoats to peo-

ple in certain select seats. A totally new production, for which the show-room had been revamped to look and feel like an actual submarine (much of it actually salvaged from scuttled subs at a shipyard), there were just a few reminders of the original Splash, such as a huge water tank on stage which held 20,000 gallons of water.

1995

Riviera celebrated the 10th anniversary of An Evening At La Cage.

1996

Crazy Girls came under fire by city officials for their slightly risque billboards. The case was tried in the media and ended on a note of "Crazy Girls beat City Hall." But in case the Butts case was a lost cause, then Plan B included the famous life-cast bronze statue in front of the resort.

June 1996

It was formally announced that the Riviera was listed on the American Stock Exchange (RIV). Net income was increased by 30, to \$2.47 million. Earnings per share improved from 40 to 49 cents compared to the first three months of 1995.

1997

Portions of the movies Austin Powers: International Man of Mystery, Sexual Roulette, Girls' Night Out, and Vegas Vacation were filmed at the resort. The Riviera then starred as the Tangiers Hotel in the movie Casino.

May 10, 1997

Riviera revealed the largest lifecast bronze statue in the world of Crazy Girls to celebrate the 10th Anniversary of the show. The sculpture is six feet high, 11 feet long, and weighs 1,540 pounds. This sculpture was created by Michael Conine.

December, 1997

Nickel Town opens.

1998

Portions of the movie *Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas* were filmed at the Riviera.

1998

Crazy Girls bronze statue won the best for public art and the best photo opportunity in the RJ Best and Worst Contest.

1998

The Riviera had guest shot on the Chicago Hope TV show. On hand for filming was Mark Harmon, Adam Arkin, Rocky Carroll, and Hector Alizondo.

May 15 1998

Frank Sinatra died. Riviera was the site of Sinatra's last permanent engagement in Vegas. The resort decided to honor the Chairman of the Board. The Riviera dedicated the suite Sinatra used when he performed at the resort. The dedication of the suite included an engraved plaque on the door and a 16x20 inch framed photograph of Sinatra inside the two-bedroom penthouse. It is Room 2902 in the Monte Carlo Tower.

1998

Riviera was the first Strip resort to have a fast-food restaurant on its premises with the opening of Burger King.

1999

Riviera presented a rare opportunity to win special hand-painted \$10 tokens created and issued by Osbom Coinage, minted exclusively for the resort at their Millennium Countdown machines. These machines were located adjacent to the Splash Showroom. Every time a person won a payout of 60 coins or higher with maximum coins played, they got to choose one of the four specially designed collector's items. "No Nevada casino has ever issued a hand-painted token. This series is truly unique and once they

are all gone, that's it. They are only available at the Riviera's Millennium Countdown machines." - Art Olita, Osbom Coinage coin expert

November 1999

Producer/director and former child star Peter Billingsley (The Christmas Story) brought his "The X Show" to the Riviera. The X Show was primarily a "man's point of view" program giving people a chance to sound off about anything.

1999

Riviera completed their "Skyboxes". The boxes are 12 rooms located above the Royale Pavilion.



Colorado Chipping In the News



Back in October 2004 the new road to Central City finally opened up. For those of you familiar with the route from Denver to Black Hawk and Central City, this new road is one exit west of the US 6 interchange on I-70. The road is 4 lanes wide for its entire length with banked turns and a couple of wide switchbacks. 


Casino Openings and Closings

The Great Stardust Skim

This is such a wonderful American success story. In 1976 the president of the Stardust Hotel was 34-year old Allan Glick. Seemingly out of nowhere, this nice clean-cut young man and head of the ARGENT Corporation secured a Teamsters loan for about \$146 million that enabled him to take over the Stardust Hotel and Casino. The ARGENT name was an abbreviation of Allan R. Glick Enterprises.

The timing on this loan was very important. By 1976, many of the Las Vegas casino "cash cows" the Mob throughout the country depended on were beginning to dry up.

Between the Federal Government and the state of Nevada, it was becoming more and more difficult for a mobster to make a decent living. The Chicago Outfit still had control over the Stardust, Marina, Fremont and Hacienda, but it became necessary to increase the size of the skim to make up for other lost business.

Let's take a moment to discuss the meaning of the word "skim". It isn't stealing in the usual sense. It isn't taking money that belongs to someone else. Skimming is hiding money from Uncle Sam. Every time a dollar would come into the casino, it had to be reported to the government. So at the end of the year, when the Stardust would do its 1040-EZ or whichever form they used, they would have to pay income tax on every penny the casino took in.

How much more profitable would it be if the US Government and Nevada State Revenue people just didn't know how much money the Stardust and the other hotels had actually made? ("Wow! What a good idea! That way, we could get to keep a lot more money, right boss?")

In the old days in Las Vegas this was pretty easy to do. A casino owner could wander into the "soft count room" where the bills were counted, take a few handfuls of the big ones, put them in his pocket and then go have a cup of coffee and a Danish.. Who was going to stop him? He owned the place. This was his money. He wasn't stealing. He just wanted to take a few thousand bucks as "walking around money." What Uncle Sam doesn't know ain't gonna' hurt him,

Then the hotel owner could find a nice corner on a hot-looking craps table, call Tony D., the pit boss there at craps pit 3, have Tony D. bring him a marker for "10 large," and get \$10,000 in chips. He'd play a few minutes, lose a couple of thousand, scoop up the remaining 8 G's in chips, take them over to the cashier and cash out.

When his signed marker arrived in the accounting department, his girl-friend, Lola, would take the \$10,000 marker and put it in her pocket. ("Honest, she's not my girlfriend, sweetheart, I hardly know the woman"). And that was that. No marker means no money owed the casino, right? It's his money anyway, right? Who is he stealing from — himself?

Believe it or not, this very simple method of taking a few million dollars out of the Las Vegas hotels would work, year after year after year. Then the Nevada Tax and the Gaming Commission boys set down some rules. Damn spoilsports

Rule Number 1 – An owner is never allowed in a counting room. Rule Number 2 – An owner is never allowed to play at his own hotel. Rule Number 3 – All money that comes into a casino. I reiterate, 100% of the money, has to be reported as income.

The US Government trained its eyes on the casino business through the Organized Crime Commission, the Kefauver Committee and, later, the Church Committee. Despite all the Fed's money spent on all the investigations of the Las Vegas hotels and their owners, the only thing they could get the owners on was good old tax evasion. Skimming money means taking money from the pot before Uncle Sam has a chance to count it and tell you how much tax you owe on it. If the money can't be accounted for, it can't be taxed, plain and simple.

The Chicago Outfit was faced with a cash flow problem. The answer presented itself in the Stardust, and Allan Glick. Nice, clean-cut Allan Glick and his partner, Gene Frisch, were both young men who were making a pretty fair living owning the Hacienda. Everything was above board and going along well until a company called RECRION, that then owned the Stardust, got into trouble.

Without going into the personalities of RECRION, the company was being forced to sell the Stardust. There was some silliness about money from the Stardust Hotel finding its way on a weekly basis to Joey Aiuppa of the Chicago Outfit, Moshe Rockman of the Mayfield Road Gang

in Cleveland, and to Frank Balistieri of the Milwaukee Mafia. Both Cleveland and Milwaukee in the mid-1970s were subsidiaries of the Chicago Outfit, which was run by Joey Aiuppa.

Right up until June 19, 1975 Sam "Momo" Giancana had run Chicago. However, Momo wasn't the best of bosses of the Chicago Outfit. He was very high visibility, with his flamboyant personality, and his highly publicized affair with Phyllis McGuire.

Then there was his friendship with Frank Sinatra, and with Judy Campbell, and with the Rat Pack ... he was just too visible for the old school dons. On top of everything else, their money stream, Las Vegas, became delivering less and less money. Enough was enough.

In the basement of his Oak Park, Illinois mansion, Momo made himself a before bedtime snack of Italian sausage and peppers ... and he died. After his snack, at the top of the stairs, a gunman was waiting for him, and shot him six times in the mouth, Joey Aiuppa became capo of the Chicago Outfit.

No such things as a "honeymoon period" for Joey Aiuppa either. The Feds and the Nevada State Gaming Commission, who were both developing real power in Nevada, were beginning to make daily visits and phone calls to Aiuppa. It seems all they wanted to talk about was the Stardust. The question of real ownership of the Stardust, which had been hidden for many years, was beginning to bubble to the surface.

At the same time, Allan Glick, who had just turned 32, was beginning to make quite a few bucks at the Hacienda. He decided he wanted to make even more money if he could only figure out a way to do it. Talk about a fortuitous set of circumstances. Here were the owners of the Stardust being told to get out or lose their license, and here was Allan Glick, a nice, clean cut young man, who wanted desperately to get into the big time.

So Allan let it be known all over Las Vegas that he wanted to buy the Stardust. His big problem was that he didn't have the money to buy it. But he let it be known, "If anyone wants to lend me the \$100 million dollars to buy it, I wouldn't say no."

So one day, Alan got a phone call at his Hacienda office from Del Coleman, the largest stockholder in the RECRION Corporation. Coleman, besides his RECRION affiliation, was also the unofficial representative of the Teamsters Union and the Chicago Outfit in Las Vegas. That meant watched over their business affairs. Del Coleman said, "Allan, we got somebody you should meet," and Allan was introduced to the boss of the Milwaukee Mob, Frank Balistieri.

Balistieri said he could help Glick get a loan. A friend of his was an official at the Teamsters Central States Pension Fund. Sam Giancana had called Balistieri and told him to help Glick get the money he needed to buy the Stardust.

Then Glick starting getting calls from some of the other Mob families, all wanting to be helpful to Glick in getting the Stardust loan. One call came from Kansas City. Glick was told the caller knew another Central States Teamsters official who could help arrange the loan. Then more calls came into Allan Glick's office from very well-connected and very friendly men from Cleveland and Chicago. And believe it or not, just like in the movies, the money started coming in.

Before long, our hero, Allan Glick, had enough money to buy the RECRION Corporation along with all of its assets including the giant Stardust Hotel. And all for next to no money out of his own pocket! Nearly \$140 million dollars was raised to install this nice young man as owner of the Stardust. What a wonderful country we live in!

Glick's predecessor at the Stardust was a man named Al Sachs. During the changeover, Sachs went to Paris to renew the contract on the amazingly successful Lido de Paris show. He got the new contract signed, but returned to find his office furniture in the hall. The transition was now complete. (This is a bit of an oversimplification on how Allan Glick, at the ripe old age of 34, actually got control of the ARGENT Corporation and the Stardust Hotel. But actually, that's pretty damn close to exactly how it did happen).

With Chicago's assistance, Glick became the new president of the ARGENT Corporation and owner of the four hotels. He packed his bags and moved from the Hacienda to the Presidents Suite at the Stardust. On his first day at his new job, Glick hired bookmaker-dealmaker-oddsmaker Frank "Lefty" Rosenthal to be his assistant at a salary of "250 large," Two Hundred & Fifty Thou A Year!

That same day, Lefty replaced Bobby Strella, who was a pretty good casino boss at the Stardust, with a fella' whose previous job experience was owner-operator of the gift shop at Circus Circus, which he purchased for peanuts. The gift shop at Circus Circus was given as a favor to one of Momo Giancana's friends from Chicago at a "friends and family" price of \$70,000. It was worth over \$2 Million. It was purchased by Momo's friend Tony.

When Tony was at Circus Circus, he was Tony Stewart, but when he moved to the Stardust he went back to Tony Spilotro. Spilotro was a hit man, a street-enforcer and Mob killer who worked for the Chicago Outfit.

He had been sent to Las Vegas a few years earlier by Sam Giancana to learn the city and to watch out for Chicago's interests there. The movie *Casino* starring Joe Pesci as the Tony Spilotro character and Robert De Niro as Lefty Rosenthal was one of the better Las Vegas mob movies.

OK, RECRION was out as owners of the Stardust. They were bought out, not kicked out, and they were pretty happy with their \$30 million or so of profit. Sure, a few of them had to go to prison, but overall, it was a pretty good ownership transition.

But then there was a problem with Rosenthal's position as Stardust general manager.

Lefty had a "past." He was a

known associate of the Mob and had a conviction on his police record for fixing a basketball game some years earlier. Rosenthal's conviction, however, was conveniently removed from the record before he arrived in Las Vegas. But the guys who made up the Nevada Gaming Commission knew gambling and gamblers, and Lefty Rosenthal had a widely known reputation.

On the second day of Rosenthal's new job at the Stardust, the gaming authorities called Allan Glick and advised him that Lefty was never going to be given the "key employee" designation – ever. By the mid-1970s the Nevada Gaming Commission, commonly referred to as the NGC, said that every employee who worked in a key position within a casino that had a gambling license was going to be called a key employee. As a key employee, they, too, had to have a gambling license.

Allan Glick had to tell this news to Rosenthal. Glick was perfectly aware that Lefty was fully running the Stardust, even though he'd only been on the job for two days. Glick ran around until he found Lefty and told him the news. What's in a title, right? Lefty gave up his position as general manager/casino manager and became the Stardust Hotel's poker room coordinator. As a lowly poker room coordinator, chances are he wouldn't have to get that stupid key employee designation from the Gaming Commission.

He was still making his \$250,000 and he still absolutely oversaw every single detail at the Stardust. Just to make it look even more presentable to the gaming guys, Rosenthal took over one of the poker tables as his permanent office. No one else sat there. It was in the back of the poker room with a phone on the table, and he worked there right in the open. The Nevada Gaming Commission then told him that he couldn't be the poker room coordinator, either. It seems the NGC had just made Las Vegas poker room coordinators key employees as well.

Not to be outdone, Lefty became the assistant entertainment director of the hotel for a while, and when those bureaucrats at the NGC said "no" to that, he became the assistant marketing manager. When that was stopped, he began broadcasting a nightly show from the Stardust interviewing celebrities on Las Vegas television channel. This ploy of musical jobs really did work for quite a few years.

Lefty Rosenthal was running the Stardust Hotel, Tony Spilotro was taking care of the casino and any other problems that might arise, and Allan Glick was off playing golf down at La Costa on the California coast. Everyone seemed to be in place. Rosenthal had understood from day one what was expected of him. Chicago was deadly serious about making the Stardust and their other Las Vegas properties more profitable.

There are two murders that take

place during this story and the first one happens right about here. There was a friend of ours from the Chicago Outfit named Marty Buccieri, who worked as a Casino Boss at Caesars Palace. Marty had been instrumental at the beginning of Allan Glick's money search by introducing Allan to some of his friends in Chicago.

Just a quick aside here. 25 years ago casino bosses on the Las Vegas Strip all dressed in the same uniform. It didn't matter if they worked at Caesars or the Hacienda, casino bosses always wore black silk suits, white on white shirts with either solid white or solid black silk ties, high polished black shoes and big gold cufflinks. Just one of those Las Vegas "things" — it's the way things were done.

Anyway, one day Buccieri showed up at the Stardust looking for Allan Glick. Marty was told that Allan probably was down in the coffee shop, or maybe still in San Diego, or "you might want to try the health club". Buccieri found Glick in the steam room and told him that he owes him money – a finder's fee. He said something like: "I put you together with my boss, and look at you now. You own this joint. It was me who got you the \$100 million and I want my piece. And I want it by next week, capice?"

Glick found Lefty Rosenthal, which wasn't all that hard to do.
Lefty had taken over Glick's office in the executive suite. Glick told him about the meeting he just had in the Stardust health club with Marty and all the noise Buccieri was making. A week later, Buccieri was found sitting in the front seat of his car in the Caesars Palace parking lot.

He had just left work, and someone was waiting in the back seat of his car, and popped him twice in the head with a 22-caliber pistol. A small

time Las Vegas hood named Horton was arrested for the murder, he said that he shot Buccieri because he "wised off at me" however, word on the street has always been that it was because of the pressure he was trying to put on ARGENT through Alan Glick for a finder's fee.

Now, with Stardust completely in control of the ARGENT Corporation, it was time to institute The Great Stardust Skim. Here's how it worked. There was so much money coming into the "hard count" room every night, where the nickels, dimes and quarters were counted, that it was practically impossible to tally them even with the fastest change-counting machines in the world. The coins might not be totally counted, but they certainly could be weighed.

The casinos purchased supersensitive scales that could weigh these coins very accurately. A thousand dollars in nickels, 20,000 nickels, could be weighed and the scale would register plus or minus two nickels. If the scales, however, were adjusted just a

little, let's say 10% light, the number of unaccounted-for nickels, dimes and quarters, to say nothing of the \$1 tokens in the same size and weight as silver dollars, would add up pretty quickly.

Money from the slot machines were emptied into bags, placed in steel cages and rolled into the hard count room. You've probably seen those cages rolling around the casino attended by armed guards. They look like they are carrying a ton of money, which is pretty close. As money from the slots rolled into the count room, the ultra-sensitive scales were put to work. After the weigh-in, a small portion of the coins were recycled back onto the casino floor as rolls of coins that players could buy. The rest of the coins were put loose into bags for armored transport to the bank.

It's here where the scheme begins.

ARGENT owned four hotels: the Stardust, the Marina, the Fremont and the Hacienda. Each day the coins from the Fremont would be put into coin bags and taken by armored car to the Stardust. Coin bags from the Hacienda would also arrive at the Stardust by armored car. The bags would be opened and poured through chutes directly into hoppers located atop big scales. ARGENT hired a scale mechanic who would recalibrate these scales perfectly so when four thousand quarters (\$1,000) where placed in the hopper, it only registered as nine hundred dollars. It was simple enough, \$1,000 input and \$900 output. "All right, if it's working so well on the quarters, lets recalibrate those machines over there that weigh the dollar tokens".

The \$900 in silver coins and dollar tokens was handled exactly by the book. Each roll was inspected and initialed by a Stardust employee as to accuracy. The tokens were recirculat-

ed onto the floor for resale and replay or were placed in the Stardust's bank account. But what do you do with the dollar coins and tokens? A few silver dollars can be passed at the grocery store to pay your bill, but not in great quantity. But try to spend one-dollar tokens from the Stardust that have the Stardust logo on them. There's not a lot of place anywhere except the Stardust that will take them from you. So what the heck are you going to do with all those tokens?

Back in 1975, in every casino in Las Vegas with the exception of the Stardust, if you wanted change from the "change girls," they would sell it to you. Then they'd take your \$20 dollar bill, along with all the other bills, to the cashiers cage "employees only" window. They'd hand over the bills and get more rolls of coins in return. This was the standard way of dispensing coins in a casino.

The Stardust, however, told their change girls that instead of going to the cashier's cage, they were to go to a few locked coin cabinets placed against the walls around the casino. With a key to the cabinet, they'd take the bills and dollar tokens, put them in the drop box inside the cabinet, take the correct number of rolls, and get back to work. The change girls knew damn well that the "honor system" required them to take the correct number of rolls each time. They also knew the cameras were watching them. To try to swipe a roll of coins was absurd, and they all knew it.

What they didn't know was this cabinet situation was the backbone of a multimillion dollar skim, the largest casino skim ever uncovered in Las Vegas. And it only involved slot machines. Dozens of times a day, each change girl would open one of the coin cabinets with her key, deposit her money into the slot and take the right amount of wrapped coins.

What they were taking was the 10% residue from the hard count room. Those coins that were not weighed by the ultra-sensitive scales, the one-dollar coins, were being turned back into foldable cash through this elegant little system of washing tons and tons of quarters and dollars. And there were literally tons of them. It was not unusual for one of these illegal coin boxes on the floor to have \$10,000 in bills in it each evening when it was emptied.

Additionally, an "extra" change booth was set up on the Stardust floor. For quite a few years it was never noticed by the State, like a toll booth set up on a stretch of two-lane road in the dead of night. It looked and operated just like all the other change booths, get in line and change your bills into coins, get on line and change your coins into bills. Except this change booth wasn't registered with any governmental authority. One hundred percent of the money that came in went directly to the coffers of Momo Giancana and the Chicago Outfit.

These coin cabinets around the casino and the extra change booth worked for nearly five years. It finally came out in the 1979 and 1980 trials that the quarter and dollar skim was so successful at the ARGENT properties that the Chicago Mob was receiving \$15 million per year for each of five years. That's \$75 million in skim money shipped to the Mob without any tax being paid on it!

As an aside to this story, there was a very sharp slot department manager working at the Fremont Hotel downtown. His name was Jay VanDermark. He was extremely valuable because he allegedly set up the entire skim operation there. All the little things necessary to take \$300,000 per week out of the ARGENT properties were allegedly designed and implemented by VanDermark.

One of the first things Lefty
Rosenthal did after he was brought in
was to move VanDermark from the
Fremont to the flagship of ARGENT
Corporation, the giant Stardust.
VanDermark came in, managed the
entire slot department, and watched

over the day-to-day operation of the skim.

As a special "thank you," Jay was given an all-expense paid trip to Mazatlan in Mexico. His head was bashed in while he was sunbathing on

the beach in Mazatlan, and all the loose ends were now tied up.

It's so nice when a plan works.

Editor Allan Anderson promised not to bug me again until September if I would put together another installment of my Atlantic City Report for this pre-convention Summer issue of Chip & Token News. How could I refuse that offer of taking the summer off in exchange for a brief update on A.C. activities?

Picking up where we left off in the previous Spring issue of the ANA award-winning "Chip & Token News" with the announcement of Hilton changing over their entire rack..., well the event took place on May 5th after a few date changes!

Not the most attractive rack chips ever issued, but better than some I've recently observed from some other gaming jurisdictions. Why were the chips changed some chippers might ask? Answer; Because the property was purchased by Colony Capital ... (owners of Resorts).











Just prior to the old Hilton rack being withdrawn, a variation of the soon to-be-retired obsolete nickel chip was discovered in play on the tables. This new naked-eye discovery is of a much darker red color than the issue that preceded it and they were found to be in brand new condition! Both variations were on the tables at the time prior to the new rack being changed over ... but are all now gone. *The black and white image you are viewing in this magazine article probably does not show the dramatic differences that the color image does.



A week after the new Hilton rack was changed, all of the Hilton roulette chips were also changed over to a new style "segmented" type roulette chip, making the previous roulette issues obsolete. This image of a current chip from table #7 was provided to me by an anonymous harvester for use in this report.



Yo... Philly!

A repeat obverse design of a popular local disc jockey "The Geator" ...
Jerry Blavatt chip that was issued last year ... with a change on the reverse side commemorating a 2005
Philadelphia block party ... complete with hourly drawings, Ben Franklin and Mummer's String Bands promenading on the property, provided chippers with a fun-filled day at Trump Marina on May 1st.





Who could be against Mother's Day? Well, in these politically correct days of equal rights ... look for a companion Father's Day chip in June to follow at Trump Plaza. Hint; The colorful CHIPCO design will be of a Father fishing a trout stream with his Son assisting, netting the catch.



Speaking of Trump Plaza ... for the third consecutive year, this Trump property continued their annual \$100 chip tribute to the Kentucky Derby with this very attractive design in the 2005 version of "Run For The Roses" series.



A 3-chip series of Harley Davidson chips is scheduled to be released on June 12th at Trump Marina. (Thank the chip gods for Trump properties. They are the only casinos in town that have an active LE chip release program for collectors.)



Coming up during the 4th of July weekend will be the release of the long awaited Miss Deckadence chip. Vanilla Ice will be hosting the pageant ... and will be performing on "The Deck" that night. The original announced design is illustrated below ... the actual chip design to be issued may have been revised with a 2005 date.



This Grand Opening chip will be released in late June from Trump Marina's brand new casino called "SKINZ". This will be Atlantic City's first "open-air casino" according to Todd Moyer. It will feature 31 slot machines and 6 table games. Regular Trump Marina chips will be used on the tables ... similar to Bally's chips being used at Wild Wild West Casino. Trump Marina with its Hooters venue and now Skinz is quickly becoming the Hard Rock East for the young adult crowd in A.C.



To be announced at a later date is a Trump Marina 20th Anniversary chip in 3-D ... and a Hooters 3rd Anniversary chip set.

Also opening on this busy July 4th weekend will be the Grand Opening of Showboat's House Of Blues casino. It will be the largest House Of Blues venue in the entire country. A set of Grand Opening chip releases are scheduled to coincide with the official opening date. Lynyrd Skynyrd will be the first act to perform at HOB.

Lastly, I purchased this 23-year old large bronze Playboy medal at a token & medal dealer's booth while attending the Annual Garden State Numismatic Association Convention in May. As you can see, it's dated 1982 ... and has the Playboy logo on the obverse. It's some sort of tribute to the upcoming Olympic games that were held in 1984. If anyone has any additional information about this Playboy Atlantic City casino medal, I would appreciate hearing from you.

Enjoy the convention ... it's going to be another barn-burner!!



Charitable Casino Chips of North Dakota

Part II

Tip of the Iceberg

Review

For those of you who came in late, shame on you! Last month's article was a (very) quick overview of Charitable Casinos Chips of North Dakota and ended with a quiz of what the following three chips were:







Actually, this was somewhat of trick questions as the first two chips are in fact from the same charitable organization – the Northern Prairie Performing Arts (doing business as he Fargo Moorhead Theatre). The first one, with the spot light, is a one of two types of normal play chips currently in use on the blackjack tables. The second, blue chip, is also from

this same organization, but is an example of a paddlewheel chip (much more of this later). The third and final chip, with the two hands, is from the Red River Human Services Foundation.

This is to demonstrate some of both the fun and frustration of finding and figuring out these chips. While the attorney's office of the State of North Dakota has a listing of organizations permitted to conduct charitable activities (http://www.state.nd.us/ sec/ forms/pdf/ charorg.pdf), it is only of limited use, especially when it comes to harvesting chips as many of the address listed are often the organizations headquarters, and then often only a post office box, and NOT necessarily where the activities take place. As an example of this, on my most recent trip, I was given the address for the American Gold Gymnastics organization in Fargo. With map in hand, and some friendly assistance, I found the place in question. True enough, it was exactly what it stated, a Gymnasium! Not to be perturbed, I parked the car, walked in and asked where I might be able to acquire some chips from the puzzled staff who quickly directed me to, yep, you guessed it, two bars, each located on opposite ends of town. Such is the fun in finding these chips.

The exception to this above rule is fraternal organizations, such as Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legions, Eagles Clubs and the like. Here, usually the address listed is the place where gaming actually takes place. Having said that, just being on the list does not mean that one will find chips as sometimes one only finds a pull tab operation, or a bingo game.

Misidentification

Back to the first two chips in the above quiz. Perhaps no greater amount of misidentification known to chippers has ever surfaced concerning any chip from North Dakota then the chips from the this organization. This is perhaps because of the scope of their charitable operations. Their official name is the Fargo-Moorhead Community Theatre. Quoting from one of their brochures:

"The activities of FMCT (Fargo-Moorhead Community Theatre) are supported in part with the proceeds from charitable gaming. FMCT gaming sites include the Doublewood Inn, the Old Broadway, the Windbreak, all located in Fargo. Borrowed Bucks and Parrot's Cay in Grand Forks, Happy Trails in Argusville, Wild Knights in Casselton, and Harwood Hideout in Harwood."


And just so you are a little bit more confused a little bit more, there is also a Borrowed Bucks located in Fargo, but that is for different charitable organizations, and yes they have charitable casino chips. . . .

The Paddlewheel

This is also known as a Pig Wheel (as in the barn yard variety and not the person standing in line in front of you who buys the last of a newly released limited edition chip buying 300 of a 500 issue when you only wanted one for yourself, but that is another story, best told elsewhere).

Realizing that my prose might not be quite as good as an actual photo and knowing that most casinos do not look to kindly on anyone wielding a camera inside of their establishments, I eventually found what I was looking for of all places, of course, the internet, from one of the "officially licenses" establishments authorized to provide gaming equipment to charitable organizations in North Dakota.

And just in case you are wondering, yes, you can bet on your favorite "pig" to be the winner!



The Paddle - Pig Wheel


Restating some wrong observations

While a few other molds exist, including Hat and Cane, Elephant, and others, the current rate of return for chips found to date are mostly but not exclusively of the Bud Jones mold, with suite pips being the predominate design.

collection of American gold coins, experimental pattern coins and paper money.


The Main gallery features a new exhibit every year designed to appeal to a wide variety of interests, including history, art, archaeology, banking and economics, and coin collecting.

Bob was an avid chip collector had been collecting casino chips for many years in his numerous trips to various casinos in the states, as well as on his visits to many islands in the Caribbean. Rather than bringing back a postcard or worthless souvenir from his trips, he decided to pick up a casino chip as a memento of his visit. While on vacation in Lake Tahoe and Reno, he learned of the existence of the Casino Chip and Gaming token Collectors Club, and quickly found that many other individuals had been collecting casino chips for many years. His 'original' idea was not new, nor was he as crazy as he initially thought. He quickly joined the CC>CC and became member R-1229. His collection continued to grown throughout the years, with an attempt to specialize in chips from casinos in the Caribbean and Florida.

Bob co-authored two books on Florida chips, checks and tokens and would at a drop of a hat, travel the state to get new chips from any new Florida gaming establishment. Either on land or spending 5 hours out at sea on one of the many day cruises. Weather was never a problem for him as his love of collecting, gaming and his strong sea legs would allow him to go out in any sea conditions. His tails of adventure on the BBS became legend as he told of his adventures out on the high seas with his often green, (in color) fellow Florida chipper.

Bob was active in the electronic chipping community beginning with the early days of Prodigy and moving onto the Greg's board where his humor, wit and bantering really shined. No subject was out of bounds for Bob and he even began his own casino collecting specialty niche of casino Ice machines, provided of course they had the casino logo on the machine. He never did get one of those machines out of the casino or off one of the boats. Bob Ginsburg (FL) as his handle would soon become on Greg's board, to help him keep his identity as the chipping community soon learned there were two Bob Ginsburg's (with the other Bob living in Connecticut). This gave those who read Greg's board many hours of laughter as to if there was really two different Bob's before the two finally met and were photographed at one of the CC>CC conventions in Vegas.

Bob was also a founding member and first treasurer for the Floridian Chapter. A position he held for many years. When Bob was not involved with chips he resided in Pembroke Pines, Florida with his wife, Sandra, of 30+ years. Bob had a PHD in clinical physiology and practiced in Broward County. Bob always longed for the day when he could retire from his practice and move to Costa Rica with his wife. Bob had two daughters with one living in North Florida and the other living in Los Angles who provided him with a granddaughter who was the his prize of both his and Sandra's life. He was often torn in later years as to whether to move to Costa Rica, his dream or out to CA to be close to his grand-child. He would often spend a week in California with his granddaughter before joining all his friends at the annual chip convention in Vegas. Bob became quiet and withdrawn from the chipping community in the last few years to care for Sandra as she battled her own illness. Bob took up orchid growing as a hobby knowing this would keep him close to home but his love of chip collecting never waned.

Bob will be missed in the chipping community but mostly by his fellow Florida chippers.






